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8	An Act relating to prisons and reformatories; amending 57 O.S. 2011, Section 549.1, as last amended
9	by Section 40, Chapter 15, O.S.L. 2013 (57 O.S. Supp. 2015, Section 549.1), which relates to products and
10	services produced by prison industries; requiring the Department of Corrections to work with the State
11	Board of Career and Technology Education for certain purpose; deleting certain state agency purchasing
12	requirement; updating language; deleting prohibition that bars products and services from being purchased
13	by the general public; deleting certain recordkeeping requirement; authorizing persons and nonpublic
14	entities to purchase products or services until a certain date; deleting internal statutory reference;
15	requiring certain revenues to be used exclusively for prison industries and agricultural programs; and
16	providing an effective date.
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19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
20	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 57 O.S. 2011, Section 549.1, as
21	last amended by Section 40, Chapter 15, O.S.L. 2013 (57 O.S. Supp.
22	2015, Section 549.1), is amended to read as follows:
23	Section 549.1 A. The Department of Corrections is authorized
24	to purchase in the manner prescribed by law, facilities, equipment,

1 raw materials and supplies, and to engage the supervisory personnel 2 necessary to establish and maintain for this state at the penal 3 institutions, now or hereafter under the control of the State Board 4 of Corrections, industries and agricultural programs for the 5 utilization of services of prisoners in the manufacture or production of the articles or products as may be needed for the 6 7 construction, operation, maintenance or use of any office, department, institution or agency supported in whole or in part by 8 9 this state and the political subdivisions thereof. The Department 10 of Corrections shall work cooperatively with the State Board of 11 Career and Technology Education to provide education and vocational-12 technical training for prisoners who are candidates for employment 13 in industries and agricultural programs of the Department of 14 Corrections. Upon the request of the Oklahoma Historical Society or 15 the Oklahoma Tourism and Recreation Department, the Department of 16 Corrections shall provide labor for and shall produce or manufacture 17 articles, products or materials needed for the repair, construction 18 and maintenance of historical sites and state parks including, but 19 not limited to, the production of materials and products needed for 20 the reconstruction of historic forts in the state.

B. All articles and services provided by the Department of
Corrections in the state correctional institutions, and not required
for use therein, shall be purchased as required by all offices,
departments, institutions, agencies, counties, schools, colleges,

1 universities, or political subdivisions or any agency thereof of 2 this state which are supported in whole or in part by this state, if such article or service is the lowest and best bid, and no such 3 4 article or product may be purchased by any such office, department, 5 institution, agency, county, school, college, university, or political subdivisions or agency thereof from any other source 6 7 unless excepted from the provisions as hereinafter provided. 8 Purchases made by the above-described state agencies may be made by 9 submitting the proper requisition through the Office of Management 10 and Enterprise Services or by direct order to the prison industries 11 program of the Department of Corrections.

C. If a requisition is received by the Office of Management and 12 13 Enterprise Services or a direct order is received by the Prison 14 Industries Program of the Department of Corrections from a state 15 agency for any product or service provided by the Department of 16 Corrections and such product or service is also available from a 17 severely handicapped person or a qualified nonprofit agency for the 18 severely handicapped as provided in Section 3001 et seq. of Title 74 19 of the Oklahoma Statutes at a comparable price, then the product or 20 service shall be purchased from such severely handicapped person or 21 qualified nonprofit agency for the severely handicapped. If the 22 product or service is not available within the time period required 23 by the purchasing state agency, then such product or service shall

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1 be purchased from the Department of Corrections under the provisions 2 of this section.

D. All offices, departments, institutions, agencies, counties, 3 4 cities, districts or political subdivisions, schools, colleges, or 5 universities, or any agency thereof, or any agencies of the state, which are supported in whole or in part by this state, may purchase 6 7 the goods products or services produced by the prison industries of the Department of Corrections through their properly authorized 8 9 purchasing authority, or they may place a direct order without 10 competitive bid, with the prison industries of the Department of 11 Corrections.

12 E. D. Not-for-profit corporations or charitable agencies 13 chartered in Oklahoma or other states may purchase such goods 14 products and services. Units of the federal government and units of 15 government in other states may also purchase such goods products and 16 services. All entities which contract with the state, its political 17 units, its agencies, its public institutions, not-for-profit 18 corporations or charitable agencies chartered in Oklahoma may 19 purchase goods products or services from the Department of 20 Corrections which are used in the performance of such contracts. 21 Any church located in the State of Oklahoma may also purchase goods 22 products and services produced by the prison industries of the 23 Department of Corrections. Any community action agency or council 24 of governments within this state may purchase housing components

produced by the prison industries of the Department of Corrections.
 Nothing shall prohibit the Department from bidding on portions of a
 state contract which are subcontracted by the primary contractor.

4 F. Others are prohibited from purchasing such goods and 5 services, with the exception that all surplus agricultural products may be sold on the open market or bartered and exchanged for other 6 7 food, feed or seed products of comparable value. The Department of Corrections shall keep complete and accurate records of any such 8 9 barters or exchanges in such form and manner as the Office of 10 Management and Enterprise Services may prescribe. A copy of such 11 records shall be filed with the Office of Management and Enterprise 12 Services no later than March 1 of each year for all barters or 13 exchanges occurring in the previous calendar year. When 14 practicable, the Department of Corrections may accept and process 15 agricultural products from the public and may export the resulting 16 products to foreign markets.

17 G. E. Until November 1, 2021, any person or nonpublic entity
 18 may purchase products or services produced by the prison industries
 19 of the Department of Corrections.

<u>F.</u> Products manufactured by the Department of Corrections shall
 be of styles, patterns, designs and quantities specified by the
 Department of Corrections except where the same have been or may be
 specified by the Office of Management and Enterprise Services.

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Products shall be provided at a fair market price for comparable
 quality.

3 H. G. State agencies shall make maximum utilization of such 4 products, and no similar products shall be purchased by state 5 agencies from any other source than the Department of Corrections 6 except as provided in subsection C of this section, unless the 7 Department of Corrections certifies to the State Purchasing Director 8 that it is not able to provide products, and no claim therefor shall 9 be paid without such certification.

10 I. H. Exceptions from the mandatory provisions hereof may be 11 made in any case where, in the opinion of the Office of Management 12 and Enterprise Services, the article or product does not meet the 13 reasonable requirements of or for such offices, departments, 14 institutions or agencies, or in any case where the requisitions made 15 cannot be reasonably complied with. No such offices, departments, 16 institutions or agencies τ shall be allowed to evade the intent and 17 meaning of this section by slight variations from standards adopted 18 by the Office of Management and Enterprise Services, when the 19 articles, services or products produced or manufactured by the 20 Department of Corrections, in accordance with established standards, 21 are reasonably adapted to the actual needs of such offices, 22 departments, institutions or agencies.

J. I. In the event of disagreement between the Department of
 Corrections and the State Purchasing Director on fairness of price,

ability to comply to specifications, reasonableness of
 specifications and timeliness of delivery of products the matter
 will be resolved by the Central Purchasing Director.

K. J. The Office of Management and Enterprise Services shall
cooperate with the Department of Corrections in seeking to promote
for use in state agencies and by all other eligible customers, the
products manufactured and services provided by the prison
industries.

9 L. K. The Department of Corrections shall prepare catalogs
10 containing the description of all goods products and services
11 provided, with the pricing of each item. Copies of such catalog
12 shall be sent by the Department of Corrections to all offices,
13 departments, institutions and agencies of this state, and shall be
14 available for distribution to all other eligible customers.

L. All revenues derived from the sale of products or services
 produced by prison industries of the Department of Corrections shall
 be used exclusively for maintaining and expanding the operations of
 the industries and agricultural programs.

SECTION 2. This act shall become effective November 1, 2016.
