AS INTRODUCED

A Resolution expressing to President George W. Bush disappointment in the appointments of pro-homosexual-rights activists Stephen E. Herbits and Scott H. Evertz to positions in the Bush administration; urging such appointments be withdrawn or rescinded; urging the White House Office of National AIDS Policy be abolished; and directing distribution.

WHEREAS, President George W. Bush has on many occasions expressed his firm support and belief in the family values which are embraced by most Americans; and

WHEREAS, recently President Bush appointed or allowed to be appointed two members of his administration, Stephen E. Herbits, who is a special consultant to Defense Secretary Donald Rumsfeld, and Scott H. Evertz, head of the White House Office of National AIDS Policy, both of whom are pro-homosexual-rights activists; and

WHEREAS, Stephen E. Herbit's job entails screening civilian applicants for top Pentagon positions; and

WHEREAS, it is feared that Mr. Herbits will promote a homosexual agenda which would encourage open homosexuality within the military; and

WHEREAS, the Oklahoma House of Representatives takes a more conservative approach to administrative positions within the Bush administration, a more pro-family approach which finds that homosexuals simply because of their immoral lifestyle should not help the leadership of the United States of America.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 48TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

THAT the Oklahoma House of Representatives expresses to President George W. Bush disappointment in the appointments of pro-homosexual-rights activists Stephen E. Herbits and Scott H. Evertz to positions in the Bush administration and urges that these appointments be withdrawn or rescinded and that the White House Office of National AIDS Policy be abolished.

THAT a copy of this resolution shall be distributed to the President of the United States, George W. Bush and to Donald Rumsfeld, Secretary of Defense.
