NEW LAW A new section of law not to be 17 codified in the Oklahoma Statutes reads as follows: 18 This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Medical Care 19 Provider Protection Act". 20 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 21 O.S. 2011, Section 650.4, is 21 amended to read as follows: 22 Section 650.4. A. Every person who, without justifiable or 23 excusable cause and with intent to do bodily harm, commits any 24 assault, battery or assault and battery upon the person of an

emergency <u>a</u> medical care provider who is performing medical care duties, upon conviction, is guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment in the custody of the Department of Corrections for a term not exceeding two (2) years, or by a fine not exceeding One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), or by both such fine and imprisonment.

B. As used in this section, "emergency medical care provider" means doctors, residents, interns, nurses, nurses' aides, ambulance attendants and operators, paramedics, emergency medical technicians, and laboratory technicians, radiologic technologists, physical therapists, physician assistants, chaplains, volunteers, pharmacists, nursing students, medical students, members of a hospital security force and any other employees of a healthcare facility.

SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 21 O.S. 2011, Section 650.5, is amended to read as follows:

Section 650.5. A. Every person who, without justifiable or excusable cause and with intent to do bodily harm, commits any aggravated assault and battery or any assault with a firearm or other deadly weapon upon the person of an emergency medical technician or other emergency a medical care provider, upon conviction, is guilty of a felony punishable by imprisonment in a state correctional institution the custody of the Department of Corrections for a term not less than two (2) years nor more than one

(1) year five (5) years, or by a fine not to exceed One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), or by both such fine and imprisonment.

B. As used in this section, "medical care provider" means doctors, residents, interns, nurses, nurses' aides, ambulance attendants and operators, paramedics, emergency medical technicians, laboratory technicians, radiologic technologists, physical therapists, physician assistants, chaplains, volunteers, pharmacists, nursing students, medical students, members of a hospital security force and any other employees of a healthcare facility.

SECTION 4. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1-114.3 of Title 63, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. Every hospital, health clinic and ambulance service shall display at all times in a prominent place a printed sign with a minimum height of twenty (20) inches and a minimum width of fourteen (14) inches, with each letter to be a minimum of one-fourth (1/4) inch in height, which shall read as follows:

WARNING: ASSAULTING A MEDICAL PROFESSIONAL WHO IS ENGAGED IN THE PERFORMANCE OF HIS OR HER OFFICIAL DUTIES IS A SERIOUS CRIME.

Section 650.4 of Title 21 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

B. Every hospital, health clinic and ambulance service shall report all assaults on medical care providers to the State

Department of Health on an annual basis. The State Department of

1	Health shall have rulemaking authority to implement the provisions
2	of this section.
3	C. The Department of Health shall not make public any
4	identifiable information in regard to facility, individual or
5	location of assaults.
6	SECTION 5. This act shall become effective November 1, 2020.
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
