8 AS INTRODUCED

9 A Resolution sending heartfelt remembrances to the
10 families, friends and neighbors of those killed in
11 the terrorist bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal
12 Building; encouraging citizens to pause to remember
13 those who died; sending heartfelt remembrances to
14 those injured in the bombing and expressing gratitude
15 to those who answered the call for help; and
16 directing distribution.

17 WHEREAS, on April 19, 1995, at 9:02 a.m., a terrorist detonated
18 a truck bomb at the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in Oklahoma
19 City; and

20 WHEREAS, this was one of the worst terrorist attacks ever to
21 occur on United States soil, taking the lives of 168 people and
22 injuring more than 850 others, many of them United States government
23 employees who worked in the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building; and

24 WHEREAS, this cowardly act of domestic terrorism directly
25 affected thousands of families and horrified millions of people
26 across the state and across the nation; and

1 WHEREAS, the people of Oklahoma and the United States responded
2 to this tragedy through the remarkable efforts of local, state, and
3 federal law enforcement personnel, firefighters, search and rescue
4 teams, public and private medical personnel, other emergency
5 services personnel, and thousands of volunteers from the community
6 who saved lives, assisted the injured and wounded, comforted the
7 bereaved, and provided meals and support to those who came to
8 Oklahoma City to offer assistance; and

9 WHEREAS, this courageous response set what has come to be known
10 as the "Oklahoma Standard", which was later emulated by many
11 Americans following the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001; and

12 WHEREAS, following the 1995 attack, the people of Oklahoma and
13 the United States pledged to build and maintain a permanent national
14 memorial to remember those who were killed, those who survived, and
15 those changed forever; and

16 WHEREAS, this pledge was fulfilled by establishing the Oklahoma
17 City National Memorial, which draws hundreds of thousands of
18 visitors from around the world every year to the site of the attack;
19 and

20 WHEREAS, the inscription on the wall of the Oklahoma City
21 National Memorial reads: "We come here to remember those who were
22 killed, those who survived and those changed forever. May all who
23 leave here know the impact of violence. May this memorial offer
24 comfort, strength, peace, hope and serenity."; and

1 WHEREAS, the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building has been replaced
2 with a new, safe, secure, and functional federal building in
3 downtown Oklahoma City that houses many of the offices once housed
4 in the Murrah Building, sending a message that the people and
5 government of the United States will not be cowed by terrorists; and

6 WHEREAS, the 22nd anniversary of the terrorist bombing of the
7 Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building is April 19, 2017.

8 NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
9 OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 56TH LEGISLATURE:

10 THAT the Oklahoma House of Representatives sends its heartfelt
11 remembrances to the families, friends, and neighbors of the 168
12 people killed in the terrorist bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah
13 Federal Building in Oklahoma City.

14 THAT the Oklahoma House of Representatives encourages all
15 citizens of the state to pause for 168 seconds on April 19, 2017, to
16 remember the 168 people who died in this senseless tragedy.

17 THAT the Oklahoma House of Representatives sends its heartfelt
18 remembrances to those injured in the bombing and expresses gratitude
19 to the thousands of first responders, rescue workers, medical
20 personnel, and volunteers from the community and across the nation
21 who answered the call for help on the morning of the attack and in
22 the days and weeks thereafter.
