A Concurrent Resolution declaring April 3, 2002, "4-H Day" at the Oklahoma State Legislature; and directing distribution.

WHEREAS, 4-H is the largest youth-serving organization in the world with membership in Oklahoma open to youth ages five to nineteen years. All 50 states and more than 80 countries worldwide have 4-H programs; and

WHEREAS, the roots of 4-H began at the turn of the century when educators started to emphasize the needs of young people and to

introduce nature study as a basis for a better agricultural education; and

WHEREAS, 4-H began as a simultaneous response to needs throughout the country with the goal of the program to extend agricultural education to rural youth by organizing boys and girls clubs through "learning by doing"; and

WHEREAS, the formal establishment of 4-H can be traced back to the enactment in 1914 of the Smith-Lever Act which established the Cooperative Extension System within the United States Department of Agriculture, the state land-grant universities, and the counties; and

WHEREAS, throughout the years the overall objectives of 4-H have remained the same: the development of youth as individuals and as responsible and productive citizens. The universally known 4-H emblem, a four-leaf clover with four H's, signifies head, heart, hands, and health; and

WHEREAS, 4-H has a tremendously positive impact on young people and their families and on the communities where these families live. Throughout the years 4-H has made significant contributions which have shaped the lives of many Oklahomans; and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma's state and district 4-H officers, along with the 4-H Ambassadors, will spend the day at the Oklahoma State Capitol on April 3, 2002, where the group will receive training in the legislative process.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SENATE OF THE 2ND SESSION OF THE 48TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES CONCURRING THEREIN:

THAT the Oklahoma State Legislature declares April 3, 2002, "4-H Day" at the Oklahoma State Legislature.

THAT a copy of this resolution be distributed to the Department of Agricultural Education, Communications Division, and 4-H Youth Development at Oklahoma State University, and the Oklahoma Cooperative Extension Service at Oklahoma State University.
