1 providing for noncodification; and declaring an emergency. 2 3 4 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA: 6 NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified SECTION 1. 7 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 2355.1P-1 of Title 68, unless 8 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 9 Sections 1 through 9 of this act shall be known and may be cited 10 as the "Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019". 11 SECTION 2. A new section of law to be codified NEW LAW 12 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 2355.1P-2 of Title 68, unless 13 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 14 As used in this act: 15 "Distributive share" means a member's percentage share of 1. 16 Oklahoma net entity income or net entity loss; 17 "Electing pass-through entity" means any pass-through entity 2. 18 as defined in paragraph 6 of this section that has made an election 19 pursuant to subsection F of Section 4 of this act to pay income tax 20 as computed pursuant to Section 2358 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma 21 Statutes; 22 "Indirect member" means, with respect to any particular 3. 23 electing pass-through entity, an individual, fiduciary, or entity 24 that (i) owns an interest in a pass-through entity other than the

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electing pass-through entity and (ii) has been allocated items of Oklahoma income, gain, loss or deduction that the electing passthrough entity included in computing its tax pursuant to the provisions of the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019;

4. "Member" means any individual, fiduciary, or entity holding
an ownership interest in an electing pass-through entity;

5. "Oklahoma net entity income" or "Oklahoma net entity loss"
means the positive or negative sum of an electing pass-through
entity's items of Oklahoma income, gain, loss, and deduction
determined under Section 2351 et seq. of Title 68 of the Oklahoma
Statutes, regardless of whether any such items are required for
federal income tax purposes to be separately stated; and

6. "Pass-through entity" means a general partnership, a limited partnership, a limited liability partnership, a limited liability limited partnership, a limited liability company, or a corporation, if any of the enumerated entity's items of income, gain, loss, and deduction, as applicable, are subject to being included on another person's return for federal income tax purposes under Subchapter K or Subchapter S of the Internal Revenue Code.

SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 2355.1P-3 of Title 68, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: A. It is hereby declared to be the purpose of the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019 to establish a revenue-neutral

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1 mechanism to provide a more fair and simplified taxation of pass-2 through entities and their members in this state while maintaining 3 revenue levels for support of general governmental functions of the 4 State of Oklahoma.

5 B. All monies collected pursuant to the provisions of subsection A of Section 2358 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes 6 7 shall be apportioned in the same manner as provided in paragraph 1 of Section 2352 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes if the tax is 8 9 computed based upon a distribution made to one or more individuals, 10 trusts and estates and shall be apportioned in the same manner as 11 provided in paragraph 2 of Section 2352 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma 12 Statutes if the tax is computed based upon a distribution to a 13 corporation or to a pass-through entity as such term is defined in 14 Section 2 of this act.

15 SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 16 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 2355.1P-4 of Title 68, unless 17 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

18 A. For tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2019, there
19 is hereby levied on each electing pass-through entity the pass20 through entity tax which shall be calculated as follows:

21 1. With regard to each member of an electing pass-through 22 entity, the electing pass-through entity shall multiply such 23 member's Oklahoma distributive share of the electing pass-through 24 entity's Oklahoma net entity income for the tax year by:

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1	a.	the highest Oklahoma marginal income tax rate levied
2		on the taxable income of natural persons pursuant to
3		Section 2355 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes if
4		the member is an individual, trust, or estate,
5	b.	six percent (6%) if the member is classified as a
6		corporation pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code, and
7		is not classified as an S corporation,
8	с.	six percent (6%) if the member is a pass-through
9		entity,
10	d.	six percent (6%) if the member is a financial
11		institution subject to tax imposed pursuant to the
12		provisions of Section 2370 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma
13		Statutes, and
14	e.	the highest Oklahoma marginal income tax rate that
15		would be applicable to any item of the electing pass-
16		through entity's income or gain without the election
17		made pursuant to subsection F of this section, if the
18		member is an organization described in Section 2359 of
19		Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes; and
20	2. The e	lecting pass-through entity shall aggregate the amounts
21	determined wi	th respect to all members pursuant to paragraph 1 of
22	this subsecti	on and the pass-through entity tax for the applicable
23	tax year shal	l be equal to such aggregated tax amount for the tax
24	year with res	pect to which the election has been made.

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B. Sections 2385.29, 2385.30 and 2385.31 of Title 68 of the
 Oklahoma Statutes shall not be applicable to an electing pass through entity.

C. The pass-through entity tax shall be due and payable on the same date as provided for the filing of the electing pass-through entity's Oklahoma income tax return, and for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2020, estimated tax payments shall be required as provided in Section 2385.9 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

9 D. If the pass-through entity election results in a net entity 10 loss for Oklahoma income tax purposes in any tax year, the net 11 entity loss may be carried back and carried forward by the electing 12 pass-through entity for Oklahoma income tax purposes as set forth in 13 subparagraph b of paragraph 3 of subsection A of Section 2358 of 14 this title.

15 E. Notwithstanding paragraph 2 of subsection C of Section 2368 16 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes, a nonresident individual who 17 is a member of an electing pass-through entity is not required to 18 file an Oklahoma income tax return, if, for the taxable year, the 19 only source of income allocable or apportionable to this state for 20 the member, or, if a joint income tax return is filed, the member 21 and his or her spouse, is from one or more electing pass-through 22 entities, and each electing pass-through entity files and pays the 23 taxes due under this section.

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1 F. Any entity required to file an Oklahoma partnership income 2 tax return or an Oklahoma S corporation income tax return may elect 3 to become an electing pass-through entity. The election shall be 4 made on such form and in such manner as the Oklahoma Tax Commission 5 may prescribe, and any election under this subsection shall have priority over and revoke any election to file a composite Oklahoma 6 7 partnership return or requirement of a Subchapter S corporation to report and pay tax on behalf of a nonresident shareholder for the 8 9 same tax year.

G. Pursuant to procedures prescribed by the Tax Commission, if the amount of tax required to be paid by a pass-through entity pursuant to the provisions of this section is not paid when due, the Oklahoma Tax Commission may revoke the pass-through entity's election under subsection F of this section effective for the first year for which the tax is not paid.

16 The election authorized by the provisions of this section Η. 17 shall be made pursuant to procedures prescribed by the Tax 18 Commission and shall be filed (i) within sixty (60) days of 19 enactment and pursuant to procedures prescribed by the Oklahoma Tax 20 Commission for any income tax year beginning on or after January 1, 21 2019, and prior to January 1, 2020, or (ii) for any income tax year 22 beginning on or after January 1, 2020, at any time during the 23 preceding tax year or two (2) months and fifteen (15) days after the 24 beginning of the tax year. Any such election shall be binding until

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1 revoked pursuant to procedures prescribed by the Tax Commission. The effective date of a revocation (i) made within two (2) months 2 3 and fifteen (15) days of the electing pass-through entity's taxable 4 year shall be the first day of such taxable year and (ii) made 5 during the electing pass-through entity's taxable year but after such fifteenth day shall be effective on the first day of the 6 7 following taxable year. No election made by a pass-through entity with respect to income tax to be paid by such entity using the 8 9 calculations prescribed by this section shall be binding on any 10 other pass-through entity, and each pass-through entity shall be 11 able to make an election under the provisions of this act 12 independently.

SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 68 O.S. 2011, Section 2358, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 9, 2nd Extraordinary Session, O.S.L. 2018 (68 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 2358), is amended to read as follows:

Section 2358. For all tax years beginning after December 31, 18 1981, taxable income and adjusted gross income shall be adjusted to arrive at Oklahoma taxable income and Oklahoma adjusted gross income as required by this section.

A. The taxable income of any taxpayer shall be adjusted to arrive at Oklahoma taxable income for corporations and Oklahoma adjusted gross income for individuals, as follows:

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There shall be added interest income on obligations of any
 state or political subdivision thereto which is not otherwise
 exempted pursuant to other laws of this state, to the extent that
 such interest is not included in taxable income and adjusted gross
 income.

2. There shall be deducted amounts included in such income that
the state is prohibited from taxing because of the provisions of the
Federal Constitution, the State Constitution, federal laws or laws
of Oklahoma.

The amount of any federal net operating loss deduction shall
 be adjusted as follows:

12 a. For carryovers and carrybacks to taxable years 13 beginning before January 1, 1981, the amount of any 14 net operating loss deduction allowed to a taxpayer for 15 federal income tax purposes shall be reduced to an 16 amount which is the same portion thereof as the loss 17 from sources within this state, as determined pursuant 18 to this section and Section 2362 of this title, for 19 the taxable year in which such loss is sustained is of 20 the total loss for such year; 21 b. For carryovers and carrybacks to taxable years 22 beginning after December 31, 1980, the amount of any 23 net operating loss deduction allowed for the taxable

year shall be an amount equal to the aggregate of the

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Oklahoma net operating loss carryovers and carrybacks 1 2 to such year. Oklahoma net operating losses shall be 3 separately determined by reference to Section 172 of 4 the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C., Section 172, as 5 modified by the Oklahoma Income Tax Act, Section 2351 et seq. of this title, and shall be allowed without 6 7 regard to the existence of a federal net operating loss. For tax years beginning after December 31, 8 9 2000, and ending before January 1, 2008, the years to 10 which such losses may be carried shall be determined 11 solely by reference to Section 172 of the Internal 12 Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C., Section 172, with the 13 exception that the terms "net operating loss" and 14 "taxable income" shall be replaced with "Oklahoma net 15 operating loss" and "Oklahoma taxable income". For 16 tax years beginning after December 31, 2007, and 17 ending before January 1, 2009, years to which such 18 losses may be carried back shall be limited to two (2) 19 years. For tax years beginning after December 31, 20 2008, the years to which such losses may be carried 21 back shall be determined solely by reference to 22 Section 172 of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C., 23 Section 172, with the exception that the terms "net 24 operating loss" and "taxable income" shall be replaced 1 2 with "Oklahoma net operating loss" and "Oklahoma taxable income".

4. Items of the following nature shall be allocated as
indicated. Allowable deductions attributable to items separately
allocable in subparagraphs a, b and c of this paragraph, whether or
not such items of income were actually received, shall be allocated
on the same basis as those items:

- a. Income from real and tangible personal property, such
 as rents, oil and mining production or royalties, and
 gains or losses from sales of such property, shall be
 allocated in accordance with the situs of such
 property;
- b. Income from intangible personal property, such as
 interest, dividends, patent or copyright royalties,
 and gains or losses from sales of such property, shall
 be allocated in accordance with the domiciliary situs
 of the taxpayer, except that:
- (1) where such property has acquired a nonunitary
 business or commercial situs apart from the
 domicile of the taxpayer such income shall be
 allocated in accordance with such business or
 commercial situs; interest income from
 investments held to generate working capital for
 a unitary business enterprise shall be included

in apportionable income; a resident trust or resident estate shall be treated as having a separate commercial or business situs insofar as undistributed income is concerned, but shall not be treated as having a separate commercial or business situs insofar as distributed income is concerned,

(2) for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2003, capital or ordinary gains or losses from the sale of an ownership interest in a publicly traded partnership, as defined by Section 7704(b) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall be allocated to this state in the ratio of the original cost of such partnership's tangible property in this state to the original cost of such partnership's tangible property everywhere, as determined at the time of the sale; if more than fifty percent (50%) of the value of the partnership's assets consists of intangible assets, capital or ordinary gains or losses from the sale of an ownership interest in the partnership shall be allocated to this state in accordance with the sales factor of the partnership for its first full tax period

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1 immediately preceding its tax period during which the ownership interest in the partnership was sold; the provisions of this division shall only 3 apply if the capital or ordinary gains or losses 5 from the sale of an ownership interest in a 6 partnership do not constitute qualifying gain 7 receiving capital treatment as defined in subparagraph a of paragraph 2 of subsection F of 8 this section,

- 10 (3) income from such property which is required to be allocated pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 11 12 5 of this subsection shall be allocated as herein 13 provided;
- 14 с. Net income or loss from a business activity which is 15 not a part of business carried on within or without 16 the state of a unitary character shall be separately 17 allocated to the state in which such activity is 18 conducted;
- 19 d. In the case of a manufacturing or processing 20 enterprise the business of which in Oklahoma consists 21 solely of marketing its products by:
 - (1) sales having a situs without this state, shipped directly to a point from without the state to a

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1 purchaser within the state, commonly known as 2 interstate sales,

- (2) sales of the product stored in public warehouses within the state pursuant to "in transit" tariffs, as prescribed and allowed by the Interstate Commerce Commission, to a purchaser within the state,
- (3) sales of the product stored in public warehouses within the state where the shipment to such warehouses is not covered by "in transit" tariffs, as prescribed and allowed by the Interstate Commerce Commission, to a purchaser within or without the state,

14 the Oklahoma net income shall, at the option of the 15 taxpayer, be that portion of the total net income of 16 the taxpayer for federal income tax purposes derived 17 from the manufacture and/or processing and sales 18 everywhere as determined by the ratio of the sales 19 defined in this section made to the purchaser within 20 the state to the total sales everywhere. The term 21 "public warehouse" as used in this subparagraph means 22 a licensed public warehouse, the principal business of 23 which is warehousing merchandise for the public;

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1 In the case of insurance companies, Oklahoma taxable e. 2 income shall be taxable income of the taxpayer for 3 federal tax purposes, as adjusted for the adjustments 4 provided pursuant to the provisions of paragraphs 1 5 and 2 of this subsection, apportioned as follows: except as otherwise provided by division (2) of 6 (1) 7 this subparagraph, taxable income of an insurance company for a taxable year shall be apportioned 8 9 to this state by multiplying such income by a 10 fraction, the numerator of which is the direct 11 premiums written for insurance on property or 12 risks in this state, and the denominator of which 13 is the direct premiums written for insurance on 14 property or risks everywhere. For purposes of 15 this subsection, the term "direct premiums 16 written" means the total amount of direct 17 premiums written, assessments and annuity 18 considerations as reported for the taxable year 19 on the annual statement filed by the company with 20 the Insurance Commissioner in the form approved 21 by the National Association of Insurance 22 Commissioners, or such other form as may be 23 prescribed in lieu thereof,

1 (2)if the principal source of premiums written by an 2 insurance company consists of premiums for 3 reinsurance accepted by it, the taxable income of 4 such company shall be apportioned to this state 5 by multiplying such income by a fraction, the 6 numerator of which is the sum of (a) direct 7 premiums written for insurance on property or risks in this state, plus (b) premiums written 8 9 for reinsurance accepted in respect of property 10 or risks in this state, and the denominator of 11 which is the sum of (c) direct premiums written 12 for insurance on property or risks everywhere, 13 plus (d) premiums written for reinsurance 14 accepted in respect of property or risks 15 everywhere. For purposes of this paragraph, 16 premiums written for reinsurance accepted in 17 respect of property or risks in this state, 18 whether or not otherwise determinable, may at the 19 election of the company be determined on the 20 basis of the proportion which premiums written 21 for insurance accepted from companies 22 commercially domiciled in Oklahoma bears to 23 premiums written for reinsurance accepted from 24 all sources, or alternatively in the proportion

which the sum of the direct premiums written for insurance on property or risks in this state by each ceding company from which reinsurance is accepted bears to the sum of the total direct premiums written by each such ceding company for the taxable year.

7 5. The net income or loss remaining after the separate allocation in paragraph 4 of this subsection, being that which is 8 9 derived from a unitary business enterprise, shall be apportioned to 10 this state on the basis of the arithmetical average of three factors 11 consisting of property, payroll and sales or gross revenue 12 enumerated as subparagraphs a, b and c of this paragraph. Net 13 income or loss as used in this paragraph includes that derived from 14 patent or copyright royalties, purchase discounts, and interest on 15 accounts receivable relating to or arising from a business activity, 16 the income from which is apportioned pursuant to this subsection, 17 including the sale or other disposition of such property and any 18 other property used in the unitary enterprise. Deductions used in 19 computing such net income or loss shall not include taxes based on 20 or measured by income. Provided, for corporations whose property 21 for purposes of the tax imposed by Section 2355 of this title has an 22 initial investment cost equaling or exceeding Two Hundred Million 23 Dollars (\$200,000,000.00) and such investment is made on or after 24 July 1, 1997, or for corporations which expand their property or

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1 facilities in this state and such expansion has an investment cost equaling or exceeding Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000.00) 2 over a period not to exceed three (3) years, and such expansion is 3 4 commenced on or after January 1, 2000, the three factors shall be 5 apportioned with property and payroll, each comprising twenty-five 6 percent (25%) of the apportionment factor and sales comprising fifty 7 percent (50%) of the apportionment factor. The apportionment 8 factors shall be computed as follows:

9 a. The property factor is a fraction, the numerator of 10 which is the average value of the taxpayer's real and 11 tangible personal property owned or rented and used in 12 this state during the tax period and the denominator 13 of which is the average value of all the taxpayer's 14 real and tangible personal property everywhere owned 15 or rented and used during the tax period.

16 Property, the income from which is separately (1)17 allocated in paragraph 4 of this subsection, 18 shall not be included in determining this 19 fraction. The numerator of the fraction shall 20 include a portion of the investment in 21 transportation and other equipment having no 22 fixed situs, such as rolling stock, buses, trucks 23 and trailers, including machinery and equipment 24 carried thereon, airplanes, salespersons'

automobiles and other similar equipment, in the proportion that miles traveled in Oklahoma by such equipment bears to total miles traveled,

- 4 (2) Property owned by the taxpayer is valued at its
 5 original cost. Property rented by the taxpayer
 6 is valued at eight times the net annual rental
 7 rate. Net annual rental rate is the annual
 8 rental rate paid by the taxpayer, less any annual
 9 rental rate received by the taxpayer from
 10 subrentals,
- (3) The average value of property shall be determined by averaging the values at the beginning and ending of the tax period but the Oklahoma Tax Commission may require the averaging of monthly values during the tax period if reasonably required to reflect properly the average value of the taxpayer's property;
- b. The payroll factor is a fraction, the numerator of
 which is the total compensation for services rendered
 in the state during the tax period, and the
 denominator of which is the total compensation for
 services rendered everywhere during the tax period.
 "Compensation", as used in this subsection means those
 paid-for services to the extent related to the unitary

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business but does not include officers' salaries, wages and other compensation.

- 3 (1)In the case of a transportation enterprise, the 4 numerator of the fraction shall include a portion 5 of such expenditure in connection with employees 6 operating equipment over a fixed route, such as 7 railroad employees, airline pilots, or bus drivers, in this state only a part of the time, 8 9 in the proportion that mileage traveled in 10 Oklahoma bears to total mileage traveled by such 11 employees,
- 12 (2) In any case the numerator of the fraction shall
 13 include a portion of such expenditures in
 14 connection with itinerant employees, such as
 15 traveling salespersons, in this state only a part
 16 of the time, in the proportion that time spent in
 17 Oklahoma bears to total time spent in furtherance
 18 of the enterprise by such employees;
- 19c.The sales factor is a fraction, the numerator of which20is the total sales or gross revenue of the taxpayer in21this state during the tax period, and the denominator22of which is the total sales or gross revenue of the23taxpayer everywhere during the tax period. "Sales",24as used in this subsection does not include sales or

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gross revenue which are separately allocated in paragraph 4 of this subsection.

- 3 Sales of tangible personal property have a situs (1)4 in this state if the property is delivered or 5 shipped to a purchaser other than the United 6 States government, within this state regardless 7 of the FOB point or other conditions of the sale; 8 or the property is shipped from an office, store, 9 warehouse, factory or other place of storage in 10 this state and (a) the purchaser is the United 11 States government or (b) the taxpayer is not 12 doing business in the state of the destination of 13 the shipment.
- 14 (2) In the case of a railroad or interurban railway
 15 enterprise, the numerator of the fraction shall
 16 not be less than the allocation of revenues to
 17 this state as shown in its annual report to the
 18 Corporation Commission.
- 19 (3) In the case of an airline, truck or bus
 20 enterprise or freight car, tank car, refrigerator
 21 car or other railroad equipment enterprise, the
 22 numerator of the fraction shall include a portion
 23 of revenue from interstate transportation in the
 24 proportion that interstate mileage traveled in

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Oklahoma bears to total interstate mileage traveled.

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- 3 In the case of an oil, gasoline or gas pipeline (4) 4 enterprise, the numerator of the fraction shall 5 be either the total of traffic units of the 6 enterprise within Oklahoma or the revenue 7 allocated to Oklahoma based upon miles moved, at the option of the taxpayer, and the denominator 8 9 of which shall be the total of traffic units of 10 the enterprise or the revenue of the enterprise 11 everywhere as appropriate to the numerator. A 12 "traffic unit" is hereby defined as the 13 transportation for a distance of one (1) mile of 14 one (1) barrel of oil, one (1) gallon of gasoline 15 or one thousand (1,000) cubic feet of natural or 16 casinghead gas, as the case may be.
- 17 (5) In the case of a telephone or telegraph or other 18 communication enterprise, the numerator of the 19 fraction shall include that portion of the 20 interstate revenue as is allocated pursuant to 21 the accounting procedures prescribed by the 22 Federal Communications Commission; provided that 23 in respect to each corporation or business entity 24 required by the Federal Communications Commission

1 to keep its books and records in accordance with 2 a uniform system of accounts prescribed by such Commission, the intrastate net income shall be 3 4 determined separately in the manner provided by 5 such uniform system of accounts and only the interstate income shall be subject to allocation 6 7 pursuant to the provisions of this subsection. Provided further, that the gross revenue factors 8 9 shall be those as are determined pursuant to the 10 accounting procedures prescribed by the Federal 11 Communications Commission.

12 In any case where the apportionment of the three factors 13 prescribed in this paragraph attributes to Oklahoma a portion of net 14 income of the enterprise out of all appropriate proportion to the 15 property owned and/or business transacted within this state, because 16 of the fact that one or more of the factors so prescribed are not 17 employed to any appreciable extent in furtherance of the enterprise; 18 or because one or more factors not so prescribed are employed to a 19 considerable extent in furtherance of the enterprise; or because of 20 other reasons, the Tax Commission is empowered to permit, after a 21 showing by taxpayer that an excessive portion of net income has been 22 attributed to Oklahoma, or require, when in its judgment an 23 insufficient portion of net income has been attributed to Oklahoma, 24 the elimination, substitution, or use of additional factors, or

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reduction or increase in the weight of such prescribed factors.
Provided, however, that any such variance from such prescribed
factors which has the effect of increasing the portion of net income
attributable to Oklahoma must not be inherently arbitrary, and
application of the recomputed final apportionment to the net income
of the enterprise must attribute to Oklahoma only a reasonable
portion thereof.

6. For calendar years 1997 and 1998, the owner of a new or 8 9 expanded agricultural commodity processing facility in this state 10 may exclude from Oklahoma taxable income, or in the case of an 11 individual, the Oklahoma adjusted gross income, fifteen percent 12 (15%) of the investment by the owner in the new or expanded 13 agricultural commodity processing facility. For calendar year 1999, 14 and all subsequent years, the percentage, not to exceed fifteen 15 percent (15%), available to the owner of a new or expanded 16 agricultural commodity processing facility in this state claiming 17 the exemption shall be adjusted annually so that the total estimated 18 reduction in tax liability does not exceed One Million Dollars 19 (\$1,000,000.00) annually. The Tax Commission shall promulgate rules 20 for determining the percentage of the investment which each eligible 21 taxpayer may exclude. The exclusion provided by this paragraph 22 shall be taken in the taxable year when the investment is made. In 23 the event the total reduction in tax liability authorized by this 24 paragraph exceeds One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) in any

1 calendar year, the Tax Commission shall permit any excess over One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000.00) and shall factor such excess into 2 3 the percentage for subsequent years. Any amount of the exemption 4 permitted to be excluded pursuant to the provisions of this 5 paragraph but not used in any year may be carried forward as an exemption from income pursuant to the provisions of this paragraph 6 7 for a period not exceeding six (6) years following the year in which the investment was originally made. 8

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For purposes of this paragraph:

10 a. "Agricultural commodity processing facility" means 11 building, structures, fixtures and improvements used 12 or operated primarily for the processing or production 13 of marketable products from agricultural commodities. 14 The term shall also mean a dairy operation that 15 requires a depreciable investment of at least Two 16 Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$250,000.00) and which 17 produces milk from dairy cows. The term does not 18 include a facility that provides only, and nothing 19 more than, storage, cleaning, drying or transportation 20 of agricultural commodities, and

21 b. "Facility" means each part of the facility which is 22 used in a process primarily for:

23 (1) the processing of agricultural commodities, including receiving or storing agricultural

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- 1commodities, or the production of milk at a dairy2operation,
 - (2) transporting the agricultural commodities or product before, during or after the processing, or
 - (3) packaging or otherwise preparing the product for sale or shipment.

8 7. Despite any provision to the contrary in paragraph 3 of this 9 subsection, for taxable years beginning after December 31, 1999, in 10 the case of a taxpayer which has a farming loss, such farming loss 11 shall be considered a net operating loss carryback in accordance 12 with and to the extent of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C., 13 Section 172(b)(G). However, the amount of the net operating loss 14 carryback shall not exceed the lesser of:

a. Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00), or

b. the loss properly shown on Schedule F of the Internal
Revenue Service Form 1040 reduced by one-half (1/2) of
the income from all other sources other than reflected
on Schedule F.

8. In taxable years beginning after December 31, 1995, all
qualified wages equal to the federal income tax credit set forth in
26 U.S.C.A., Section 45A, shall be deducted from taxable income.
The deduction allowed pursuant to this paragraph shall only be
permitted for the tax years in which the federal tax credit pursuant

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1 to 26 U.S.C.A., Section 45A, is allowed. For purposes of this 2 paragraph, "qualified wages" means those wages used to calculate the 3 federal credit pursuant to 26 U.S.C.A., Section 45A.

9. In taxable years beginning after December 31, 2005, an
employer that is eligible for and utilizes the Safety Pays OSHA
Consultation Service provided by the Oklahoma Department of Labor
shall receive an exemption from taxable income in the amount of One
Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) for the tax year that the service is
utilized.

10 10. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2010, 11 there shall be added to Oklahoma taxable income an amount equal to 12 the amount of deferred income not included in such taxable income 13 pursuant to Section 108(i)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 14 as amended by Section 1231 of the American Recovery and Reinvestment 15 Act of 2009 (P.L. No. 111-5). There shall be subtracted from 16 Oklahoma taxable income an amount equal to the amount of deferred 17 income included in such taxable income pursuant to Section 108(i)(1) 18 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended by Section 1231 of 19 the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 (P.L. No. 111-5). 20 11. For taxable years beginning on or after January 1, 2019, 21 there shall be subtracted from Oklahoma taxable income or adjusted 22 gross income any item of income or gain, and there shall be added to 23 Oklahoma taxable income or adjusted gross income any item of loss or 24 deduction that in the absence of an election pursuant to the

1 provisions of the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019 would 2 be allocated to a member or to an indirect member of an electing 3 pass-through entity pursuant to Section 2351 et seq. of this title, 4 if (i) the electing pass-through entity has accounted for such item 5 in computing its Oklahoma net entity income or loss pursuant to the 6 provisions of the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, and 7 (ii) the total amount of tax attributable to any resulting Oklahoma net entity income has been paid. The Oklahoma Tax Commission shall 8 9 promulgate rules for the reporting of such exclusion to direct and 10 indirect members of the electing pass-through entity. As used in 11 this paragraph, "electing pass-through entity", "indirect member", 12 and "member" shall be defined in the same manner as prescribed by 13 Section 2 of this act. Notwithstanding the application of this 14 paragraph, the adjusted tax basis of any ownership interest in a 15 pass-through entity for purposes of Section 2351 et seq. of this 16 title shall be equal to its adjusted tax basis for federal income 17 tax purposes.

18 The taxable income of any corporation shall be further Β. 1. 19 adjusted to arrive at Oklahoma taxable income, except those 20 corporations electing treatment as provided in subchapter S of the 21 Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C., Section 1361 et seq., and Section 22 2365 of this title, deductions pursuant to the provisions of the 23 Accelerated Cost Recovery System as defined and allowed in the 24 Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981, Public Law 97-34, 26 U.S.C.,

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1 Section 168, for depreciation of assets placed into service after December 31, 1981, shall not be allowed in calculating Oklahoma 2 3 taxable income. Such corporations shall be allowed a deduction for depreciation of assets placed into service after December 31, 1981, 4 5 in accordance with provisions of the Internal Revenue Code, 26 U.S.C., Section 1 et seq., in effect immediately prior to the 6 7 enactment of the Accelerated Cost Recovery System. The Oklahoma tax basis for all such assets placed into service after December 31, 8 9 1981, calculated in this section shall be retained and utilized for 10 all Oklahoma income tax purposes through the final disposition of 11 such assets.

Notwithstanding any other provisions of the Oklahoma Income Tax Act, Section 2351 et seq. of this title, or of the Internal Revenue Code to the contrary, this subsection shall control calculation of depreciation of assets placed into service after December 31, 1981, and before January 1, 1983.

17 For assets placed in service and held by a corporation in which 18 accelerated cost recovery system was previously disallowed, an 19 adjustment to taxable income is required in the first taxable year 20 beginning after December 31, 1982, to reconcile the basis of such 21 assets to the basis allowed in the Internal Revenue Code. The 22 purpose of this adjustment is to equalize the basis and allowance 23 for depreciation accounts between that reported to the Internal 24 Revenue Service and that reported to Oklahoma.

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For tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2009, and
 ending on or before December 31, 2009, there shall be added to
 Oklahoma taxable income any amount in excess of One Hundred Seventy five Thousand Dollars (\$175,000.00) which has been deducted as a
 small business expense under Internal Revenue Code, Section 179 as
 provided in the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

For taxable years beginning after December 31, 1987, the taxable income of any corporation shall be further adjusted to 8 9 arrive at Oklahoma taxable income for transfers of technology to 10 qualified small businesses located in Oklahoma. 15	the exclusive and undisputed owner of the technology
16	at the time the transfer is made; and
17	d. "Gross proceeds" means the total amount of
18	consideration for the transfer of technology, whether
19	the consideration is in money or otherwise.
20	D. 1. For taxable years beginning after December 31, 2005, the
21	taxable income of any corporation, estate or trust, shall be further
22	adjusted for qualifying gains receiving capital treatment. Such
23	corporations, estates or trusts shall be allowed a deduction from
24	Oklahoma taxable income for the amount of qualifying gains receiving

capital treatment earned by the corporation, estate or trust during
 the taxable year and included in the federal taxable income of such
 corporation, estate or trust.

As used in this subsection:
a. "qualifying gains receiving capital treatment" means

The holding period shall include any additional 14 period when the property was held by another 15 individual or entity, if such additional period is 16 included in the taxpayer's holding period for the 17 asset pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code, 18 "Oklahoma company", "limited liability company", or с. 19 "partnership" means an entity whose primary 20 headquarters have been located in Oklahoma for at 21 least three (3) uninterrupted years prior to the date 22 of the transaction from which the net capital gains 23 arise,

- "direct" means the taxpayer directly owns the asset, 1 d. and
 - "indirect" means the taxpayer owns an interest in a e. pass-through entity (or chain of pass-through entities) that sells the asset that gives rise to the qualifying gains receiving capital treatment.
- 7 With respect to sales of real property or (1) tangible personal property located within 8 9 Oklahoma, the deduction described in this 10 subsection shall not apply unless the pass-11 through entity that makes the sale has held the 12 property for not less than five (5) uninterrupted 13 years prior to the date of the transaction that 14 created the capital gain, and each pass-through 15 entity included in the chain of ownership has 16 been a member, partner, or shareholder of the 17 pass-through entity in the tier immediately below 18 it for an uninterrupted period of not less than 19 five (5) years.
- 20 With respect to sales of stock or ownership (2) 21 interest in or sales of all or substantially all 22 of the assets of an Oklahoma company, limited 23 liability company, or partnership, the deduction 24 described in this subsection shall not apply

The Oklahoma adjusted gross income of any individual 12 taxpayer shall be further adjusted as follows to arrive at Oklahoma 13 taxable income: 14 1.  - (3) confinement in a hospital within the United States for treatment of wounds, injuries or disease,

the time for filing a return and paying an income tax shall be and is hereby extended without incurring liability for interest or penalties, to the fifteenth day of the third month following the month in which:

- 10 Such individual shall return to the United (a) 11 States if the extension is granted pursuant 12 to subparagraph a of this paragraph, return 13 to the State of Oklahoma if the extension is 14 granted pursuant to subparagraph b of this 15 paragraph or be discharged from such 16 hospital if the extension is granted 17 pursuant to subparagraph c of this 18 paragraph; or
- 19 (b) An executor, administrator, or conservator
 20 of the estate of the taxpayer is appointed,
 21 whichever event occurs the earliest.

Provided, that the Tax Commission may, in its discretion, grant any member of the Armed Forces of the United States an extension of time for filing of income tax returns and payment of income tax

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without incurring liabilities for interest or penalties. Such extension may be granted only when in the judgment of the Tax Commission a good cause exists therefor and may be for a period in excess of six (6) months. A record of every such extension granted, and the reason therefor, shall be kept.

3. For purposes of this subsection, the constructive ownership rules of Section 318(a) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, as modified by Section 856(d)(5) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, shall apply in determining the ownership of stock, assets, or net profits of any person.

15 4. A real estate investment trust that does not become 16 regularly traded on an established securities market within one (1) 17 year of the date on which it first becomes a real estate investment 18 trust shall be deemed not to have been regularly traded on an 19 established securities market, retroactive to the date it first 20 became a real estate investment trust, and shall file an amended 21 return reflecting such retroactive designation for any tax year or 22 part year occurring during its initial year of status as a real 23 estate investment trust. For purposes of this subsection, a real 24 estate investment trust becomes a real estate investment trust on

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1 the first day it has both met the requirements of Section 856 of the 2 Internal Revenue Code and has elected to be treated as a real estate 3 investment trust pursuant to Section 856(c)(1) of the Internal 4 Revenue Code.

5 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 68 O.S. 2011, Section 2365, is 6 amended to read as follows:

7 Section 2365. The Except as otherwise provided for in the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, the provisions, applicable to 8 9 the taxation of income of corporations and stockholders, electing 10 treatment as provided in subchapter S of the Internal Revenue Code, 11 shall apply to taxpayers as provided under this act. A corporation 12 having an election in effect under subchapter S of the Internal 13 Revenue Code shall not be subject to the Oklahoma income tax on 14 corporations and for tax years beginning after December 31, 1996, 15 shall not be subject to the tax imposed by subsection A of Section 16 2370 of this title, and the shareholders of such corporation shall 17 include in their taxable incomes their proportionate part of the 18 federal income of such corporation, subject to the modifications as 19 set forth in Sections 2358, 2362 and 2370.2 of this title, in the 20 same manner and to the same extent as provided by the Internal 21 Revenue Code. However, if any of the shareholders of such 22 corporation are nonresidents during any part of the taxable year of 23 the corporation, such corporation shall be taxable for such year on 24 that part of the income of the corporation, as determined pursuant

1 to Sections 2358, 2362 and 2370.2 of this title, allocable to the 2 shares of stock owned by such nonresident unless (i) the corporation 3 files with its return for such year an agreement executed by each 4 nonresident stockholder stating that such nonresident will file an 5 Oklahoma income tax return which will include in the adjusted gross income of such nonresident that portion of the Oklahoma taxable 6 7 income of the corporation allocable to the interest of the nonresident in such corporation, or (ii) the corporation has made a 8 9 valid election pursuant to the provisions of the Pass-Through Entity 10 Tax Equity Act of 2019 and has paid the applicable tax. For 11 purposes of this section, the term "corporation" shall include 12 state-chartered banks, state and federal savings associations and 13 national banking associations that have total assets of Three 14 Billion Dollars (\$3,000,000,000.00) or less and that are organized 15 pursuant to the laws of this state, or the United States, or are 16 located or doing business in this state.

SECTION 7. AMENDATORY 68 O.S. 2011, Section 2368, as
last amended by Section 1, Chapter 225, O.S.L. 2018 (68 O.S. Supp.
2018, Section 2368), is amended to read as follows:

20 Section 2368. A. For tax years ending before January 1, 2017, 21 the following individuals shall each make a return stating 22 specifically the taxable income and, where necessary, the adjusted 23 gross income and the adjustments provided in Section 2351 et seq. of

1 this title to arrive at Oklahoma taxable income and, where
2 necessary, Oklahoma adjusted gross income:

3 1. Every resident individual having a gross income, or gross 4 receipts, for the taxable year in an amount sufficient to require 5 the filing of a federal income tax return, if single, or if married 6 and not living with husband or wife; and

7 2. Every Except as otherwise provided for in the Pass-Through
8 Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, every resident individual having a
9 gross income, or gross receipts, for the taxable year in an amount
10 sufficient to require the filing of a federal income tax return, if
11 married and living with husband or wife.

Provided however, every resident individual who does not meet the requirements sufficient to file a federal return, but has Oklahoma withholding, may file a claim for refund for all Oklahoma income taxes withheld and shall not be subject to the provisions of Section 2358 of this title; and

17 3. Every nonresident individual having Oklahoma gross income
18 for the taxable year of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) or more.

B. If a husband and wife, living together, have an aggregate gross income or gross receipts, for such year, in an amount sufficient to require the filing of a federal income tax return:

1. Each shall make a return; or

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2. The income of each shall be included in a single joint
 return, in which case the tax shall be computed on the aggregate net
 income.

4 C. 1. For tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2017, 5 every resident individual whose gross income from both within and outside of Oklahoma exceeds the sum of the standard deduction and 6 7 personal exemption allowed in Section 2358 of this title shall file 8 an Oklahoma income tax return. Resident individuals not required to 9 file a federal income tax return must attach a completed federal 10 income tax return to the Oklahoma income tax return to show how 11 adjusted gross income and deductions were determined, if their gross 12 income is more than their adjusted gross income. The Oklahoma 13 income tax return must show the taxable income and, where necessary, 14 the adjusted gross income and modifications required by Section 2351 15 et seq. of this title, and any other information the Tax Commission 16 may require.

Every Except as otherwise provided for in the Pass-Through
 Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, every nonresident individual having
 Oklahoma gross income for the taxable year of One Thousand Dollars
 (\$1,000.00) or more shall file an Oklahoma income tax return.

D. If an individual is unable to make his or her own return, the return shall be made by a duly authorized agent or by the guardian or other person charged with the care of the person or property of such individual.

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1 E. Every partnership shall make a return for each taxable year, 2 stating the taxable income and the adjustments to arrive at Oklahoma The Oklahoma return shall include a schedule showing the 3 income. 4 distribution to partners of the various items of income as per the 5 federal return and the adjustments required by Section 2351 et seq. of this title for Oklahoma. The return shall be signed by one of 6 7 the partners. If Except for partnerships making an election 8 pursuant to the provisions of the Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act 9 of 2019, if a partnership has elected pursuant to the provisions of 10 Section 761 of the Internal Revenue Code, or any provision 11 comparable thereto, not to file partnership income tax returns, that 12 partnership shall not be required to file an Oklahoma partnership 13 return. The Oklahoma Tax Commission shall promulgate rules for 14 purposes of partnership returns when multiple partners would 15 otherwise be required to file a nonresident return. The rules shall 16 provide a specific number of partners in a partnership above which a 17 composite return may be filed. The return shall be in such form as 18 prescribed by the Tax Commission.

F. Every corporation shall make a return for each taxable year stating the taxable income and the adjustments provided in Section 2351 et seq. of this title to arrive at Oklahoma taxable income. In addition, corporations electing subchapter S treatment pursuant to the Internal Revenue Code and Section 2351 et seq. of this title, shall include a schedule showing the distribution to shareholders of

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1 the various items of income as per the federal return and the adjustments for Oklahoma. All corporation returns shall be signed 2 by the president, vice president, or other principal officer and the 3 4 corporate seal impressed. In cases where receivers, trustees in 5 bankruptcy, or assignees are operating the property or business of corporations, such receivers, trustees, or assignees shall make a 6 7 return for such corporations in the same manner and form as corporations are required to make returns. Any tax due on the basis 8 9 of such returns made by receivers, trustees, or assignees shall be 10 collected in the same manner as if collected from the corporations 11 of whose business or property they have custody and control.

12 G. Every resident estate and trust shall make a return for each 13 taxable year stating the taxable income and the adjustments to 14 arrive at Oklahoma taxable income. Every nonresident estate or 15 trust having Oklahoma taxable income as provided in Section 2362 of 16 this title shall make a return for each taxable year stating the 17 taxable income and the adjustments to arrive at Oklahoma taxable 18 income. The Oklahoma return shall include a schedule showing the 19 distribution to beneficiaries, if any, of the various items of 20 income as per the federal return and the adjustments for Oklahoma. 21 The fiduciary shall be responsible for making the return and the 22 return shall be signed by the fiduciary, or by one fiduciary if 23 there is more than one. The Tax Commission shall promulgate rules 24 for purposes of estate and trust returns when multiple returns would

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otherwise be required of nonresident beneficiaries of estates or
 trusts. The return shall be in such form as prescribed by the Tax
 Commission.

H. 1. All individual returns, except individual returns filed
electronically, made on the basis of the calendar year shall be due
on or before the fifteenth day of April following the close of the
taxable year. Provided, if the Internal Revenue Code provides for a
later due date for returns of individuals, the Tax Commission shall
accept returns filed by individuals by such date and such returns
shall be considered as timely filed.

11 2. All individual returns filed electronically, made on the 12 basis of the calendar year, shall be due on or before the twentieth 13 day of April following the close of the taxable year.

All individual returns made on the basis of a fiscal year shall be due on or before the fifteenth day of the fourth month following the close of the fiscal year.

4. For tax years beginning before January 1, 2016, calendar
year corporation returns shall be due on or before the fifteenth day
of March following the close of the taxable year. For tax years
beginning on or after January 1, 2016, calendar year corporation
returns shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the due
date established under the Internal Revenue Code.

5. For tax years beginning before January 1, 2016, fiscal year
corporation returns shall be due on or before the fifteenth day of

1 the third month following the close of the fiscal year. For tax 2 years beginning on or after January 1, 2016, fiscal year corporation 3 returns shall be due no later than thirty (30) days after the due 4 date established under the Internal Revenue Code.

6. For tax years beginning before January 1, 2016, partnership
returns shall be due on or before the fifteenth day of April
following the close of the taxable year. For tax years beginning on
or after January 1, 2016, partnership returns shall be due no later
than thirty (30) days after the due date established under the
Internal Revenue Code.

11 7. All estate and trust returns made on the basis of the 12 calendar year shall be due on or before the fifteenth day of April 13 following the close of the taxable year. All estate and trust 14 returns made on the basis of a fiscal year shall be due on or before 15 the fifteenth day of the fourth month following the close of the 16 fiscal year.

17 8. In the case of complete liquidation, or the dissolution, of 18 a corporation the return of such corporation shall be made on or 19 before the fifteenth day of the fourth month following the month in 20 which the corporation is completely liquidated. A corporation which 21 has terminated its business activities, satisfied or made provision 22 for all of its liabilities or has distributed all of its assets, 23 even though not formally dissolved under state law, is deemed to 24 have completely liquidated for purposes of this subsection.

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1 I. Returns by individuals, fiduciaries, partnerships, 2 corporations or any other person or entity required, or that may hereafter be required to file a return, shall contain or be verified 3 4 by a written declaration that such return is made under the 5 penalties of perjury and the fact that any individual's name is signed to a filed return shall be prima facie evidence for all 6 7 purposes that the return was actually signed by that individual. Provided, the Tax Commission shall promulgate rules to provide 8 9 procedures for verification of signatures on returns which are filed 10 electronically.

J. Every return required by Section 2351 et seq. of this title shall be in such form as the Tax Commission may, from time to time, prescribe. Each return shall be filed with the Tax Commission and forms shall be furnished by the Tax Commission on application therefor, but failure to secure or receive the form of a return prescribed shall not relieve any taxpayer from the obligation of making and filing any return herein required.

18 K. For tax years ending after January 1, 2017, if a taxpayer 19 elects to make installment payments of tax due pursuant to the 20 provisions of subsection (h) of Section 965 of the Internal Revenue 21 Code, 26 U.S.C., Section 965, such election may also apply to the 22 payment of Oklahoma income tax, attributable to the income upon 23 which such installment payments are based.

1SECTION 8.AMENDATORY68 O.S. 2011, Section 2370.2, is2amended to read as follows:

3 Section 2370.2 A Except as otherwise provided for in the Pass-4 Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, a state banking association 5 or national banking association having an election in effect under subchapter S of the Internal Revenue Code for any tax year beginning 6 7 after December 31, 1996, in reporting items of income, loss, deductions and credits proportionately to its shareholders for 8 9 inclusion in their taxable incomes, shall use as a basis items of 10 income, loss, deductions and credits of such banking association as 11 shown on its federal income tax return, subject to modifications as 12 set forth in Sections 2358 and 2362 of this title.

13SECTION 9.AMENDATORY68 O.S. 2011, Section 2372, is14amended to read as follows:

15 Section 2372. Every Except as otherwise provided for in the 16 Pass-Through Entity Tax Equity Act of 2019, every national banking 17 association or state bank, subject to taxation under this act, shall 18 make its return to the Tax Commission at the same time and in the 19 same manner required of other corporations, as specified herein, and 20 except to the manner of computing the net income subject to the tax 21 levied by this act, each shall be subject to all other provisions of 22 this act applicable to such other corporations.

23 SECTION 10. It being immediately necessary for the preservation 24 of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby

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1	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
2	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
