ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 1442 - By: BALLENGER of the Senate and SHOEMAKE AND TURNER of the House.

An Act relating to schools; changing the name of the Oklahoma State University Technical Branch at Okmulgee to the Oklahoma State University Institute of Technology-Okmulgee; providing for effect of name change; amending 62 O.S. 2001, Section 57.122, which relates to certain building bonds; amending 70 O.S. 2001, Section 3103, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 400, O.S.L. 2004 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007, Section 3103), which relates to agencies of state higher education institutions; amending 70 O.S. 2001, Section 14-103, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 319, O.S.L. 2006 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007, Section 14-103), which relates to the powers and duties of the State Board of Career and Technology Education; amending 70 O.S. 2001, Section 17-101, as last amended by Section 3, Chapter 46, 2nd Extraordinary Session, O.S.L. 2006 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007, Section 17-101), which relates to definitions for the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma; amending Section 12, Chapter 2, O.S.L. 2005, as last amended by Section 7, Chapter 402, O.S.L. 2005 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007, Section 3980.12), which relates to authorized projects issued by the Oklahoma Capitol Improvement Authority; amending 72 O.S. 2001, Section 302, which relates to free tuition for children of certain veterans; amending 74 O.S. 2001, Section 130.12, which relates to technical training for alternative fuels; changing the name of Oklahoma State University Technical Branch located at Okmulgee; providing for codification; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

- 1 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma
- 2 Statutes as Section 3401.1 of Title 70, unless there is created a duplication in numbering,
- 3 reads as follows:

1 A. The state educational agency of Oklahoma State University located in
2 Okmulgee, Oklahoma, shall continue at the same location and is hereby officially named
3 and shall be designated in all future references as “Oklahoma State University Institute
4 of Technology-Okmulgee”.

5 B. The name change prescribed in this section shall not affect in any manner
6 whatsoever any legal relationships, bonds, contracts, supervisory authority of Oklahoma
7 State University or the Board of Regents for the Oklahoma Agricultural and Mechanical
8 Colleges, or title to property, obligations or any other aspect of the legal status of the
9 named agency for any purpose, except that the agency shall be referred to as “Oklahoma
10 State University Institute of Technology-Okmulgee” in all future references to the
11 agency.

12 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 62 O.S. 2001, Section 57.122, is amended to read
13 as follows:

14 Section 57.122 The State of Oklahoma Building Bonds Commission, acting for and
15 on behalf of the State of Oklahoma, shall be the agency by and through which the State
16 of Oklahoma shall incur indebtedness to the extent of the sum of Ninety-nine Million
17 Eight Hundred Eight Thousand Dollars (\$99,808,000.00) for the purpose of planning and
18 constructing new buildings or additions to existing state buildings and other capital
19 improvements for remodeling, modernizing and repairing existing buildings and capital
20 improvements and purchase of land, equipment and furnishings necessary for
21 construction or remodeling for the following departments and agencies of state
22 government in the amounts and for the purposes set forth as follows:

5 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2001, Section 3103, as last amended by
 6 Section 1, Chapter 400, O.S.L. 2004 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007, Section 3103), is amended to
 7 read as follows:

8 Section 3103. A. For the purposes of this Code, each of the following shall be
 9 deemed an agency and an integral part of the University of Oklahoma: ~~the~~

11 2. The Law Center,~~the;~~

12 3. The Oklahoma Geological Survey;~~;~~ and

13 4. OU-Tulsa;~~and.~~

14 B. For the purposes of this Code, each of the following shall be deemed an agency
 15 and an integral part of Oklahoma State University: ~~the~~

16 1. The College of Veterinary Medicine,~~the;~~

17 2. The College of Osteopathic Medicine,~~the;~~

18 3. The Agricultural Experiment Station,~~the;~~

19 4. The Agricultural Extension Division,~~the;~~

1 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2001, Section 14-103, as last amended by
2 Section 1, Chapter 319, O.S.L. 2006 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007, Section 14-103), is amended to
3 read as follows:

4 Section 14-103. The State Board of Career and Technology Education shall have
5 the following powers and duties:

6 1. Have the supervision of the Oklahoma Department of Career and Technology
7 Education of the State Board of Career and Technology Education, which department
8 shall keep its principal offices at Stillwater, and appoint and fix the compensation and
9 duties of the Director and other personnel of such Department;

10 2. Have the supervision of the technology center schools and colleges of Oklahoma,
11 except Oklahoma State University of ~~Technical Training at~~ Institute of Technology-
12 Okmulgee and the Oklahoma State University Technical Institutes at Oklahoma City
13 and Stillwater, which, however, shall be eligible to participate in federal programs
14 administered by the State Board of Career and Technology Education as hereinafter
15 provided;

16 3. Cooperate with, and enter into agreements with, and administer programs of,
17 and receive federal funds from, the United States Department of Education and other
18 federal agencies in matters relating to vocational and technical education, youth
19 apprenticeship programs, and manpower training, and be the sole state agency for such
20 purposes. Provided that, programs and funds made available through the Job Training
21 Partnership Act, or its successor programs, shall be excluded;

1 4. Provide for the formulation and adoption of curricula, courses of study, and other
2 instructional aids necessary for the adequate instruction of students in the technology
3 center schools and colleges of this state. It is the intent of the Legislature that
4 instructional models for vocational students should include higher standards of academic
5 work with increased emphasis on communication, computation and applied science;

6 5. Develop a plan to provide adequate vocational offerings accessible to all students
7 having the ability to benefit;

8 6. Purchase or otherwise acquire equipment, materials, supplies and other
9 property, real or personal, as may be necessary for the operation of the technology center
10 schools of this state, and provide for the maximum utilization of such property through a
11 coordinated and cooperative use thereof, including transfer of title to real and personal
12 property to a technology center school district for a reasonable cash consideration if said
13 property is to be utilized in a vocational-technical program administered by the
14 technology center district board of education. Any conveyance of real property for a
15 reasonable consideration shall contain a reversionary clause by which the real property
16 shall revert to the State Board of Career and Technology Education if the property ceases
17 to be used in a vocational-technical program administered by the technology center
18 district board of education;

19 7. Enter into such agreements and contracts with the State Board of Education,
20 boards of trustees of community junior colleges, boards of education of independent and
21 elementary school districts, boards of education of school districts for technology center
22 schools, private educational or training institutions, public or private industry, and

1 boards of directors of community action programs, as may be necessary or feasible for the
2 furtherance of vocational and technical training within this state;

3 8. Cooperate and enter into agreements with the Oklahoma State Regents for
4 Higher Education;

5 9. Cooperate with the State Department of Education in developing hands-on
6 career exploration activities for students in grades 6 through 10, integrating academic
7 competencies into vocational instruction, and ensuring counseling of all students in order
8 to minimize the number of students graduating from high school without having
9 completed either a vocational-technical program or college preparation;

10 10. Develop and periodically update a plan to allow teacher training and the
11 purchase and installation of technological equipment necessary to modernize vocational
12 educational programs;

13 11. Accept and provide for the administration of any land, money, buildings, gifts,
14 funds, donations or other things of value which may be offered or bequeathed to the
15 schools or colleges under the supervision or control of said Board;

16 12. Enter into cooperative arrangements with one or more other states for the
17 conduct and administration of programs, services and activities;

18 13. Cooperate whenever possible, to avoid any duplication of training programs
19 with any established training program registered by the Bureau of Apprenticeship and
20 Training, United States Department of Labor;

1 14. Accept and expend funds from any source in order to market, advertise or
2 promote programs and services available through the Career and Technology Education
3 system; and

4 15. Participate in activities pertaining to the recruitment of companies to locate or
5 expand operations in the state, and participate in activities that will increase the
6 competitiveness of companies with headquarters or branch operations located in the
7 state. These activities may require agency staff to travel, train, or provide technical
8 assistance outside the State of Oklahoma.

9 SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2001, Section 17-101, as last amended by
10 Section 3, Chapter 46, 2nd Extraordinary Session, O.S.L. 2006 (70 O.S. Supp. 2007,
11 Section 17-101), is amended to read as follows:

12 Section 17-101. The following words and phrases as used in this act, unless a
13 different meaning is clearly required by the context, shall have the following meanings:

14 (1) "Retirement system" shall mean the Teachers' Retirement System of Oklahoma,
15 as defined in Section 17-102 of this title.

16 (2) "Public school" shall mean a school district, a state college or university, the
17 State Board of Education, the State Board of Career and Technology Education and any
18 other state educational entity conducted within the state supported wholly or partly by
19 public funds and operating under the authority and supervision of a legally constituted
20 board or agency having authority and responsibility for any function of public education.

21 (3) "Classified personnel" shall mean any teacher, principal, superintendent,
22 supervisor, administrator, librarian, certified or registered nurse, college professor, or

1 college president whose salary is paid wholly or in part from public funds. An employee
2 of any state department, board, board of regents or board of trustees, who is in a
3 supervisory or an administrative position, the function of which is primarily devoted to
4 public education, shall be considered classified personnel under the meaning of this act,
5 at the discretion of the Board of Trustees of the Teachers' Retirement System. The term
6 "teacher" shall also include instructors and counselors employed by the Department of
7 Corrections and holding valid teaching certificates issued by the State Department of
8 Education. Provided, that a person employed by the Department of Corrections as an
9 instructor or counselor shall have been actively engaged in the teaching profession for a
10 period of not less than three (3) years prior to employment to be eligible to participate in
11 the Oklahoma Teachers' Retirement System. The Department of Corrections shall
12 contribute the employer's share to the Oklahoma Teachers' Retirement System.

13 (4) "Nonclassified optional personnel" shall include cooks, janitors, maintenance
14 personnel not in a supervisory capacity, bus drivers, noncertified or nonregistered
15 nurses, noncertified librarians, and clerical employees of the public schools, state
16 colleges, universities or any state department, board, board of regents or board of
17 trustees, the functions of which are primarily devoted to public education and whose
18 salaries are paid wholly or in part from public funds.

19 (5) "Employer" shall mean the state and any of its designated agents or agencies
20 with responsibility and authority for public education, such as boards of education of
21 elementary and independent school districts, boards of regents, boards of control or any

1 other agency of and within the state by which a person may be employed for service in
2 public education.

3 (6) "Member" shall mean any teacher or other employee included in the
4 membership of the system as provided in Section 17-103 of this title.

5 (7) "Board of Trustees" shall mean the board provided for in Section 17-106 of this
6 title to administer the retirement system.

7 (8) "Service" shall mean service as a classified or nonclassified optional employee in
8 the public school system, or any other service devoted primarily to public education in
9 the state.

10 (9) "Prior service" shall mean service rendered prior to July 1, 1943.

11 (10) "Membership service" shall mean service as a member of the classified or
12 nonclassified personnel as defined in paragraphs (3) and (4) of this section.

13 (11) "Creditable service" shall mean membership service plus any prior service
14 authorized under this title.

15 (12) "Annuitant" shall mean any person in receipt of a retirement allowance as
16 provided in this title.

17 (13) "Accumulated contributions" shall mean the sum of all amounts deducted from
18 the compensation of a member and credited to his individual account in the Teacher
19 Savings Fund, together with interest as of June 30, 1968.

20 (14) "Earnable compensation" shall mean the full rate of the compensation that
21 would be payable to a member if he worked the full normal working time.

22 (15) "Average salary":

1 (a) for those members who joined the System prior to July 1, 1992, shall
2 mean the average of the salaries for the three (3) years on which the
3 highest contributions to the Teachers' Retirement System was paid not
4 to exceed the maximum contribution level specified in Section 17-116.2
5 of this title or the maximum compensation level specified in subsection
6 (28) of this section. Provided, no member shall retire with an average
7 salary in excess of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) unless
8 the member has made the required election and paid the required
9 contributions on such salary in excess of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars
10 (\$25,000.00), or unless an eligible member fulfills the requirements of
11 Section ~~2~~ 17-116.2C of this ~~act~~ title in order to have pre-cap removal
12 service included in the retirement benefit computation of the member
13 using the regular annual compensation of the member for any pre-cap
14 removal year of service so included subject to the maximum average
15 salary amount, and

16 (b) for those members who join the System after June 30, 1992, shall
17 mean the average of the salaries for five (5) consecutive years on which
18 the highest contribution to the Teachers' Retirement System was paid.
19 Only salary on which required contributions have been made may be
20 used in computing average salary.

1 (16) "Annuity" shall mean payments for life derived from the "accumulated
2 contributions" of a member. All annuities shall be payable in equal monthly
3 installments.

4 (17) "Pension" shall mean payments for life derived from money provided by the
5 employer. All pensions shall be payable in equal monthly installments.

6 (18) "Monthly retirement allowance" is one-twelfth (1/12) of the annual retirement
7 allowance which shall be payable monthly.

8 (19) "Retirement Benefit Fund" shall mean the fund from which all retirement
9 benefits shall be paid based on such mortality tables as shall be adopted by the Board of
10 Trustees.

11 (20) "Actuary" shall mean a person especially skilled through training and
12 experience in financial calculation respecting the expectancy and duration of life.

13 (21) "Actuarial equivalent" shall mean a benefit of equal value when computed
14 upon the basis of such mortality and other tables as shall be adopted by the Board of
15 Trustees.

16 (22) The masculine pronoun, whenever used, shall include the feminine.

17 (23) "Actuarially determined cost" shall mean the single sum which is actuarially
18 equivalent in value to a specified pension amount as determined on the basis of mortality
19 and interest assumptions adopted by the Board of Trustees.

20 (24) "Normal retirement age" means age sixty-two (62) or the age at which the sum
21 of a member's age and number of years of creditable service total eighty (80) or ninety

1 (90), for those who became a member after June 30, 1992, pursuant to Section 17-105 of
2 this title, whichever occurs first.

3 (25) “Regular annual compensation” means salary plus fringe benefits, excluding
4 the flexible benefit allowance pursuant to Section 26-105 of this title and for purposes
5 pursuant to Section 17-101 et seq. of this title. For purposes of this definition, regular
6 annual compensation shall include all payments as provided in subsection D of Section
7 17-116.2 of this title.

8 (26) “Teacher” means classified personnel and nonclassified optional personnel.

9 (27) “Active classroom teacher” means a person employed by a school district to
10 teach students specifically identified classes for specifically identified subjects during the
11 course of a semester, and who holds a valid certificate or license issued by and in
12 accordance with the rules and regulations of the State Board of Education.

13 (28) “Maximum compensation level” shall, except as otherwise authorized pursuant
14 to the provisions of Section ~~2~~ 17-116.2C of this ~~act~~ title, mean:

15 (a) Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) for creditable service
16 authorized and performed prior to July 1, 1995, for members not
17 electing a higher maximum compensation level,

18 (b) Forty Thousand Dollars (\$40,000.00) for creditable service authorized
19 and performed prior to July 1, 1995, for members electing a maximum
20 compensation level in excess of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars
21 (\$25,000.00),

- 1 (c) Twenty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$27,500.00) for
2 members who, as of June 30, 1995, had elected to have a maximum
3 compensation level not in excess of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars
4 (\$25,000.00), and who were employed by an entity or institution within
5 The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education for creditable service
6 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 1995, but not later than
7 June 30, 1996, if such member does not elect a higher maximum
8 compensation level for this period as authorized by Section 17-116.2A
9 of this title,
- 10 (d) Thirty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$32,500.00) for members
11 employed by a comprehensive university if the member meets the
12 requirements imposed by Section 17-116.2A of this title and the
13 member elects to impose a higher maximum compensation level for
14 service performed on or after July 1, 1995, but not later than June 30,
15 1996,
- 16 (e) Forty-four Thousand Dollars (\$44,000.00) for members who, as of June
17 30, 1995, had elected to have a maximum compensation level in excess
18 of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00), and who were employed
19 by an entity or institution within The Oklahoma State System of
20 Higher Education for creditable service authorized and performed on
21 or after July 1, 1995, but not later than June 30, 1996, if such member

- 1 does not elect a higher maximum compensation level for this period as
2 authorized by Section 17-116.2A of this title,
- 3 (f) Forty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$49,000.00) for members employed by a
4 comprehensive university if the member meets the requirements
5 imposed by Section 17-116.2A of this title and the member elects to
6 impose a higher maximum compensation level for service performed on
7 or after July 1, 1995, but not later than June 30, 1996,
- 8 (g) the following amounts for creditable service authorized and performed
9 by members employed by a comprehensive university, based upon the
10 election of the member in effect as of June 30, 1995:
- 11 1. for members who elected a maximum compensation level not in
12 excess of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00):
- 13 (i) Thirty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$32,500.00)
14 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
15 1996, but not later than June 30, 1997,
- 16 (ii) Thirty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars
17 (\$37,500.00) for service authorized and performed on or
18 after July 1, 1997, but not later than June 30, 1998,
- 19 (iii) Forty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$42,500.00)
20 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
21 1998, but not later than June 30, 2000,

- 1 (iv) Forty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$47,500.00)
2 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
3 2000, but not later than June 30, 2001,
- 4 (v) Fifty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$52,500.00) for
5 service authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2001,
6 but not later than June 30, 2002,
- 7 (vi) Fifty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$57,500.00)
8 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
9 2002, but not later than June 30, 2003,
- 10 (vii) Sixty-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$62,500.00)
11 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
12 2003, but not later than June 30, 2004,
- 13 (viii) Sixty-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$67,500.00)
14 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
15 2004, but not later than June 30, 2005,
- 16 (ix) Seventy-two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$72,500.00)
17 for service authorized and performed on or after July 1,
18 2005, but not later than June 30, 2006,
- 19 (x) Seventy-seven Thousand Five Hundred Dollars
20 (\$77,500.00) for service authorized and performed on or
21 after July 1, 2006, but not later than June 30, 2007,

- 1 (xi) the full amount of regular annual compensation for
2 service authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2007,

4 2. for members who elected a maximum compensation level in
5 excess of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00):
6 (i) Forty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$49,000.00) for service
7 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 1996, but not
8 later than June 30, 1997,
9 (ii) Fifty-four Thousand Dollars (\$54,000.00) for service
10 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 1997, but not
11 later than June 30, 1998,
12 (iii) Fifty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$59,000.00) for service
13 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 1998, but not
14 later than June 30, 2000,
15 (iv) Sixty-four Thousand Dollars (\$64,000.00) for service
16 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2000, but not
17 later than June 30, 2001,
18 (v) Sixty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$69,000.00) for service
19 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2001, but not
20 later than June 30, 2002,

- 1 (vi) Seventy-four Thousand Dollars (\$74,000.00) for service
2 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2002, but not
3 later than June 30, 2003,
- 4 (vii) Seventy-nine Thousand Dollars (\$79,000.00) for service
5 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2003, but not
6 later than June 30, 2004,
- 7 (viii) Eighty-four Thousand Dollars (\$84,000.00) for service
8 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2004, but not
9 later than June 30, 2005,
- 10 (ix) Eighty-nine Thousand Dollars (\$89,000.00) for service
11 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2005, but not
12 later than June 30, 2006,
- 13 (x) Ninety-four Thousand Dollars (\$94,000.00) for service
14 authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2006, but not
15 later than June 30, 2007,
- 16 (xi) the full amount of regular annual compensation for
17 service authorized and performed on or after July 1, 2007,
- 18 (h) the full amount of regular annual compensation of:
- 19 1. a member of the retirement system not employed by an entity or
20 institution within The Oklahoma State System of Higher
21 Education for all creditable service authorized and performed on
22 or after July 1, 1995,

- 1 6. a member of the retirement system employed by a
2 comprehensive university for all service performed on and after

5 issued pursuant to this section. To the extent funds are available from the proceeds of
6 the borrowing authorized by this subsection, the Oklahoma Capitol Improvement
7 Authority shall provide for the payment of professional fees and associated costs
8 approved by the Oklahoma State Bond Advisor. The Oklahoma Capitol Improvement
9 Authority is authorized to hire bond counsel, financial consultants, and such other
10 professionals as may be deemed necessary to provide for the efficient sale of the
11 obligations and may utilize a portion of the proceeds of any borrowing to create such
12 reserves as may be deemed necessary and to pay costs associated with the issuance and
13 administration of such obligations. An issuance of bonds under this subsection may be
14 undertaken to achieve an overall debt service savings, modify restrictive bond document
