8 An Act relating to elections; creating the Uniform
9 Military and Overseas Voters Act; defining terms;
10 specifying application to certain elections;
11 establishing role of the Secretary of the State
12 Election Board; providing duties of the Secretary;
13 providing precinct and address assignment for
14 registration and voting purposes; providing methods
15 of registering to vote; providing methods of applying
16 for military-overseas ballot; providing for
17 timeliness and scope of application for military-
18 overseas ballot; providing for transmittal of ballots
19 and balloting material; providing for timely casting
20 of ballots; authorizing use of federal write-in
21 absentee ballots; requiring counting of certain
22 ballots; requiring inclusion of certain declaration;
23 requiring implementation of electronic free-access
24 system and stating purpose therefor; providing for
 request and use of electronic-mail addresses for
 certain purpose; providing that electronic-mail
 addresses are not public records; authorizing use of
 electronic-mail address for standing request for
 electronic delivery of ballots; requiring publication
 of election notices; providing for contents;
 providing for requests, updates and publication on
 Internet websites; providing that certain mistakes or
 omissions do not invalidate documents; providing that
 notarization or authentication is not required;
 providing for equitable relief; providing for
 uniformity of application and construction; providing
 for relation to the Electronic Signatures in Global
 and National Commerce Act; repealing 26 O.S. 2001,

1 Sections 14-116 and 14-117, as last amended by
2 Sections 1 and 2, Chapter 272, O.S.L. 2009, 14-118,
3 as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 149, O.S.L.
4 2010, Section 27, Chapter 485, O.S.L. 2003, as
5 amended by Section 4, Chapter 272, O.S.L. 2009, 26
6 O.S. 2001, Sections 14-119, as amended by Section 5,
7 Chapter 272, O.S.L. 2009, 14-120, as last amended by
8 Section 6, Chapter 272, O.S.L. 2009, 14-120.1, as
9 amended by Section 20, Chapter 447, O.S.L. 2002 and
10 14-121, as last amended by Section 5, State Question
11 No. 746, Legislative Referendum No. 347 (26 O.S.
12 Supp. 2010, Sections 14-116, 14-117, 14-118, 14-
13 118.1, 14-119, 14-120, 14-120.1 and 14-121), which
14 relate to military and overseas voting; providing for
15 codification; and providing an effective date.

16 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

17 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
18 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-136 of Title 26, unless there
19 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

20 SHORT TITLE. This act may be cited as the "Uniform Military and
21 Overseas Voters Act".

22 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
23 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-137 of Title 26, unless there
24 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

DEFINITIONS. In the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act:

(1) "Covered voter" means:

(A) a uniformed-service voter or an overseas voter who is
registered to vote in this state,

1 (B) a uniformed-service voter defined in paragraph (9) (A)
2 whose voting residence is in this state and who
3 otherwise satisfies this state's voter eligibility
4 requirements,

5 (C) an overseas voter who, before leaving the United
6 States, was last eligible to vote in this state and,
7 except for a state residency requirement, otherwise
8 satisfies this state's voter eligibility requirements,

9 (D) an overseas voter who, before leaving the United
10 States, would have been last eligible to vote in this
11 state had the voter then been of voting age and,
12 except for a state residency requirement, otherwise
13 satisfies this state's voter eligibility requirements,
14 or

15 (E) an overseas voter who was born outside the United
16 States, is not described in subparagraph (C) or (D) of
17 this section, and, except for a state residency
18 requirement, otherwise satisfies this state's voter
19 eligibility requirements, if:

20 (i) the last place where a parent or legal guardian
21 of the voter was, or under the Uniform Military
22 and Overseas Voters Act would have been, eligible
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1 to vote before leaving the United States is
2 within this state, and

3 (ii) the voter has not previously registered to vote
4 in any other state;

5 (2) "Dependent" means an individual recognized as a dependent
6 by a uniformed service;

7 (3) "Federal postcard application" means the application
8 prescribed under Section 101(b)(2) of the Uniformed and Overseas
9 Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 U.S.C. Section 1973ff(b)(2);

10 (4) "Federal write-in absentee ballot" means the ballot
11 described in Section 103 of the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens
12 Absentee Voting Act, 42 U.S.C. Section 1973ff-2;

13 (5) "Military-overseas ballot" means:

14 (A) a federal write-in absentee ballot,

15 (B) a ballot specifically prepared or distributed for use
16 by a covered voter in accordance with this [act], or

17 (C) a ballot cast by a covered voter in accordance with
18 this [act];

19 (6) "Overseas voter" means a United States citizen who is
20 outside the United States;

21 (7) "State" means a state of the United States, the District of
22 Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United States Virgin Islands, or any
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1 territory or insular possession subject to the jurisdiction of the
2 United States;

3 (8) "Uniformed service" means:

4 (A) active and reserve components of the Army, Navy, Air
5 Force, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of the United
6 States,

7 (B) the Merchant Marine, the commissioned corps of the
8 Public Health Service, or the commissioned corps of
9 the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration of
10 the United States, or

11 (C) the National Guard and state militia;

12 (9) "Uniformed-service voter" means an individual who is
13 qualified to vote and is:

14 (A) a member of the active or reserve components of the
15 Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, or Coast Guard of
16 the United States who is on active duty,

17 (B) a member of the Merchant Marine, the commissioned
18 corps of the Public Health Service, or the
19 commissioned corps of the National Oceanic and
20 Atmospheric Administration of the United States,

21 (C) a member on activated status of the National Guard or
22 state militia, or

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1 (D) a spouse or dependent of a member referred to in this
2 paragraph; and

3 (10) "United States", used in the territorial sense, means the
4 several states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the United
5 States Virgin Islands, and any territory or insular possession
6 subject to the jurisdiction of the United States.

7 SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
8 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-138 of Title 26, unless there
9 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

10 ELECTIONS COVERED. The voting procedures in the Uniform
11 Military and Overseas Voters Act apply to:

12 (1) A general, special, presidential preference, primary, or
13 runoff primary election for federal office;

14 (2) A general, special, primary, or runoff primary election for
15 statewide or state legislative office or state ballot measure; and

16 (3) A general, special, primary, or runoff primary election for
17 local government office or local ballot measure conducted under
18 Title 26 of the Oklahoma Statutes for which absentee voting or
19 voting by mail is available for other voters.

20 SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
21 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-139 of Title 26, unless there
22 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

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1 ROLE OF SECRETARY OF STATE ELECTION BOARD. (a) The Secretary
2 of the State Election Board is the state official responsible for
3 implementing the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act and the
4 state's responsibilities under the Uniformed and Overseas Citizens
5 Absentee Voting Act, 42 U.S.C. Section 1973ff et seq.

6 (b) The Secretary of the State Election Board shall make
7 available to covered voters information regarding voter registration
8 procedures for covered voters and procedures for casting military-
9 overseas ballots. The Secretary of the State Election Board may
10 delegate the responsibility under this subsection only to the state
11 office designated in compliance with Section 102(b)(1) of the
12 Uniformed and Overseas Citizens Absentee Voting Act, 42 U.S.C.
13 Section 1973ff-1(b)(1).

14 (c) The Secretary of the State Election Board shall establish
15 an electronic transmission system through which a covered voter may
16 apply for and receive voter registration materials, military-
17 overseas ballots, and other information under the Uniform Military
18 and Overseas Voters Act.

19 (d) The Secretary of the State Election Board shall:

20 (1) Develop standardized absentee-voting materials, including
21 privacy and transmission envelopes and their electronic equivalents,
22 authentication materials, and voting instructions, to be used with
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1 the military-overseas ballot of a voter authorized to vote in any
2 jurisdiction in this state; and

3 (2) To the extent reasonably possible, coordinate with other
4 states to carry out this subsection.

5 (e) The Secretary of the State Election Board shall prescribe
6 the form and content of a declaration for use by a covered voter to
7 swear or affirm specific representations pertaining to the voter's
8 identity, eligibility to vote, status as a covered voter, and timely
9 and proper completion of an overseas-military ballot. The
10 declaration must be based on the declaration prescribed to accompany
11 a federal write-in absentee ballot, as modified to be consistent
12 with the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act. The Secretary of
13 the State Election Board shall ensure that a form for the execution
14 of the declaration, including an indication of the date of execution
15 of the declaration, is a prominent part of all balloting materials
16 for which the declaration is required.

17 SECTION 5. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
18 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-140 of Title 26, unless there
19 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

20 OVERSEAS VOTER'S REGISTRATION ADDRESS. In registering to vote,
21 an overseas voter who is eligible to vote in this state shall use
22 and must be assigned to the voting precinct of the address of the
23 last place of residence of the voter in this state, or, in the case

1 of a voter described by subparagraph (E) of paragraph (1) of Section
2 2 of this act, the address of the last place of residence in this
3 state of the parent or legal guardian of the voter. If that address
4 is no longer a recognized residential address, the voter must be
5 assigned an address for voting purposes.

6 SECTION 6. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
7 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-141 of Title 26, unless there
8 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

9 METHODS OF REGISTERING TO VOTE. (a) To apply to register to
10 vote, in addition to any other approved method, a covered voter may
11 use a federal postcard application, or the application's electronic
12 equivalent.

13 (b) A covered voter may use the declaration accompanying a
14 federal write-in absentee ballot to apply to register to vote
15 simultaneously with the submission of the federal write-in absentee
16 ballot, if the declaration is received by the time provided in
17 Section 14-104 or 14-110.1 of Title 26 of the Oklahoma Statutes. If
18 the declaration is received after that date, it must be treated as
19 an application to register to vote for subsequent elections.

20 (c) The Secretary of the State Election Board shall ensure that
21 the electronic transmission system described in subsection (c) of
22 Section 4 of this act is capable of accepting both a federal
23 postcard application and any other approved electronic registration

1 application sent to the appropriate election official. The voter
2 may use the electronic transmission system or any other approved
3 method to register to vote.

4 SECTION 7. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
5 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-142 of Title 26, unless there
6 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

7 METHODS OF APPLYING FOR MILITARY-OVERSEAS BALLOT. (a) A
8 covered voter who is registered to vote in this state may apply for
9 a military-overseas ballot using either the regular absentee ballot
10 application in use in the voter's jurisdiction under Article XIV of
11 Title 26 of the Oklahoma Statutes or the federal postcard
12 application or the application's electronic equivalent.

13 (b) A covered voter who is not registered to vote in this state
14 may use a federal postcard application or the application's
15 electronic equivalent to apply simultaneously to register to vote
16 under Section 6 of this act and for a military-overseas ballot.

17 (c) The Secretary of the State Election Board shall ensure that
18 the electronic transmission system described in subsection (c) of
19 Section 4 of this act is capable of accepting the submission of both
20 a federal postcard application and any other approved electronic
21 military-overseas ballot application sent to the appropriate
22 election official. The voter may use the electronic transmission
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1 system or any other approved method to apply for a military-overseas
2 ballot.

3 (d) A covered voter may use the declaration accompanying a
4 federal write-in absentee ballot as an application for a military-
5 overseas ballot simultaneously with the submission of the federal
6 write-in absentee ballot, if the declaration is received by the
7 appropriate election official by the last day for other voters in
8 this state to apply for an absentee ballot for that election.

9 (e) To receive the benefits of the Uniform Military and
10 Overseas Voters Act, a covered voter must inform the appropriate
11 election official that the voter is a covered voter. Methods of
12 informing the appropriate election official that a voter is a
13 covered voter include:

14 (1) The use of a federal postcard application or federal write-
15 in absentee ballot;

16 (2) The use of an overseas address on an approved voter
17 registration application or ballot application; and

18 (3) The inclusion on an approved voter registration application
19 or ballot application of other information sufficient to identify
20 the voter as a covered voter.

21 (f) The Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act does not
22 preclude a covered voter from voting under Article XIV of Title 26
23 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

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1 SECTION 8. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
2 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-143 of Title 26, unless there
3 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

4 TIMELINESS AND SCOPE OF APPLICATION FOR MILITARY-OVERSEAS
5 BALLOT. An application for a military-overseas ballot is timely if
6 received by the last day for other voters in this state to apply for
7 an absentee ballot for that election. An application for a
8 military-overseas ballot for a primary election, whether or not
9 timely, is effective as an application for a military-overseas
10 ballot for the general election. An application for a military-
11 overseas ballot is effective for a runoff election necessary to
12 conclude the election for which the application was submitted.

13 SECTION 9. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
14 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-144 of Title 26, unless there
15 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

16 TRANSMISSION OF UNVOTED BALLOTS. (a) For an election described
17 in paragraph 1 or 2 of Section 3 of this act for which this state
18 has not received a waiver pursuant to Section 579 of the Military
19 and Overseas Voter Empowerment Act, 42 U.S.C. 1973ff 1(g)(2), not
20 later than forty-five days before the election or, if the forty-
21 fifth day before the election is a weekend or holiday, not later
22 than the business day preceding the forty-fifth day, the election
23 official in each jurisdiction charged with distributing a ballot and

1 balloting materials shall transmit a ballot and balloting materials
2 to all covered voters who by that date submit a valid military-
3 overseas ballot application.

4 (b) A covered voter who requests that a ballot and balloting
5 materials be sent to the voter by electronic transmission may choose
6 facsimile transmission or electronic mail delivery, or, if offered
7 by the voter's jurisdiction, Internet delivery. The election
8 official in each jurisdiction charged with distributing a ballot and
9 balloting materials shall transmit the ballot and balloting
10 materials to the voter using the means of transmission chosen by the
11 voter.

12 (c) If a ballot application from a covered voter arrives after
13 the jurisdiction begins transmitting ballots and balloting materials
14 to voters, the official charged with distributing a ballot and
15 balloting materials shall transmit them to the voter not later than
16 two business days after the application arrives.

17 SECTION 10. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
18 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-145 of Title 26, unless there
19 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

20 TIMELY CASTING OF BALLOT. To be valid, a military-overseas
21 ballot must be received by the appropriate local election official
22 not later than the close of the polls, or the voter must submit the
23 ballot for mailing, electronic transmission, or other authorized
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1 means of delivery not later than 12:01 a.m., at the place where the
2 voter completes the ballot, on the date of the election.

3 SECTION 11. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
4 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-146 of Title 26, unless there
5 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

6 FEDERAL WRITE-IN ABSENTEE BALLOT. A covered voter may use a
7 federal write-in absentee ballot to vote for all offices and ballot
8 measures in an election described in Section 3 of the Uniform
9 Military and Overseas Voters Act.

10 SECTION 12. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
11 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-147 of Title 26, unless there
12 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

13 RECEIPT OF VOTED BALLOT. (a) A valid military-overseas ballot
14 cast in accordance with Section 10 of this act must be counted if it
15 is delivered by the time provided in Section 14-104.1 of Title 26 of
16 the Oklahoma Statutes to the address that the appropriate state or
17 local election office has specified.

18 (b) If, at the time of completing a military-overseas ballot
19 and balloting materials, the voter has declared under penalty of
20 perjury that the ballot was timely submitted, the ballot may not be
21 rejected on the basis that it has a late postmark, an unreadable
22 postmark, or no postmark.

1 SECTION 13. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
2 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-148 of Title 26, unless there
3 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

4 DECLARATION. A military-overseas ballot must include or be
5 accompanied by a declaration signed by the voter that a material
6 misstatement of fact in completing the ballot may be grounds for a
7 conviction of perjury under the laws of the United States or this
8 state.

9 SECTION 14. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
10 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-149 of Title 26, unless there
11 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

12 CONFIRMATION OF RECEIPT OF APPLICATION AND VOTED BALLOT. The
13 Secretary of the State Election Board, in coordination with local
14 election officials, shall implement an electronic free-access system
15 by which a covered voter may determine by telephone, electronic
16 mail, or Internet whether:

17 (1) The voter's federal postcard application or other
18 registration or military-overseas ballot application has been
19 received and accepted; and

20 (2) The voter's military-overseas ballot has been received and
21 the current status of the ballot.

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1 SECTION 15. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
2 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-150 of Title 26, unless there
3 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

4 USE OF VOTER'S ELECTRONIC-MAIL ADDRESS. (a) The local election
5 official shall request an electronic-mail address from each covered
6 voter who registers to vote on or after January 1, 2012. An
7 electronic-mail address provided by a covered voter may not be made
8 available to the public or any individual or organization other than
9 an authorized agent of the local election official and is exempt
10 from disclosure under the Oklahoma Open Records Act. The address
11 may be used only for official communication with the voter about the
12 voting process, including transmitting military-overseas ballots and
13 election materials if the voter has requested electronic
14 transmission, and verifying the voter's mailing address and physical
15 location. The request for an electronic-mail address must describe
16 the purposes for which the electronic-mail address may be used and
17 include a statement that any other use or disclosure of the
18 electronic-mail address is prohibited.

19 (b) A covered voter who provides an electronic-mail address may
20 request that the voter's application for a military-overseas ballot
21 be considered a standing request for electronic delivery of a ballot
22 for all elections held through December 31 of the year following the
23 calendar year of the date of the application or another shorter
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1 period the voter specifies, including for any runoff elections that
2 occur as a result of such elections. An election official shall
3 provide a military-overseas ballot to a voter who makes a standing
4 request for each election to which the request is applicable. A
5 covered voter who is entitled to receive a military-overseas ballot
6 for a primary election under this subsection is entitled to receive
7 a military-overseas ballot for the general election.

8 SECTION 16. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
9 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-151 of Title 26, unless there
10 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

11 PUBLICATION OF ELECTION NOTICE. (a) At least one hundred days
12 before a regularly scheduled election and as soon as practicable
13 before an election not regularly scheduled, an official in each
14 jurisdiction charged with printing and distributing ballots and
15 balloting material shall prepare an election notice for that
16 jurisdiction, to be used in conjunction with a federal write-in
17 absentee ballot. The election notice must contain a list of all of
18 the ballot measures and federal, state, and local offices that as of
19 that date the official expects to be on the ballot on the date of
20 the election. The notice also must contain specific instructions
21 for how a voter is to indicate on the federal write-in absentee
22 ballot the voter's choice for each office to be filled and for each
23 ballot measure to be contested.

1 (b) A covered voter may request a copy of an election notice.
2 The official charged with preparing the election notice shall send
3 the notice to the voter by facsimile, electronic mail, or regular
4 mail, as the voter requests.

5 (c) As soon as ballot styles are certified, the official
6 charged with preparing the election notice under subsection (a) of
7 this section shall update the notice with the certified candidates
8 for each office and ballot measure questions and make the updated
9 notice publicly available.

10 (d) A local election jurisdiction that maintains an Internet
11 website shall make the election notice prepared under subsection (a)
12 of this section and updated versions of the election notice
13 regularly available on the website.

14 SECTION 17. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
15 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-152 of Title 26, unless there
16 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

17 PROHIBITION OF NONSUBSTANTIVE REQUIREMENTS. (a) If a voter's
18 mistake or omission in the completion of a document under the
19 Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act does not prevent
20 determining whether a covered voter is eligible to vote, the mistake
21 or omission does not invalidate the document. Failure to satisfy a
22 nonsubstantive requirement, such as using paper or envelopes of a
23 specified size or weight, does not invalidate a document submitted

1 under the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act. In a write-in
2 ballot authorized by the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act,
3 if the intention of the voter is discernable under this state's
4 uniform definition of what constitutes a vote, an abbreviation,
5 misspelling, or other minor variation in the form of the name of a
6 candidate or a political party must be accepted as a valid vote.

7 (b) Notarization is not required for the execution of a
8 document under the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act. An
9 authentication, other than the declaration specified in Section 13
10 of this act or the declaration on the federal postcard application
11 and federal write-in absentee ballot, is not required for execution
12 of a document under the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act.
13 The declaration and any information in the declaration may be
14 compared with information on file to ascertain the validity of the
15 document.

16 SECTION 18. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
17 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-153 of Title 26, unless there
18 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

19 EQUITABLE RELIEF. A court may issue an injunction or grant
20 other equitable relief appropriate to ensure substantial compliance
21 with, or enforce, the Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act on
22 application by:
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1 (1) A covered voter alleging a grievance under the Uniform
2 Military and Overseas Voters Act; or

3 (2) An election official in this state.

4 SECTION 19. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
5 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-154 of Title 26, unless there
6 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

7 UNIFORMITY OF APPLICATION AND CONSTRUCTION. In applying and
8 construing this uniform act, consideration must be given to the need
9 to promote uniformity of the law with respect to its subject matter
10 among states that enact it.

11 SECTION 20. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
12 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 14-155 of Title 26, unless there
13 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

14 RELATION TO ELECTRONIC SIGNATURES IN GLOBAL AND NATIONAL
15 COMMERCE ACT. The Uniform Military and Overseas Voters Act
16 modifies, limits, and supersedes the Electronic Signatures in Global
17 and National Commerce Act, 15 U.S.C. Section 7001 et seq., but does
18 not modify, limit, or supersede Section 101(c) of that act, 15
19 U.S.C. Section 7001(c), or authorize electronic delivery of any of
20 the notices described in Section 103(b) of that act, 15 U.S.C.
21 Section 7003(b).

22 SECTION 21. REPEALER 26 O.S. 2001, Sections 14-116 and
23 14-117, as last amended by Sections 1 and 2, Chapter 272, O.S.L.
