22	SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law not to be		
23	codified in the Oklahoma Statutes reads as follows:

A. Certain historical documents, monuments and writings have been recognized to commemorate freedom, the rule of law and the rich history of Oklahoma and the United States of America.

- B. The Ten Commandments, Magna Carta, Mayflower Compact,

 Declaration of Independence, United States Constitution, Bill of

 Rights, Constitution of the Great State of Oklahoma, and other such

 historically significant documents are recognized throughout the

 world.
- C. The Ten Commandments, Magna Carta, Mayflower Compact,

 Declaration of Independence, United States Constitution, Bill of

 Rights, Constitution of the Great State of Oklahoma, and other such

 historically significant documents are treasures that should be

 displayed proudly and resolutely in public buildings and on public

 grounds.
- SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 2101 of Title 25, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
- A. Every county, municipality, city, town, school or any other political subdivision is authorized to display, in its public buildings and on its grounds, replicas of historical documents including, but not limited to, the Ten Commandments, Magna Carta, Mayflower Compact, Declaration of Independence, United States Constitution, Bill of Rights, Oklahoma Constitution and other historically significant documents in the form of statues,

            In the event that the legality or constitutionality of any

        SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2017.
