**HB 1010** by McDaniel (Randy) of the House and Mazzei of the Senate was read and considered.

Representative Inman moved to amend **HB 1010** by inserting a new Section 3 to read as follows, and by renumbering subsequent section:

“SECTION 3.

- A. The Uniform Retirement System for Justices and Judges shall not use an actuarial assumption for any cost-of-living adjustment in its annual actuarial valuation.
- B. The Uniform Retirement System for Justices and Judges shall use an assumed rate of return on system assets consistent with its past actuarial assumptions and consistent with recommendations of its actuary.
- C. The Legislature shall provide funding to the Uniform Retirement System for Justices and Judges from the General Revenue Fund or from such other sources as may be required each year for a period of ten (10) consecutive years beginning with the fiscal year which begins July 1, 2011, in order for the Uniform Retirement System for Justices and Judges to have a funded status equal to or greater than eighty percent (80%) at the end of the ten-year period.”.
