**Research Analysis**

SB 2140 reduces from 2 years to 1 year the amount of time which must elapse before a person charged with a misdemeanor can file for expungement after completion of a deferred judgment or delayed sentence. The measure provides that a person convicted of a nonviolent felony can seek expungement if the person has not been convicted of any other felony in the last 15 years. The measure provides that offenses arising out of the same transaction or occurrence are to be treated as one conviction and offense for the purpose of seeking an expungement for a misdemeanor or nonviolent offense. Provides that the expungement order also seals Pardon and Parole Board records.
