Bill Summary

Fiscal Analyst: David Ligon

The Conference Committee Substitute for HB 2029 embodies the work of the Children and Juvenile Law Task Force to clean-up and reorganize Title 10, in order for it to be easier to read and access information on delinquent children.

Fiscal Analysis

HB 2029 contains no other substitutive changes that would warrant other fiscal impacts for OJA. Non-substitutive changes which have no cost are scattered throughout the measure. These changes include: name changes, removal of historic dates, consolidates or deletes provisions, or clarifies language. To a great extent, the measure consists mainly of rearranging and renumbering entire sections of law in order to separate and consolidate specific provisions on delinquents.

Long Term Fiscal Considerations

The Conference Committee Substitute for HB 2029 clarifies and provides easier public access to information related to delinquent children.

The measure is the product of more than two years of work by the Oklahoma Children and Juvenile Law Reform Committee created by HB 2840 in 2006. The Committee is charged with conducting a systematic review of all laws in Title 10 and prepare a recommended draft to reclassify, update, reform, renumber and recodify the laws relating to children and juveniles. This measure relates to the Juvenile Code.
