A Concurrent Resolution encouraging the Commission for Human Services to continue certain optional work schedule arrangement; and directing distribution.

WHEREAS, in 1985, as part of a plan to examine alternative work schedule arrangements, the Department of Human Services implemented a pilot project to evaluate the feasibility of allowing a four-day work week in county offices; and

WHEREAS, county offices involved in the four-day work week pilot project were required to remain open Monday through Friday in order to maintain service availability and delivery. County office employees were offered the option of working either four, ten-hour days or five, eight-hour days; and

WHEREAS, to further underscore its commitment to the well-being of state employees and their families, in 1991, the Legislature allowed county offices to retain the option of a four-day work week; and

WHEREAS, elimination of this option would be detrimental to worker morale and could mean economic hardship for employees who have come to rely on the program, which has proven beneficial to those who choose the option.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 47TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:

THAT the Oklahoma State Legislature hereby encourages the Commission for Human Services to continue the option of a four-day work week for employees of the Department of Human Services who presently utilize such a work schedule arrangement.

THAT copies of this resolution be distributed to the Governor, the Cabinet Secretary for Human Services, each Commissioner of the Commission for Human Services, the Director of Human Services and each county director.
