AMENDATORY 40 O.S. 2011, Section 198.1, is amended to read as follows: 14 Section 198.1. It shall be unlawful for any A. No employer 15 16 within the State of Oklahoma to willfully pay wages to women 17 employees at a rate shall discriminate in any way in the payment of wages, benefits or other compensation, as between the sexes, or pay 18 any person in the employ of the employer salary or wage rates less 19 20 than the rate at which he pays any employee rates paid to employees of the opposite sex for comparable work on jobs which have 21 comparable requirements relating to skill, effort and 22 23 responsibility, except where such payment is made pursuant to a 24 seniority of like or comparable character or work on like or

- 2 | benefits or other compensation shall not be prohibited if based
- 3 upon:
- 4 1. A system that rewards seniority with the employer; provided,
- 5 | however, that time spent on leave due to a pregnancy-related
- 6 | condition and federally protected parental, family and medical
- 7 | leave, shall not reduce seniority; a
- 8 2. A merit system; a
- 9 <u>3. A</u> system which measures earnings by quantity or quality of 10 production or sales;
- 11 4. The geographic location in which a job is performed;
- 5. Education, training or experience to the extent such factors
- 13 | are reasonably related to the particular job in question and
- 14 | consistent with business necessity;
- 15 6. Travel, if the travel is a regular and necessary condition
- 16 of the particular job; or a
- 7. A differential based on any factor other than sex.
- 18 An employer who is paying a wage differential in violation of
- 19 this section shall not reduce the pay of any employee in order to
- 20 | comply with this section.
- 21 B. It shall be unlawful for an employer to discharge or in any
- 22 other manner discriminate against an employee because the employee
- 23 has inquired about, discussed or disclosed the wages of the employee
- 24 or another employee with someone employed by the company; however,

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1 an employer may prohibit a human resource employee, supervisor or
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- 2 other employee whose job responsibilities require and allow access
- 3 | to other employees' wage information from disclosing such
- 4 | information except as may be required or allowed in the legitimate
- 5 | exercise of their job responsibilities or an employer may discipline
- 6 or discharge such employee for disclosing any prohibited wage

- 9 having one hundred or more employees.

- 12 Section 198.2. It shall be the duty of the Commissioner of
- 13 | Labor to enforce the provisions of this act Section 198.1 of this
- 14 | title. Whenever the Commissioner is informed of any alleged
- 15 | violations thereof, it shall be his or her duty to investigate same
- 16 and, in his discretion, said. The Commissioner is hereby authorized
- 17 to institute proceedings for the enforcement of penalties herein
- 18 provided before any court of competent jurisdiction violations of
- 19 the provisions of Section 198.1 of this title. Any employer who
- 20 | violates the provisions of this act shall be deemed guilty of a
- 21 | misdemeanor and shall upon conviction thereof, be punished by The
- 22 Commissioner is authorized to impose a fine of not less than Twenty-
- 23 | five Dollars (\$25.00) One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) nor more than
- 24 One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for each

1	separate violation per pay period. In addition, upon a finding by
2	the Commissioner of Labor of a violation under this act, the
3	employer shall pay any back pay found to be owed to the employee.
