Walk the halls of Head Start programs, secondary classrooms, and university laboratories, encouraging our educators to the greatest use of their skills.

May these hands of congress reach out to the indigent poor children of this state and bring them the healing of mind and body they so desperately need. Empower our resolve that no child shall be without health care, nutrition, and mental health services. We know what they need, we have the capacity to meet their needs, and we only require the political will to bring them healing. God bless the physicians of this state, and all who attend the diseased and distressed. May their hearts be empowered by your compassionate love for the suffering children.

Sustainer of Life, be present among these legislators today. Bless, preserve and keep them to Your will. May Your love and mercy, justice and compassion guide them. We have no illusions that among other things, politics is the art of compromise, but when we compromise may it lean toward healthy and well-educated children - all of the children. Extend these blessings to the Oklahoma Senate, our Governor, and our colleagues in Washington.
