COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 715 - By: LAMB of the Senate and INGMIRE of the House.

[Crime Victims Compensation Act - increasing certain award
- increasing burial expenses - effective date -
emergency]

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 21 O.S. 2001, Section 142.13, is amended to read as follows:

Section 142.13 A. The Crime Victims Compensation Board may compensate for work loss, replacement services loss, dependent's economic loss and dependent's replacement service loss.

Compensation for a caregiver who has out-of-pocket wage loss as a result of caring for the victim who was injured as a result of criminally injurious conduct may not exceed Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00).

B. Compensation payable to a victim and to all other claimants sustaining economic loss because of injury to or death of that victim may not exceed Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$20,000.00) in the aggregate.

C. The Board may provide for the payment to a claimant in a lump sum or in installments. At the request of the claimant, the

1 Board may convert future economic loss, other than allowable
2 expense, to a lump sum.

3 D. An award payable in a lump sum or installments for loss of
4 support for a dependent of the deceased victim may be computed
5 through a formula which calculates the net loss of support for
6 dependents based upon an estimated date of retirement or an
7 estimated date of adulthood for dependent children, beginning with
8 the date of death of the victim and ending with the least of one of
9 the following time periods for each dependent filing loss of
10 support:

11 1. The amount of time from the date of death of the victim to
12 the date the victim would have been expected to reach sixty-two (62)
13 years of age; ~~or~~

14 2. The amount of time from the date of death of the victim to
15 the date the spouse of the victim is expected to reach sixty-two
16 (62) years of age; or

17 3. The amount of time from the date of death of the victim to
18 the date a dependent child is expected to reach eighteen (18) years
19 of age or twenty-three (23) years of age if the dependent child is
20 enrolled as a full-time student. An award payable in installments
21 for future loss of support may be modified by the Board in the event
22 a dependent child receiving loss of support is between the ages of
23 eighteen (18) and twenty-three (23) years of age and is no longer

1 enrolled as a full-time student, the dependent dies before all
2 installments are paid or the dependent receiving installments moves
3 and leaves no forwarding address with the Board office.

4 E. An award shall not be subject to execution, attachment,
5 garnishment or other process, except for child support and except
6 that an award for allowable expense shall not be exempt from a claim
7 of a creditor to the extent that such creditor has provided
8 products, services or accommodations, the costs of which are
9 included in the award.

10 F. An assignment by the claimant to any future award under the
11 provisions of this act is unenforceable, except:

12 1. An assignment of any award for work loss to assure payment
13 of court ordered alimony, maintenance or child support; or

14 2. An assignment of any award for allowable expense to the
15 extent that the benefits are for the cost of products, services or
16 accommodations necessitated by the injury or death on which the
17 claim is based and are provided or to be provided by the assignee.

18 G. The Board may, in its discretion, approve payment of crisis
19 counseling, occurring within ~~two (2)~~ three (3) years of the crime,
20 in an amount not to exceed ~~Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00)~~ Three
21 Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for each family member of a homicide
22 victim, ~~with a maximum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) per~~
23 ~~family,~~ provided, the counselor is a qualified mental health care

1 provider. Medical and pharmaceutical treatment is not compensable
2 for any family member of a deceased victim.

3 H. Outpatient counseling expenses for a victim of criminally
4 injurious conduct may be considered by the Board provided the
5 counseling is focused on the crime and the counselor is a qualified
6 mental health care provider. A total not to exceed Three Thousand
7 Dollars (\$3,000.00) may be awarded for individual counseling
8 sessions for victims of criminally injurious conduct. Sessions
9 between the mental health care provider and nonoffending parents of
10 a victimized child under eighteen (18) years of age may also be
11 included in the award provided the combined total for the counseling
12 and parental sessions do not exceed Three Thousand Dollars
13 (\$3,000.00) and the parental sessions relate to the victimization.
14 In extreme cases, the Board may, in its discretion, waive the three-
15 thousand-dollar limit. Inpatient mental health treatment will be
16 reviewed on a case-by-case basis and may be compensated, at the
17 discretion of the Board, in an amount not to exceed Ten Thousand
18 Dollars (\$10,000.00).

19 I. Reasonable funeral, cremation or burial expenses shall not
20 exceed ~~Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00)~~ Six Thousand Dollars
21 (\$6,000.00).

22 J. Reasonable costs associated with homicide crime scene
23 cleanup shall not exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00).

1 K. Loss of income of a caregiver shall not exceed Two Thousand
2 Dollars (\$2,000.00).

3 SECTION 2. This act shall become effective July 1, 2005.

4 SECTION 3. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
5 of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is hereby
6 declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
7 be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
