18 2011, Sections 6-183, 6-188, 6-198, 6-199, 6-201, 6-
19 202, 6-202.1 and 6-205, which relate to Oklahoma
20 Teacher Preparation Act; providing for codification;
21 and providing effective dates.

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25 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

26 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
27 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-116.2 of Title 70, unless
28 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

29 A. Effective January 1, 2013, there is hereby created the
30 Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability. The
31 membership of the Commission shall consist of:

32 1. The Secretary of Education, who shall serve as the chair of
33 the Commission;

1 2. One member appointed by the Governor, with the advice and
2 consent of the Senate, representing business and industry from an
3 Oklahoma employer with more than five hundred (500) employees;

4 3. One member appointed by the Governor, with the advice and
5 consent of the Senate, representing business and industry from an
6 Oklahoma employer with five hundred (500) or fewer employees;

7 4. One member, appointed by the Governor, with the advice and
8 consent of the Senate, who is a parent of a child enrolled in a
9 public school in this state;

10 5. One member, appointed by the Governor, with the advice and
11 consent of the Senate, who is an administrator of a public school
12 district;

13 6. One member, appointed by the Governor, with the advice and
14 consent of the Senate, who shall represent higher education teacher
15 education programs; and

16 7. One member appointed by the Governor, with the advice and
17 consent of the Senate, who shall be an active classroom teacher.

18 The terms of the initial appointed members shall commence on
19 January 1, 2013, and shall end on June 30, 2014. The terms of
20 subsequently appointed members shall commence on July 1 of each year
21 following the election of the Governor thereafter and shall be for
22 four (4) years. If a vacancy occurs, the vacancy shall be filled
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1 for the unexpired term in the same manner as the office was
2 previously filled.

3 B. A quorum of the Commission, which shall consist of four
4 members, shall be present in order for the Commission to transact
5 any business. Members shall be reimbursed for travel in the
6 performance of their official duties in accordance with the State
7 Travel Reimbursement Act.

8 C. Prior to July 1, 2013, the Commission shall meet to organize
9 and plan for the assumption of the powers and duties of the
10 Education Oversight Board and the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher
11 Preparation.

12 D. Beginning July 1, 2013, the Commission shall assume the
13 following duties:

14 1. Oversee implementation of the provisions of Enrolled House
15 Bill No. 1017 of the 1st Extraordinary Session of the 42nd Oklahoma
16 Legislature;

17 2. Implementation of the provisions of the Oklahoma Teacher
18 Preparation Act as provided for in law;

19 3. Make recommendations to the Governor and Legislature on
20 methods to achieve an aligned, seamless system from preschool
21 through postsecondary education; and
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1 4. Set performance levels and corresponding cut scores pursuant
2 to the Oklahoma School Testing Program Act and as provided for in
3 Section 1210.541 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

4 E. Beginning July 1, 2013, the Commission shall govern the
5 operation of the Office of Educational Quality and Accountability
6 created in Section 3-117 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

7 F. 1. Beginning July 1, 2014, the Commission shall assume the
8 following duties of the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation
9 according to the provisions of the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act:

10 a. approval and accreditation of teacher education programs,

11 and

12 b. assessment of candidates for licensure and certification.

13 2. To implement the provisions of this subsection the
14 Commission shall:

15 a. include the State Board of Education in the process,

16 b. review and assess approved, accredited and new programs of
17 teacher education, and

18 c. encourage studies and research designed to improve teacher
19 education.

20 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
21 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-116.3 of Title 70, unless
22 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
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1 A. As of July 1, 2013, all references to the Education
2 Oversight Board shall mean the Commission for Educational Quality
3 and Accountability.

4 B. As of July 1, 2013, all references to the Office of
5 Accountability shall mean the Office of Educational Quality and
6 Accountability.

7 C. As of July 1, 2014, all references to the Oklahoma
8 Commission for Teacher Preparation shall mean the Commission for
9 Educational Quality and Accountability.

10 SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
11 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3-116.4 of Title 70, unless
12 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

13 A. On July 1, 2014, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher
14 Preparation shall be placed under the authority of the Commission
15 for Educational Quality and Accountability. Except as otherwise
16 provided for in this section, the transfer shall include all real
17 property, buildings, furniture, equipment, supplies, records,
18 personnel, assets, current and future liabilities, fund balances,
19 encumbrances, obligations, and indebtedness associated with the
20 Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation.

21 B. All employees of the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher
22 Preparation on July 1, 2014, including related liabilities for sick
23 leave, annual leave, holidays, unemployment benefits, and workers'

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1 compensation benefits accruing prior to July 1, 2014, to such
2 personnel shall be transferred to the Commission for Educational
3 Quality and Accountability as of July 1, 2014. It is the intent of
4 the Legislature that, to the extent possible, the Commission ensure
5 that the employees retain pay and benefits, as much as possible,
6 including longevity, dependent insurance benefits, seniority,
7 rights, and other privileges or benefits.

8 C. Appropriate conveyances and other documents shall be
9 executed by January 1, 2015, to effectuate the transfer of property
10 owned by the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation to the
11 Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability.

12 D. Any monies donated or accruing to or in the name of the
13 Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation after July 1, 2014,
14 shall be transferred to the Commission for Educational Quality and
15 Accountability. Any other monies from appropriations, fees,
16 licenses, fines, penalties, or other similar types of monies that
17 accrue in any funds or accounts after July 1, 2014, in the name of
18 the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation or maintained for
19 the benefit of the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation are
20 transferred to the Commission.

21 E. The Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability
22 shall succeed to any contractual rights and responsibilities
23 incurred by the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation.

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1 F. The rules of the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation
2 that are in effect on July 1, 2014, shall be enforceable by the
3 Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability until the
4 Commission establishes rules.

5 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-116, is
6 amended to read as follows:

7 Section 3-116. A. ~~There~~ Until July 1, 2013, there is hereby
8 created the Education Oversight Board. The membership of the
9 Education Oversight Board shall consist of:

10 1. The Chairperson of the Education Committee of the Oklahoma
11 House of Representatives;

12 2. The Chairperson of the Education Committee of the Senate;

13 3. Two members, who are not legislators, appointed by the
14 Governor;

15 4. Two members, who are not legislators, appointed by the
16 Speaker of the Oklahoma House of Representatives;

17 5. Two members, who are not legislators, appointed by the
18 President Pro Tempore of the Senate; and

19 6. One member, who is not a legislator, appointed jointly by
20 the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Speaker of the House
21 of Representatives.

22 The two Education Committee Chairpersons shall serve as
23 nonvoting members of the Board as long as each holds that position

1 in such chairperson's respective house. The terms of the appointed
2 members shall be staggered. The terms of the seven appointed
3 members shall begin on July 1 of the year the preceding term
4 expires. All terms shall be for five (5) years. At least one
5 appointed member must reside in each congressional district.
6 However, when congressional districts are redrawn each member
7 appointed prior to July 1 of the year in which such modification
8 becomes effective shall complete the current term of office and
9 appointments made after July 1 of the year in which such
10 modification becomes effective shall be based on the redrawn
11 districts. Appointments made after July 1 of the year in which such
12 modification becomes effective shall be from any redrawn districts
13 which are not represented by a board member until such time as each
14 of the modified congressional districts are represented by a board
15 member. If a vacancy occurs, the vacancy shall be filled for the
16 unexpired term in the same manner as the office was previously
17 filled.

18 B. A chairperson and vice-chairperson shall be elected annually
19 from the membership of the Board. A quorum which shall consist of
20 four voting members must be present for the transaction of any
21 business. Members shall be reimbursed for travel in the performance
22 of their official duties in accordance with the State Travel
23 Reimbursement Act.

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1 C. ~~The~~ Until July 1, 2013, the Education Oversight Board shall:

2 1. Oversee implementation of the provisions of Enrolled House
3 Bill No. 1017 of the 1st Extraordinary Session of the 42nd Oklahoma
4 Legislature;

5 2. Oversee implementation of the provisions of the Oklahoma
6 Teacher Preparation Act; and

7 3. Make recommendations to the Governor and Legislature on
8 methods to achieve an aligned, seamless system from preschool
9 through postsecondary education.

10 D. ~~The~~ Until July 1, 2013, the Education Oversight Board shall
11 govern the operation of the Office of Educational Quality and
12 Accountability created in Section 3-117 of this title. The
13 Secretary of Education shall be the chief executive officer of the
14 Office of Accountability.

15 E. Legislators and appointed members who serve on the Education
16 Oversight Board shall be exempt from the dual office holding
17 prohibitions of Section 6 of Title 51 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

18 F. On July 1, 2013, the terms of the members of the Education
19 Oversight Board shall terminate and the powers and duties of the
20 Board shall be assumed by the Commission for Educational Quality and
21 Accountability as provided for in Section 1 of this act.

22 SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-117, is
23 amended to read as follows:

1 Section 3-117. There is hereby created the Office of
2 Educational Quality and Accountability. ~~The Oklahoma State Regents~~
3 ~~for Higher Education are hereby directed to support the Office of~~
4 ~~Accountability from the budget of the State Regents. The State~~
5 ~~Regents shall include the Office of Accountability in its budget~~
6 ~~work program to be submitted each fiscal year for the succeeding~~
7 ~~fiscal year to the Office of State Finance. Each year the Education~~
8 ~~Oversight Board shall submit a program budget for the Office of~~
9 ~~Accountability to the State Regents. Any amendments to the Office~~
10 ~~of Accountability program budget must first be approved by the~~
11 ~~Education Oversight Board. The Office of Educational Quality and~~
12 ~~Accountability, its personnel, budget, and expenditure of funds~~
13 ~~shall be solely under the direction of the Education Oversight Board~~
14 ~~Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability. The~~
15 ~~Commission shall demonstrate a savings of fifteen percent (15%) by~~
16 ~~merging the former Office of Accountability into the Office of~~
17 ~~Educational Quality and Accountability.~~

18 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-118, is
19 amended to read as follows:

20 Section 3-118. The Secretary of Education shall:

21 1. Oversee the Office of Educational Quality and
22 Accountability;

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1 2. Employ necessary personnel according to procedures
2 established for the employment of personnel by the Office of
3 Personnel Management;

4 3. Monitor the efforts of the public school districts to comply
5 with the provisions of this act and of Enrolled Senate Bill No. 183
6 of the 1st Session of the 42nd Oklahoma Legislature which relate to
7 common education;

8 4. Identify districts not making satisfactory progress toward
9 compliance with ~~said~~ the provisions and recommend appropriate
10 corrective actions to the State Board of Education concerning each
11 district so identified;

12 5. Have executive responsibility for the Oklahoma Educational
13 Indicators Program and the annual report required pursuant to
14 Section 1210.531 of this title;

15 6. Review and make periodic public comment on the progress and
16 effectiveness of the State Board and State Department of Education,
17 the Office of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, other
18 bodies created by this act, and the public schools of this state
19 concerning the implementation of the provisions of this act and of
20 Enrolled Senate Bill No. 183 of the 1st Session of the 42nd Oklahoma
21 Legislature which relate to common education;

22 7. Analyze the revenues for all systems of education and the
23 expenditure of common education revenue, giving close attention to
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1 expenditures for administrative expenses relating to the common
2 schools;

3 8. Make reports to the public concerning these matters whenever
4 appropriate; and

5 9. Submit recommendations regarding funding for education or
6 statutory changes to the Speaker of the House of Representatives,
7 the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and the Governor whenever
8 appropriate.

9 SECTION 7. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 3-118.1, is
10 amended to read as follows:

11 Section 3-118.1 A. The Office of Educational Quality and
12 Accountability is hereby authorized to conduct a performance review
13 program to determine the effectiveness and efficiency of the budget
14 and operations of school districts that have:

15 1. Administrative service costs which are above the expenditure
16 limits established for school districts in Section 18-124 of this
17 title or have total expenditures in excess of the district's adopted
18 budget;

19 2. A district Academic Performance Index (API) score,
20 calculated pursuant to Section 3-150 of this title, that is below
21 the state average API;

22 3. Had a request for a performance review submitted by the
23 Governor or the State Superintendent of Public Instruction;

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1 4. A district student eligibility rate for free or reduced-
2 price meals under the National School Lunch Act that is above the
3 state average; or

4 5. Submitted a request for a performance review subsequent to a
5 majority vote of the district's board of education.

6 B. Funds appropriated by the Legislature to the ~~State Regents~~
7 ~~for Higher Education for the~~ Office of Educational Quality and
8 Accountability may be expended to fulfill the provisions of this
9 section. The Office of Educational Quality and Accountability may
10 contract with an outside entity or hire personnel to assist in the
11 development and design of the program. The Office of Educational
12 Quality and Accountability may contract with outside entities to
13 assist in conducting performance review programs. Such entities
14 shall be chosen through a competitive bid process. Invitations to
15 bid for the performance reviews shall be open to any public or
16 private entity. Contracts for performance reviews shall not be done
17 on a sole source basis.

18 C. 1. If a performance review is conducted as authorized
19 pursuant to paragraphs 1 through 4 of subsection A of this section,
20 the entire cost of the review shall be borne by the Office of
21 Educational Quality and Accountability.

22 2. If a school district requests a performance review, as
23 authorized pursuant to paragraph 5 of subsection A of this section,
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1 twenty-five percent (25%) of the entire cost of the review shall be
2 borne by the school district and seventy-five percent (75%) of the
3 cost of the review shall be borne by the Office of Educational
4 Quality and Accountability.

5 3. Districts shall be selected for review by the Commission for
6 ~~Education Oversight Board~~ Educational Quality and Accountability
7 contingent upon the availability of funding.

8 D. The Office of Educational Quality and Accountability shall
9 engage in follow-up, outreach and technical assistance to help
10 school districts and others understand, interpret, and apply the
11 recommendations and best practices resulting from performance
12 reviews conducted pursuant to this section.

13 E. After a performance review of a school district is completed
14 by the Office of Educational Quality and Accountability, the school
15 district may implement all or part of the recommendations contained
16 in the review.

17 F. If a school district experiences a cost savings that is
18 directly attributable to implementation of performance review
19 recommendations, the cost savings shall be expended by the school
20 district for classroom expenses. Classroom expenses shall include
21 but are not limited to teacher salaries and purchasing textbooks,
22 teaching material, technology and other classroom equipment.
23 Classroom expenditures shall not include administrative services as
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1 defined in Section 18-124 of this title or for equipment or
2 materials for administrative staff.

3 SECTION 8. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 6-182, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 Section 6-182. As used in the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act:

6 1. "Board" means the State Board of Education;

7 2. "Commission" means the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher
8 Preparation until July 1, 2014, and beginning July 1, 2014, means
9 the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability;

10 3. "State Regents" means the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher
11 Education;

12 4. "Licensed teacher" means any person who holds a valid
13 license to teach, issued by the Board in accordance with the
14 Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act and the rules of the Board;

15 5. "Professional development program" means the program
16 mandated by the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act for the continuous
17 improvement and enrichment of the certified and licensed teachers of
18 this state;

19 6. "Teacher education professional development committee" means
20 the committee created in Section 6-186 of this title for the
21 continuous improvement and enrichment of higher education faculty in
22 teacher education programs in institutions of higher education;

23 7. "Department" means the State Department of Education;

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1 8. "Residency committee" means a committee in a school district
2 for the purpose of reviewing the teaching performance of a resident
3 teacher and making recommendations to the Board and the preparing
4 institution of higher education regarding certification of the
5 resident teacher. A residency committee shall consist of a mentor
6 teacher, the principal or an assistant principal of the employing
7 school or an administrator designated by the district board and a
8 teacher educator in a college or school of education of an
9 institution of higher education, or an educator in a department or
10 school outside the institution's teacher education unit. Provided
11 that, if available, qualified mentor teachers shall have expertise
12 in the teaching field of the resident teacher and, if possible, the
13 higher education members of the residency committee shall have
14 expertise and experience in the teaching field of the resident
15 teacher. However, in all cases, at least one member of the
16 residency committee shall have expertise and experience in the
17 teaching field of the resident teacher;

18 9. "Teacher" means a person defined as a teacher in Section 1-
19 116 of this title;

20 10. "Resident teacher" means any licensed teacher who is
21 employed in an accredited school to serve as a teacher under the
22 guidance and assistance of a mentor teacher and residency committee.
23 The resident teacher shall have completed the program of the college
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1 or school of education of the accredited institution of higher
2 education from which the person has been graduated, and shall have
3 successfully completed the competency examination in areas of
4 approval in which the resident teacher seeks certification;

5 11. "Certified teacher" means any teacher who has been issued a
6 certificate by the Board in accordance with the Oklahoma Teacher
7 Preparation Act and the rules of the Board;

8 12. "Mentor teacher" means any teacher holding a standard
9 certificate who is employed in a school district to serve as a
10 teacher and who has been appointed to provide guidance and
11 assistance to a resident teacher employed by the school district. A
12 mentor teacher shall be a classroom teacher and have a minimum of
13 two (2) years of classroom teaching experience as a certified
14 teacher.

15 A mentor teacher shall be selected by the principal from a list
16 of qualified teacher volunteers who have submitted their names for
17 that purpose. After compilation of the list, the principal shall
18 provide opportunity for input from the bargaining agent, where one
19 exists. Membership or nonmembership in a professional teacher
20 organization shall not be considered as a factor in selecting a
21 mentor teacher. No teacher may serve as a mentor teacher for more
22 than one resident teacher at a time. When possible, a mentor
23 teacher shall have successfully completed a mentor teacher

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1 professional development institute and be assigned to the same
2 school site and have similar certification as the resident teacher;

3 13. "Higher education faculty" means any individual who is
4 employed in a teaching capacity in an institution of higher
5 education, approved or accredited by the Commission for the
6 preparation of education personnel; and

7 14. "Competency examination" means the assessment required in
8 the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act for licensure and certification
9 as a teacher and shall consist of tests over general education,
10 professional education and subject areas as defined by the Oklahoma
11 Commission for Teacher Preparation until July 1, 2014, and beginning
12 July 1, 2014, as defined by the Commission for Educational Quality
13 and Accountability.

14 SECTION 9. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 6-184, is
15 amended to read as follows:

16 Section 6-184. A. Beginning July 1, 1997 through July 1, 2014,
17 the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation shall have authority
18 for approval and accreditation of teacher education programs and for
19 assessment of candidates for licensure and certification according
20 to the provisions of the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act. As part
21 of this duty the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation shall:

22 1. Include the State Board of Education in the process;

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1 2. Review and assess approved, accredited and new programs of
2 teacher education; and

3 3. Encourage studies and research designed to improve teacher
4 education.

5 ~~From July 1, 1995, to July 1, 1997, the State Board of Education~~
6 ~~shall have the authority to approve and accredit teacher education~~
7 ~~programs. During such time the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher~~
8 ~~Preparation shall be included in the process.~~

9 Before B. Until July 1, 2014, before adopting any rule
10 pertaining to approval or accreditation of teacher education
11 programs or assessment of candidates for licensure and
12 certification, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation shall
13 solicit comments from the State Board of Education, the Oklahoma
14 State Regents for Higher Education and the State Board of Career and
15 Technology Education on the proposed rule. Within forty-five (45)
16 days of the receipt of the proposed rule from the Oklahoma
17 Commission for Teacher Preparation, the State Board of Education,
18 the State Regents and the State Board of Career and Technology
19 Education shall separately review the proposed rule and return their
20 recommendations to the Commission on the proposed adoption. Each
21 recommendation shall include the rationale for the recommendation.
22 The Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation shall accord the
23 recommendations due deliberation in its subsequent consideration of

1 the adoption of each proposed rule. If the action of the Commission
2 on a proposed rule is not consistent with the recommendation made by
3 any of the reviewing entities, within ten (10) days of the Oklahoma
4 Commission for Teacher Preparation's formal action on the rule, the
5 Commission shall submit a report providing justification for its
6 actions to the ~~Education Oversight Board~~ Commission for Educational
7 Quality and Accountability.

8 ~~B. The~~ C. Until July 1, 2014, the State Board of Education,
9 the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and the State Board
10 of Career and Technology Education shall also have authority to
11 recommend to the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation rules
12 for teacher education program approval and accreditation and rules
13 for teacher assessment. Any such rule recommended shall be
14 considered by the Commission within sixty (60) days of receipt of
15 the rule by the same process provided in subsection A of this
16 section for rules proposed by the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher
17 Preparation.

18 ~~C. Before~~ D. Until July 1, 2014, before adopting any rule
19 pertaining to teacher licensure and certification, residency or
20 professional development, the State Board of Education shall solicit
21 comments from the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation, the
22 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and the State Board of
23 Career and Technology Education on the proposed rule. Within forty-

1 five (45) days of the receipt of a proposed rule from the State
2 Board of Education, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation,
3 the State Regents and the State Board of Career and Technology
4 Education shall separately review the proposed rule and return their
5 recommendations to the Board on the proposed adoption. Each
6 recommendation shall include the rationale for the recommendation.
7 The State Board of Education shall accord the recommendations due
8 deliberation in its subsequent consideration of the adoption of each
9 rule. If the action of the State Board of Education on a proposed
10 rule is not consistent with the recommendation made by any of the
11 reviewing entities, within ten (10) days of the State Board of
12 Education's formal action on the rule, the State Board of Education
13 shall submit a report providing justification for its action to the
14 Education Oversight Board.

15 ~~D.~~ E. Until July 1, 2014, the Oklahoma Commission for
16 Teacher Preparation, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education
17 and the State Board of Career and Technology Education shall have
18 authority to recommend to the State Board of Education rules for
19 adoption in the areas of teacher licensure and certification,
20 residency and professional development. Any such rule recommended
21 shall be considered by the State Board of Education within sixty
22 (60) days of the receipt of the rule by the same process provided in
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1 subsection C of this section for rules proposed by the State Board
2 of Education.

3 F. Beginning July 1, 2014, the State Board of Education, the
4 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and the State Board of

8 Educational Quality and Accountability. All proposed rules shall be
9 considered by the Commission within sixty (60) days of receipt of
10 the proposed rule. The proposed rules shall be considered by the
11 Commission in the same process provided in subsection B of this
12 section for rules proposed by the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher
13 Preparation.

14 G. Beginning July 1, 2014, before adopting any rule pertaining
15 to teacher leadership and effectiveness or professional development,
16 the State Board of Education shall solicit comments from the
17 Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability, the Oklahoma
18 State Regents for Higher Education and the State Board of Career and
19 Technology Education on the proposed rule. Within forty-five (45)
20 days of the receipt of a proposed rule from the State Board of
21 Education, the Commission for Educational Quality and

9 k. skills in effective classroom management and student
10 discipline;

11 2. The preservice program shall include the following methods
12 to achieve the competencies listed in paragraph 1 of this

17 candidates to have undergraduate majors, or their
18 equivalents, in a subject area, and require teacher

- g. structure courses so as to require teamwork activities, and
- h. require teacher candidates to study, in existing coursework, substance abuse symptoms identification and prevention, mental illness symptoms identification and mental health issues, classroom management skills, and classroom safety and discipline techniques;

3. ~~The~~ Until July 1, 2014, the Oklahoma Commission for Teacher Preparation and beginning July 1, 2014, the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability shall not require more than a four-year program of one hundred twenty-four (124) semester hours to complete a teacher education degree. ~~Provided, any program approved by the State Board of Education prior to July 1, 1995, which~~

1 ~~requires more hours may continue to require such hours. Any program~~
2 ~~approved prior to July 1, 1995, which requires more than one hundred~~
3 ~~twenty-four (124) semester hours for a teacher education degree~~
4 ~~shall implement requirements for this program without additional~~
5 ~~hours.~~

6 B. It is the intent of the Legislature that institutions of
7 higher education which offer teacher education programs hold such
8 programs accountable for meeting the licensure and certification
9 competencies approved by the State Board of Education. It is the
10 intent of the Legislature that the teacher education programs
11 incorporate a curriculum to achieve the competency-based system and
12 include integration of the teacher preparation curricula with the
13 arts and sciences departments curricula. Each institution of higher
14 education which seeks accreditation or approval for its teacher
15 education program shall develop an institution plan which follows
16 the State Board of Education competencies for licensure and
17 certification. In developing such institution plans, the higher
18 education institution shall establish a process which seeks
19 information and input from teacher preparation faculty, faculty from

6 is solicited and received. The institution's plan shall be
7 accessible to any interested party under the Oklahoma Open Records

9 shall be approved by the Commission unless the institution plan has
10 been approved by that institution's governing board. ~~Initial~~
11 ~~institution plans shall be filed with the Oklahoma Commission for~~
12 ~~Teacher Preparation by January 1, 1997, and as required by the~~
13 ~~Commission thereafter.~~ The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher
14 Education may facilitate the development of institution plans to
15 assist institutions of higher education.

16 SECTION 11. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 6-187, is

9 may be certified in early childhood education upon meeting the

17 leaders, and principals,

18 b. a three-day follow-up professional development
19 institute in elementary school reading for teachers of
20 kindergarten through third grade and instructional

22 c. continued support through ongoing teacher development

4 2. In order to qualify for a grant pursuant to this subsection,
5 the following requirements shall be met:

- 6 a. at least eighty percent (80%) of the teachers of

8 have demonstrated support for the training program
9 provided pursuant to this subsection,
- 10 b. the principal shall ensure that all members of the
11 leadership team and all teachers of kindergarten
12 through third grade will participate in all phases of

- 18 d. the school district shall employ a literacy resource

13 SECTION 13. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.508,
14 is amended to read as follows:

15 Section 1210.508 A. 1. The State Board of Education shall
16 develop and administer a series of criterion-referenced tests
17 designed to indicate whether the state academic content standards,
18 as defined by the State Board of Education in the Priority Academic
19 Student Skills Curriculum, which Oklahoma public school students are
20 expected to have attained have been achieved. The Board may develop
21 and administer any criterion-referenced test in any subject not
22 required by federal law, contingent upon the availability of
23 funding. Students who do not perform at least at the proficient
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1 level on tests shall be remediated, subject to the availability of
2 funding.

3 2. Contingent upon the availability of state and federal funds,
4 the Board, in accordance with federal law, shall administer
5 criterion-referenced tests for grades three and four in:

- 6 a. reading, and
- 7 b. mathematics.

8 3. Contingent upon the availability of funds, the Board shall
9 administer criterion-referenced tests for grade five in:

- 10 a. reading,
- 11 b. mathematics,
- 12 c. science,
- 13 d. social studies, which shall consist of the history,
14 Constitution and government of the United States, and
15 geography, and
- 16 e. writing of English.

17 4. Contingent upon the availability of state and federal funds,
18 the Board, in accordance with federal law, shall administer
19 criterion-referenced tests for grades six and seven in:

- 20 a. reading, and
- 21 b. mathematics.

22 In addition, the Board shall administer a criterion-referenced
23 test in geography in grade seven.

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1 5. Contingent upon the availability of funds, the Board shall
2 administer criterion-referenced tests for grade eight in:

- 3 a. reading,
- 4 b. mathematics,
- 5 c. science,
- 6 d. social studies, which shall consist of the history,
7 Constitution, and government of the United States, and
- 8 e. writing of English.

9 The Board shall administer the tests for grade eight in reading
10 and mathematics online with raw score test results reported
11 immediately and complete results reported in less than two (2) weeks
12 beginning in the 2007-08 school year.

13 6. Each student who completes the instruction for English II,
14 English III, United States History, Biology I, Algebra I, Geometry,
15 and Algebra II at the secondary level shall complete an end-of-
16 instruction test, when implemented, to measure for attainment in the
17 appropriate state academic content standards in order to graduate
18 from a public high school with a standard diploma. All students
19 shall take the tests prior to graduation, unless otherwise exempt by
20 law. The State Board of Education shall administer the criterion-
21 referenced tests. The Board shall develop and field test the end-
22 of-instruction tests in English III, Geometry, and Algebra II during
23 the 2006-07 school year, implement the tests during the 2007-08

1 school year, and administer them each year thereafter. The Board
2 shall administer the multiple choice portion of the end-of-
3 instruction tests online with raw score test results reported
4 immediately and complete results reported in less than two (2) weeks
5 beginning in the 2008-09 school year.

6 The end-of-instruction tests shall serve the purpose of the
7 criterion-referenced tests as provided in paragraph 1 of this
8 subsection. The English II and English III end-of-instruction tests
9 shall include a writing component. Students who do not score at
10 least at the proficient level shall be afforded the opportunity to
11 retake each test up to three (3) times each calendar year until at
12 least achieving at the proficient level. In order to provide an
13 indication of the levels of competency attained by the student in a
14 permanent record for potential future employers and institutions of
15 higher education, for students who enter the ninth grade in or prior
16 to the 2007-08 school year, school districts shall report the
17 highest achieved state test performance level on the end-of-
18 instruction tests on the student's high school transcript.
19 Beginning with students who enter the ninth grade in the 2008-09
20 school year, school districts shall report the student's performance
21 levels on the end-of-instruction tests and any business and
22 industry-recognized endorsements attained on the student's high

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1 completes the instruction in a secondary course specified in this
2 paragraph shall be administered the appropriate end-of-instruction
3 test.

4 7. a. Each school district shall administer to each student
5 in the school district in grades three through eight
6 an assessment designed to assess the student in the
7 fine arts area in which the student has received
8 instruction.

9 b. Each school district shall prepare an annual report
10 for approval by the State Board of Education outlining
11 the fine arts assessment strategies used by the
12 district, when the assessments were administered, how
13 many students were assessed during the previous year,
14 and the results of the assessments.

15 B. 1. All criterion-referenced tests required by this section
16 shall measure academic competencies in correlation with the state
17 academic content standards adopted by the Board pursuant to Section
18 11-103.6 of this title and known as the Priority Academic Student
19 Skills Curriculum. The State Board of Education shall evaluate the
20 academic content standards to ensure the competencies reflect high
21 standards, are specific, well-defined, measurable, challenging, and
22 will prepare elementary students for next-grade-level course work
23 and secondary students for postsecondary studies at institutions of
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1 higher education or technology center schools without the need for
2 remediation in core curriculum areas. All state academic content
3 standards shall reflect the benchmarks of the American Diploma
4 Project and the goal of improving the state average ACT score.

5 2. The State Department of Education shall annually evaluate
6 the results of the criterion-referenced tests. The State Board of
7 Education shall ensure that test results are reported to districts
8 in a manner that yields detailed, diagnostic information for the
9 purpose of guiding instruction and student remediation. As
10 improvements are made to the criterion-referenced tests required by
11 this section, the Board shall seek to increase the depth of
12 knowledge assessed for each subject. The State Board of Education
13 shall seek to ensure that data yielded from the tests required in
14 this section are utilized at the school district level to prescribe
15 reinforcement and/or remediation by requiring school districts to
16 develop and implement a specific program of improvement based on the
17 test results.

18 3. The State Board of Education in coordination with the Office
19 of Educational Quality and Accountability Board shall review,
20 realign, and recalibrate, as necessary, the tests in reading and
21 mathematics in third through eighth grade and the end-of-instruction
22 tests. The ~~State Board of Education~~ Commission for Educational
23 Quality and Accountability shall determine the cut scores for the

1 performance levels on the end-of-instruction tests developed
2 pursuant to paragraph 6 of subsection A of this section, ~~which shall~~
3 ~~be phased in over a multi-year period.~~ The ~~State Board of Education~~
4 Commission shall conduct an ongoing review to compare the end-of-
5 instruction test content and performance descriptors with those of
6 other states. Upon receipt of the review, the ~~State Board of~~
7 ~~Education~~ Commission may adjust the cut scores as necessary.

8 4. The State Board of Education, for the purposes of conducting
9 reliability and validity studies, monitoring contractor adherence to
10 professionally accepted testing standards, and providing
11 recommendations for testing program improvement, shall retain the
12 services of an established, independent agency or organization that
13 is nationally recognized for its technical expertise in educational
14 testing but is not engaged in the development of aptitude or
15 achievement tests for elementary or secondary level grades. These
16 national assessment experts shall annually conduct studies of the
17 reliability and validity of the end-of-instruction tests
18 administered pursuant to this section. Validity studies shall
19 include studies of decision validity, and concurrent validity ~~and~~
20 ~~the validity of performance level cut scores.~~

21 C. 1. The State Board of Education shall set the testing
22 window dates for each criterion-referenced test required in
23 paragraphs 1 through 5 of subsection A of this section for grades
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1 three through eight so that, with the exception of the writing
2 assessments, the tests are administered to students no earlier than
3 April 10 each year and so that the test results are reported back to
4 school districts in a timely manner. Each criterion-referenced test
5 required in paragraph 6 of subsection A of this section may be
6 administered to students at a time set by the State Board of
7 Education as near as possible to the end of the course; provided, if
8 a school district is unable to administer the tests online to all
9 students taking the test for the first time and all students
10 retaking the test during the testing window time set by the Board,
11 the school district may elect to administer any of the tests to
12 students retaking the test at any time not more than two (2) weeks
13 prior to the start of the testing window time set by the Board. All
14 results and reports of the criterion-referenced test series required
15 in paragraphs 1 through 5 of subsection A of this section for grades
16 three through eight shall be returned to each school district prior
17 to the beginning of the next school year. The vendor shall provide
18 a final electronic data file of all school site, school district,
19 and state results to the State Department of Education and the
20 Office of Educational Quality and Accountability prior to September
21 1 of each year. The Department shall forward the final data files
22 for each school district and each school site in that district to
23 the school district. The Board shall ensure the contract with the

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1 testing vendor includes a provision that the vendor report test
2 results directly to the Office of Educational Quality and
3 Accountability at the same time it is reported to the Board.

4 2. State, district, and site level results of all tests
5 required in this section shall be disaggregated by gender, race
6 ethnicity, disability status, migrant status, English proficiency,
7 and status as economically disadvantaged, except that such
8 disaggregation shall not be required in a case in which the number
9 of students in a category is insufficient to yield statistically
10 reliable information or the results would reveal personally
11 identifiable information about an individual student. Each school
12 site shall notify the student's parents of the school's performance
13 levels in the Oklahoma School Testing Program as reported in the
14 Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program at the end of each school
15 year.

16 D. The State Board of Education shall be responsible for the
17 development, field-testing, and validation of the criterion-
18 referenced test series required in subsection A of this section. In
19 the interest of economy the Board shall adapt criterion-referenced
20 tests that have been developed by or in collaboration with other
21 states or are otherwise commercially available, or portions of such
22 tests, to the extent that such tests are appropriate for use in the
23 testing program to be administered to Oklahoma students.

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1 E. The State Board of Education shall develop, administer, and
2 incorporate as a part of the Oklahoma School Testing Program, other
3 testing programs or procedures, including appropriate accommodations
4 for the testing of students with disabilities as required by the

3 B. The Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program shall present
4 information for comparisons of graduation rates, dropout rates,
5 pupil-teacher ratios, student enrollment gain and loss rates, and
6 test results in the contexts of socioeconomic status and the
7 finances of school districts. Information shall be provided
8 individually for all public school sites and school districts in a
9 format that facilitates comparisons. As necessary data become
10 available, comparisons shall also be provided individually for all
11 schools and school districts on a historical basis. Reports of all
12 tests administered pursuant to the Oklahoma School Testing Program
13 Act, ~~Section 1210.505 et seq. of this title,~~ shall be a part of the
14 Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program and shall be provided for
15 each grade and each test subject or set of competencies. Test
16 results for students enrolled in Internet-based courses, including

18 are labeled and defined as follows:

19 1. Advanced, which shall indicate that students demonstrate
20 superior performance on challenging subject matter;

21 2. Proficient, which shall indicate that students demonstrate
22 mastery over appropriate grade-level subject matter and that
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1 students are ready for the next grade, course, or level of
2 education, as applicable;

3 3. Limited knowledge, which shall indicate that students
4 demonstrate partial mastery of the essential knowledge and skills
5 appropriate to their grade level or course; and

6 4. Unsatisfactory, which shall indicate that students have not
7 performed at least at the limited knowledge level.

8 D. The State Board of Education shall develop and implement in
9 accordance with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 2001
10 (ESEA), P.L. No. 107-110, also known as the No Child Left Behind Act
11 of 2001, an accountability system as provided for in 20 U.S.C., 6311
12 and any related federal regulations. The accountability system
13 shall be implemented beginning with the 2002-2003 school year and
14 shall be based on the Academic Performance Index data as established
15 pursuant to Section 3-150 of this title and as modified to meet the
16 mandates of the ESEA. For the 2002-2003 school year and every year
17 thereafter the State Board of Education shall publish and ensure
