

1 SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law not to be
2 codified in the Oklahoma Statutes reads as follows:

3 The Legislature finds that:

4 1. The first ten amendments to the Constitution of the United
5 States is commonly referred to as the Bill of Rights;

6 2. The Bill of Rights is the single most powerful and
7 successful assertion of individual rights and liberties ever
8 written; and

9 3. The Bill of Rights is one of history's most important and
10 influential documents, with an ingenious balance of personal
11 freedoms and political principles, that has proven dynamic and
12 durable becoming the global road map for human rights and the basic
13 demand of people everywhere seeking freedom from oppression.

14 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
15 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 4110.1 of Title 74, unless there
16 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

17 A. This section shall be known and may be cited as the "Bill of
18 Rights Monument Display Act".

19 B. The State Capitol Preservation Commission or designee is
20 hereby authorized to permit and arrange for the placement on the
21 State Capitol grounds of a suitable monument displaying the first
22 ten amendments to the Constitution of the United States, commonly
23 referred to as the Bill of Rights. This monument shall be designed,
24 constructed, and placed on the State Capitol grounds by private

1 entities at no expense to the state. The State Capitol Preservation
2 Commission or designee is authorized to assist private entities in
3 selecting a location for the monument and arranging a suitable time
4 for its placement.

5 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2014.
