A Concurrent Resolution commending the life and career of Ed Jacobsen; extending sympathy to his family; and directing distribution.

WHEREAS, William Edward "Ed" Jacobsen was born on July 2, 1919, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen was a graduate of Capitol Hill High School and was the state champion wrestler at 125 pounds his senior year in 1938. Jacobsen is the only state champion wrestler produced by Capitol Hill High School; and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen attended Oklahoma A & M University on a wrestling scholarship. After graduation he was well known on the campus as a wrestling official; and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen coached at Jet, Coalgate and Atoka high schools before coming to Mid-Del School System in 1954 where he started the wrestling program. Ed taught and coached for 28 years at Midwest City High School; and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen refereed numerous state high school, Big Eight and national junior college championship college wrestling tournaments, as well as several University of Oklahoma-Oklahoma State University Bedlam Series matches; and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen was inducted into the Coaches' Hall of Fame in 1986 and received the Distinguished Officials Award from the Oklahoma Secondary Schools Activities Association (OSSAA); and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen, pioneer in high school and college wrestling, died Tuesday, March 21, 1995, at the age of 75 years, after a lengthy illness; and

WHEREAS, Ed Jacobsen was dearly loved and respected by his family and the entire Midwest City Community. He is survived by three children, six grandchildren, two great grandchildren and many nieces, nephews and cousins.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 45TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:
