Research Analysis

Engrossed SB1793 removes the requirement that the emblem on the state flag of Oklahoma be a part of all license plates issued. The act further provides that any special license plate issued before January 1, 2004 may be reissued if five hundred (500) or more applications were received during the calendar year 2013. For special license plates authorized after January 1, 2004 the Oklahoma Tax Commission shall initiate a reissue of the special license plate ten (10) years after the date of authorization if five hundred (500) or more applications were received during the preceding year.

The bill further eliminates (1) Civilian Conservation Corps License Plates, (2) Humane Society License Plates, (3) Oklahoma Aquarium License Plates, (4) Pride of Broken Arrow License Plates, (5) Fellowship of Christian Athletes License Plates, (6) Parrothead Club License Plates, (7) Electric Lineman License Plates, (8) National Pan Hellenic Council Incorporated License Plates, (9) Central Oklahoma Habitat for Humanity License Plate, (10) Family Career and Community Leaders of America Incorporated License Plates, (11) 50th Anniversary of the Interstate System of Highways License Plate, (12) Sigma Gamma Rho License Plates, (13) Make A Wish Foundation License Plates, (14) South Central Section PGA Foundation License Plate, (15) Putnam City High School License Plates, (16) Star Spencer High School License Plates, (17) Historic Greenwood District License Plates, (18) Oklahoma Rifle Association License Plates, (19) Girl Scouts of the United States of America Supporter License Plates, (20) Oklahoma City Memorial Marathon License Plates, (21) Oklahoma Scenic Rivers License Plate, (22) Fight Cancer License Plates, (23) Oklahoma Association for the Deaf License Plates, (24) Oklahoma City Zoo License Plates, (25) Folds of Honor supporter License Plate, (26) Downed Bikers Association License Plates, (27) Armed forces Veterans Motorcycle License Plates, (28) Prevent Blindness Oklahoma License Plates, (29) Oklahoma State Capitol Restoration License Plates, and (30) Eastern Red Cedar Tree License Plates.

Fiscal Analysis

Section 2 of the bill proposes new law directing the Administrator of the Tax Commission to initiate a reissue of special license plates first authorized before January 1, 2004 and provided for in Sections 1135.3 (persons wishing to demonstrate support, interest, or membership to or for an organization, occupation, cause or other subject) and 1135.5 (persons wishing to demonstrate support and provide financial assistance) of the Oklahoma Statutes, if 500 or more applications for the plate were received by the Tax Commission during calendar year 2013.

Section 2 further proposes that for any special license plate first authorized after January 1, 2004 and also provided for in Sections 1135.3 and 1135.5 of the Oklahoma Statutes the Administrator of the Oklahoma Tax Commission shall initiate a reissue of such special license plates ten years after the date of first authorization, if 500 or more applications for the plate were received by the Tax Commission during the preceding calendar year.

Any special license plate not reissued pursuant to the provisions of this proposed new law shall no longer be available after the reissue period. Any special license plate which is reissued pursuant to the provisions of this proposed new law shall be redesigned to include a distinguishing feature which clearly signifies that the plate has been reissued but does not interfere with the original design or logo of the special plate. In conjunction with the reissue the OTC and OCI may utilize an alternative method of license plate inventory management.

Sections 3 and 4 of the bill propose to amend 47 O.S. §§ 1135.3, 1135.5 respectively by removing statutory authorization for certain special license plates.

The Tax Commission has determined the provisions of the measure will result in \$0 change in revenue certification and its general effects on revenue and administrative costs will be minimal.
