- SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 637.2 of Title 59, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

Unless otherwise prohibited by law, a valid physician-patient relationship may be established by a physician with a patient located in this state through telemedicine, where patient care, treatment or services are provided through the use of medical information exchanged from one site to another via electronic communications, provided that the physician:

- 1. Holds an unrestricted license to practice medicine in this state:
- 2. Confirms with the patient the patient's identity and physical location;
- 3. Provides the patient with the treating physician's identity and professional credentials; and
- 4. Obtains the appropriate consent, directly or indirectly, from the patient after appropriate disclosures regarding the

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delivery models and treatment methods or limitations of the use of telemedicine technologies. SECTION 3.
