the State Board of Education to administer certain

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assessments in certain grades during certain years; requiring administration of assessments for certain period; deleting certain subject tests; deleting endof-instruction test administration requirements and purpose; deleting fine arts assessment requirements; directing the State Board to adopt and develop certain assessments to be administered by a certain school year; specifying the assessment subject areas and grades; requiring certain students to take certain assessments by a certain grade in order to graduate; requiring school districts to report assessment scores on student transcripts; directing the State Board to develop high school graduation requirements in consultation with other entities; listing criteria for the recommendations; requiring public hearings and input; requiring a report by a certain date; requiring adoption of requirements by a certain date; making requirements subject to legislative review; prohibiting implementation until completion of the review; requiring submission within certain time period; authorizing the Legislature to approve or disapprove the requirements; providing for adoption of new requirements or revisions upon disapproval; considering final requirements to be agency rules; specifying certain procedures; deleting references to criterion-referenced tests; modifying testing window requirements; expanding responsibility of the State Board over assessments; repealing 70 O.S. 2011, Sections 1210.521, 1210.522, 1210.523, as last amended by Section 26, Chapter 4, O.S.L. 2014, 1210.525 and 1210.526, as amended by Section 2, Chapter 367, O.S.L. 2013 (70 O.S. Supp. 2015, Sections 1210.523 and 1210.526), which relate to the Achieving Classroom Excellence Act of 2005; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

22 SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1-116, as

23 amended by Section 1, Chapter 124, O.S.L. 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2015,

Section 1-116), is amended to read as follows:

Section 1-116. As used in this act title:

- 1. "Teacher" means any person who is employed to serve as district superintendent, principal, supervisor, a counselor, librarian, school nurse or classroom teacher, or in any other instructional, supervisory, or administrative capacity, is defined as a teacher. Such The person shall not be deemed qualified unless the person holds a valid certificate issued by and in accordance with the rules of the State Board of Education, to perform the particular services for which the person is employed;
- 2. "Superintendent" or "superintendent of schools" means the executive officer of the board of education and the administrative head of the school system of a district maintaining an accredited school, provided the person holds an administrator's certificate recognized by the State Board of Education;
- 3. "Principal" means any person other than a district superintendent of schools having supervisory or administrative authority over any school or school building having two or more teachers. A teaching principal shall be a principal who devotes at least one-half the time school is in session to classroom teaching. Teaching principals shall be required to hold administrative certificates;
- 4. "Teachers" means, for purposes of complying with the State

 Aid Law and other statutes which apportion money on the basis of

 teaching units or the number of teachers employed or qualified, all

persons holding proper certificates and connected in any capacity with the instruction of pupils;

5. "Resident teacher" means any certified teacher who is employed in a local school to serve as a classroom teacher under the guidance and assistance of a mentor teacher or teachers and residency committee. Any such person A resident teacher shall have completed the program of the college or school of education program of the accredited institution of higher learning from which the person has been resident teacher graduated;

6. 5. "Student teacher" means any student who is enrolled in an institution of higher learning approved by the State Board of Education for teacher training and who is jointly assigned by such the institution of higher learning and a school district's board of education of a school district to perform practice teaching under the direction of a regularly employed and certified teacher. A student teacher, while serving a nonsalaried internship under the supervision of a certified teacher, shall be accorded the same protection of the laws as that accorded the certified teacher;

7. 6. "School nurse" means a person employed full time by a board of education who is a registered nurse licensed by the Oklahoma State Board of Nurse Registration and Nursing Education, and is certified the same as a teacher by the State Department Board of Education. Provided, that any person who is employed as a full-time school nurse in any school district in Oklahoma, but who is not

registered on the effective date of this act, may continue to serve in the same capacity; however, such person shall, under rules adopted by the State Board of Education, attend classes in nursing and prepare to become registered.

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A school nurse employed by a board of education shall be accorded the same protection of laws and all other benefits accorded a certified teacher; and

- 8. 7. "Support employee" means an employee who provides those services which are not performed by certified teachers, principals, superintendents or administrators and which are necessary for the efficient and satisfactory functioning of a school district.
- SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 6-101.3, as last amended by Section 1, Chapter 365, O.S.L. 2015 (70 O.S. Supp. 2015, Section 6-101.3), is amended to read as follows:
 - Section 6-101.3 As used in Section 6-101 et seq. of this title:
 - 1. "Administrator" means a duly certified person who devotes a majority of time to service as a superintendent, elementary superintendent, principal, supervisor, vice principal or in any other administrative or supervisory capacity in the school district;
 - 2. "Dismissal" means the discontinuance of the teaching service of an administrator or teacher during the term of a written contract, as provided by law;
 - 3. "Nonreemployment" means the nonrenewal of the contract of an administrator or teacher upon expiration of the contract;

4. "Career teacher" means a teacher who:

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- a. for teachers employed by a school district prior to

 full implementation of the Oklahoma Teacher and Leader

 Effectiveness Evaluation System (TLE) as set forth in

 Section 6-101.10 of this title, has completed three

 (3) or more consecutive complete school years as a

 teacher in one school district under a written

 continuing or temporary teaching contract, or
- b. for teachers employed for the first time by a school district under a written continuing or temporary teaching contract after full implementation of the Oklahoma Teacher and Leader Effectiveness Evaluation System (TLE) as set forth in Section 6-101.10 of this title:
 - (1) has completed three (3) consecutive complete school years as a teacher in one school district under a written continuing or temporary teaching contract and has achieved qualitative and quantitative ratings of "superior" as measured pursuant to the TLE as set forth in Section 6-101.16 of this title for at least two (2) of the three (3) school years, with no rating below "effective",

(2) has completed four (4) consecutive complete
school years as a teacher in one school district
under a written continuing or temporary teaching
contract, has averaged qualitative and
quantitative ratings of at least "effective" as
measured pursuant to the TLE for the four-year
period, and has received qualitative and
quantitative ratings of at least "effective" for
the last two (2) years of the four-year period,
or

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(3) has completed four (4) or more consecutive complete school years in one school district under a written continuing or temporary teaching contract and has not met the requirements of subparagraph a or b of this paragraph, only if the principal of the school at which the teacher is employed submits a petition to the superintendent of the school district requesting that the teacher be granted career status, the superintendent agrees with the petition, and the school district board of education approves the petition. The principal shall specify in the petition the underlying facts supporting the granting of career status to the teacher;

- 5. "Teacher hearing" means the hearing before a school district board of education after a recommendation for dismissal or nonreemployment of a teacher has been made but before any final action is taken on the recommendation, held for the purpose of affording the teacher all rights guaranteed by the United States Constitution and the Constitution of Oklahoma under circumstances and for enabling the board to determine whether to approve or disapprove the recommendation;
 - 6. "Probationary teacher" means a teacher who:

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- a. for teachers employed by a school district prior to

 full implementation of the Oklahoma Teacher and Leader

 Effectiveness Evaluation System (TLE) as set forth in

 Section 6-101.10 of this title, has completed fewer

 than three (3) consecutive complete school years as a

 teacher in one school district under a written

 teaching contract, or
- b. for teachers employed for the first time by a school district under a written teaching contract after full implementation of the Oklahoma Teacher and Leader Effectiveness Evaluation System (TLE) as set forth in Section 6-101.10 of this title, has not met the requirements for career teacher as provided in paragraph 4 of this section;

7. "Suspension" or "suspended" means the temporary discontinuance of the services of an administrator or teacher, as provided by law; and

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- 8. "Teacher" means a duly certified person who is employed to serve as a counselor, librarian or school nurse or in any instructional capacity; an administrator shall be considered a teacher only with regard to service in an instructional, nonadministrative capacity defined as a teacher in Section 1-116 of this title.
- SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 1210.508, as last amended by Section 8, Chapter 430, O.S.L. 2014 (70 O.S. Supp. 2015, Section 1210.508), is amended to read as follows:
- Section 1210.508 A. 1. The Until the 2016-2017 school year, the State Board of Education shall develop adopt and administer a series of criterion-referenced tests assessments designed to indicate whether the subject matter standards, as defined by the State Board of Education, which Oklahoma public school students are expected to have attained have been achieved. The Board may develop and administer any criterion-referenced test in any subject not required by federal law, contingent upon the availability of funding.
- 2. In order to transition from the criterion-referenced

 assessments for grades three through eight as administered by the

 Board during the 2015-2016 school year to nationally recognized

assessments as provided for in subsection B of this section, during
the 2016-2017 school year the Board shall continue to administer the
criterion-referenced assessments for grades three through eight in:

- a. reading/English language arts,
- b. mathematics, and

- c. science in grade five and grade eight only.
- 3. In order to transition from the end-of-instruction criterion-referenced assessments for grades nine through twelve as administered by the Board during the 2015-2016 school year to a nationally recognized assessment or assessments as provided for in subsection C of this section, during the 2016-2017 school year the Board shall continue to administer the end-of-instruction criterion-referenced assessments to students in grades nine through twelve who complete instruction in a course in the following subjects:
 - a. Algebra I,
 - b. English II,
 - c. Biology I, and
 - d. United States History.

During the 2016-2017 school year, the performance level on the endof-instruction criterion-referenced assessments shall be calculated
in the final course grade of the student and shall constitute not
less than twenty percent (20%) of the final course grade. School
districts shall report the performance level on the end-of-

- 3. The State Board of Education in consultation with the

 Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability shall adopt

 assessments from the selected proposals that were submitted pursuant

 to paragraph 1 of this subsection for grades three through eight

 that are aligned with the Oklahoma subject matter standards as

 adopted by the Board and which yield both norm-referenced scores and

 criterion-referenced scores. The adopted assessments shall be

 administered by the Board for a period of not less than eight (8)

 consecutive years unless the vendor does not comply with or violates

 the terms of the contract. The Board shall administer the

 assessments beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.
- 4. Contingent upon the availability of state and federal funds, the Board, in accordance with federal law, shall administer criterion-referenced tests the assessments adopted pursuant to paragraph 3 of this subsection for grades three and four in:

a. reading/English language arts, and

1	b. mathematics.

The Board shall administer the tests for grade eight in reading and mathematics online with raw score test results reported immediately and complete results reported in less than two (2) weeks beginning in the 2007-08 school year.

6. Except as otherwise provided for in Section 1210.523 of this title, each student who completes the instruction for English II, English III, United States History, Biology I, Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II at the secondary level shall complete an end-ofinstruction test, when implemented, to measure for attainment in the appropriate subject matter standards in order to graduate from a public high school with a standard diploma. All students shall take the tests prior to graduation, unless otherwise exempt by law. The State Board of Education shall administer the criterion-referenced tests. The Board shall develop and field test the end-ofinstruction tests in English III, Geometry, and Algebra II during the 2006-07 school year, implement the tests during the 2007-08 school year, and administer them each year thereafter. The Board shall administer the multiple choice portion of the end-ofinstruction tests online with raw score test results reported

immediately and complete results reported in less than two (2) weeks beginning in the 2008-09 school year.

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The end-of-instruction tests shall serve the purpose of the criterion-referenced tests as provided in paragraph 1 of this subsection. The English II and English III end-of-instruction tests shall include a writing component. Students who do not score at least at the proficient level shall be afforded the opportunity to retake each test up to three (3) times each calendar year until at least achieving at the proficient level. In order to provide an indication of the levels of competency attained by the student in a permanent record for potential future employers and institutions of higher education, for students who enter the ninth grade in or prior to the 2007-08 school year, school districts shall report the highest-achieved state test performance level on the end-ofinstruction tests on the student's high school transcript. Beginning with students who enter the ninth grade in the 2008-09 school year, school districts shall report the highest-achieved state test performance level on the end-of-instruction tests and any business and industry-recognized endorsements attained on the student's high school transcript. Any student at the middle school level who completes the instruction in a secondary course specified in this paragraph shall be administered the appropriate end-ofinstruction test.

7. a. Each school district shall administer to each student in the school district in grades three through eight an assessment designed to assess the student in the fine arts area in which the student has received instruction.

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- b. Each school district shall prepare an annual report

 for approval by the State Board of Education outlining
 the fine arts assessment strategies used by the

 district, when the assessments were administered, how
 many students were assessed during the previous year,
 and the results of the assessments.
- B. C. 1. The State Board of Education in consultation with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability, the State Board of Career and Technology Education and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce shall issue a request for proposals for the selection of an assessment or assessments to be administered for grades nine through twelve. The request for proposals shall solicit for a nationally recognized assessment or assessments that:
 - a. align with the Oklahoma subject matter standards for

 English language arts, mathematics, science and United

 States history as adopted by the Board,
 - <u>b.</u> <u>yield both norm-referenced scores and criterion-</u> referenced scores, and

c. are predictive of college- and career-readiness.

- 2. The State Board of Education in consultation with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability, the State Board of Career and Technology Education and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce shall adopt an assessment or assessments from the selected proposals that were submitted pursuant to paragraph 1 of this subsection for grades nine through twelve that are aligned with the Oklahoma subject matter standards as adopted by the Board and which yield both norm-referenced scores and criterion-referenced scores. The adopted assessment or assessments shall be administered by the Board for a period of not less than eight (8) consecutive years unless the vendor of the assessment or assessments does not comply with or violates the terms of the contract. The Board shall administer the assessment beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.
- 3. Beginning with students entering the ninth grade in the
 2017-2018 school year, each student by the end of the eleventh grade
 shall take the assessment or assessments adopted by the Board

 pursuant to paragraph 1 of this subsection to measure for attainment
 in the appropriate subject matter standards in order to graduate
 from a public high school with a standard diploma. All students
 shall take the assessment or assessments prior to graduation, unless
 otherwise exempt by law.

4. Beginning with students entering the ninth grade in the

2017-2018 school year, each student, in addition to taking the

assessment or assessments as required pursuant to this subsection,

shall meet any other assessment requirements adopted by the Board

pursuant to subsection D of this section in order to graduate from a

public high school with a standard diploma.

- 5. In order to provide an indication of the levels of competency attained by the student in a permanent record for potential future employers and institutions of higher education, school districts shall report on the high school transcript of the student the highest-achieved composite score on the assessment or assessments and any business- and industry-recognized endorsements attained.
- D. 1. The State Board of Education in consultation with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability, the State Board of Career and Technology Education and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce shall develop assessment requirements students shall meet in order to graduate from a public high school with a standard diploma. In developing the high school graduation assessment requirements, the State Board of Education in consultation with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, the Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability, the State Board of Career and Technology Education and the Oklahoma Department of Commerce shall:

1	<u>a.</u>	consider other criteria to be used in conjunction with
2		the assessment or assessments adopted pursuant to

4	<u>b.</u>	consider alternative assessments that may be used in
5		place of the adopted assessment,
6	<u>C.</u>	determine the performance level on the assessments at
7		which students will be provided remediation or
8		intervention and the type of remediation or
9		intervention to be offered,
10	<u>d.</u>	ensure that assessment results are included in the
11		accountability measures for school districts and
12		teachers,
13	<u>e.</u>	ensure that the adopted assessment meets the
14		requirements of the Elementary and Secondary Education
15		Act of 1965, as reauthorized by P.L. No. 114-95, also
16		known as the Every Student Succeeds Act,
17	<u>f.</u>	determine when a student is eligible to take and
18		retake the assessment or assessments, and
19	<u>g.</u>	consider means for ensuring student accountability on
20		the assessments including, but not limited to,
21		calculating assessment scores in the final grade or
22		grade-point average of a student.
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2. In developing the high school graduation assessment requirements, the Board shall hold public meetings and solicit public input.

- 3. The Board shall make a report of the requirements by October 31, 2016.
 - 4. By January 1, 2017, the Board shall adopt high school graduation assessment requirements as recommended pursuant to this subsection. The requirements shall be subject to legislative review as set forth in this subsection. The requirements shall not be implemented by the Board until the legislative review process is completed as provided for in this subsection.
 - 5. After adoption of the requirements, the Board shall submit

 the adopted standards to the Speaker of the House of Representatives

 or a designee and the President Pro Tempore of the Senate or a

 designee prior to the last thirty (30) days of the legislative

 session.
- 6. By adoption of a joint resolution, the Legislature shall approve the requirements in whole or in part and with or without instructions, disapprove the requirements in whole or in part and with or without instructions or amend the requirements in whole or in part, provided that such joint resolution becomes law in accordance with Section 11 of Article VI of the Oklahoma

 Constitution. If the joint resolution is vetoed by the Governor in accordance with Section 11 of Article VI of the Oklahoma

Constitution and the veto has not been overridden, the requirements

shall be deemed disapproved. If the Legislature fails to adopt a

joint resolution within thirty (30) legislative days following

submission of the requirements, the requirements shall be deemed

disapproved.

- 7. If the requirements are disapproved in whole and with or without instructions as provided for in this subsection, the Board may adopt new requirements and submit the new requirements for legislative review pursuant to this subsection. If the requirements are approved in part with instructions, disapproved in whole or in part with instructions or are amended, the State Board of Education may revise the requirements in accordance with the legislative instructions or changes and implement the requirements.
- 8. If the requirements are disapproved in whole or in part and the Board does not act to resubmit new requirements or revise the requirements in accordance with the legislative instructions, the assessment or assessments adopted pursuant to subsection C of this section shall be administered by the Board beginning with the 2017-2018 school year, and the performance level on the assessment or assessments shall be calculated in the final grade or grade point average of the student until otherwise provided for by law.
- 9. Upon final approval of the requirements, the requirements shall be considered final agency rules. The Board shall submit a copy of the requirements to the Secretary of State, who shall

include the requirements in the publication known as the "Oklahoma

Administrative Code" in the same manner as agency rules are

published in the Code as provided for in the Administrative

Procedures Act. All requirements approved and published as provided

for in this subsection shall have the same force and effect of law

as agency rules promulgated pursuant to the Administrative

Procedures Act.

10. Unless otherwise provided by specific vote of the

Legislature, joint resolutions introduced for purposes of approving,

disapproving or amending the requirements shall not be subject to

regular legislative cutoff dates, shall be limited to such

provisions as may be necessary for approving, disapproving or

amending the requirements and any such other direction or mandate

regarding the requirements deemed necessary by the Legislature. The

joint resolution shall contain no other provisions.

E. All criterion-referenced tests assessments required by this section shall measure academic competencies in correlation with the subject matter standards adopted by the Board pursuant to Sections 11-103.6 and 11-103.6a of this title and shall not include standards or assessment questions as proscribed in subsection H of Section 11-103.6a of this title. The State Board of Education shall evaluate the subject matter standards to ensure the competencies reflect high standards, are specific, well-defined, measurable, challenging, and will prepare elementary students for next-grade-level course work

and secondary students for postsecondary studies at institutions of higher education or technology center schools without the need for remediation. All subject matter standards shall reflect the goals as set forth in Section 11-103.6 of this title, prepare secondary students for taking and achieving high scores on any assessment used by institutions of higher education to determine college readiness and of improving improve the state average ACT score.

2. F. The State Department of Education shall annually evaluate the results of the criterion-referenced tests assessments required by this section. The State Board of Education shall ensure that test the results of assessments required by this section are reported to districts in a manner that yields detailed, diagnostic information for the purpose of guiding instruction and student remediation. As improvements are made to the criterion-referenced tests assessments required by this section, the Board shall seek to increase the depth of knowledge assessed for each subject. The State Board of Education shall seek to ensure that data yielded from the tests assessments required in this section are utilized at the school district level to prescribe reinforcement and/or or remediation by requiring school districts to develop and implement a specific program of improvement based on the test assessment

3. G. The State Board of Education in coordination with the Office of Educational Quality and Accountability shall review,

realign, and recalibrate, as necessary, the tests assessments in reading and mathematics in third through eighth grade and the endof-instruction tests as required in this section. The Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability shall determine the cut scores for the performance levels on the end-of-instruction tests developed criterion-referenced assessment portion and scores of the assessments administered pursuant to paragraph 6 of subsection A of this section. The Commission shall conduct an ongoing review to compare the end-of-instruction test content and performance descriptors of the assessments required in this section with those of other states. Upon receipt of the review, the Commission may adjust the cut scores as necessary.

4. H. The State Board of Education, for the purposes of conducting reliability and validity studies, monitoring contractor adherence to professionally accepted testing assessment standards, and providing recommendations for testing program improvement, shall retain the services of an established, independent agency or organization that is nationally recognized for its technical expertise in educational testing assessment but is not engaged in the development of aptitude or achievement tests assessments for elementary or secondary level grades. These national assessment experts shall annually conduct studies of the reliability and validity of the end of instruction tests assessments administered in grades nine through twelve pursuant to this section. Validity

studies shall include studies of decision validity and concurrent validity.

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C. I. 1. The State Board of Education shall set the testing window dates for each eriterion-referenced test assessment required in paragraphs 1 through 5 of subsection A of this section for grades three through eight so that, with the exception of the writing assessments, the tests assessments are administered to students no earlier than April 10 each year and so that the test assessment results are reported back to school districts in a timely manner. Each criterion-referenced test required in paragraph 6 of subsection A of this section may be administered to students at a time set by the State Board of Education as near as possible to the end of the course; provided, if a school district is unable to administer the tests online to all students taking the test for the first time and all students retaking the test during the testing window time set by the Board, the school district may elect to administer any of the tests to students retaking the test at any time not more than two (2) weeks prior to the start of the testing window time set by the Board. All results and reports of the criterion-referenced test series assessments required in paragraphs 1 through 5 of subsection A of this section for grades three through eight shall be returned to each school district prior to the beginning of the next school year. The vendor shall provide a final electronic data file of all school site, school district, and state results to the State

- Department of Education and the Office of Educational Quality and
 Accountability prior to September 1 of each year. The Department
 shall forward the final data files for each school district and each
 school site in that district to the school district. The Board
 shall ensure the contract with the testing vendor includes a
 provision that the vendor report test assessment results directly to
 the Office of Educational Quality and Accountability at the same
 time it is reported to the Board.
 - assessments required in this section shall be disaggregated by gender, race, ethnicity, disability status, migrant status, English proficiency, and status as economically disadvantaged, except that such disaggregation shall not be required in a case in which the number of students in a category is insufficient to yield statistically reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual student.

 Each school site shall notify the every student's parents of the school's performance levels in the Oklahoma School Testing Program as reported in the Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program at the end of each school year.

D. J. The State Board of Education shall be solely responsible for and shall control and have discretion over the development, field-testing, and validation adoption and administration of the criterion-referenced test series assessments required in subsection

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A of this section. In the interest of economy the Board may participate in a multistate or multigovernmental cooperative pursuant to the requirements of The Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act, but shall not bind the state, contractually or otherwise, to the authority of any other state, organization or entity which may supersede the authority of the Board, for the purpose of adapting criterion-referenced tests or augmenting assessments, to the extent that such tests assessments are appropriate for use in the testing program Oklahoma School Testing Program to be administered to Oklahoma students.
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E. K. The State Board of Education shall develop, administer, and incorporate as a part of the Oklahoma School Testing Program, other testing assessment programs or procedures, including appropriate accommodations for the testing assessment of students with disabilities as required by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), 20 USC, Section 1400 et seq.

F. L. For purposes of developing and administering alternate

alternative assessments for students with the most significant

cognitive disabilities, the State Board of Education shall not be

subject to subsections D and E of Section 11-103.6a of this title.
