NEW LAW 15 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 6060.31 of Title 36, unless 16 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 17 Section 6060.31 A. For all plans issued or renewed on or after 18 November 1, 2018, a health benefit plan shall provide coverage for 19 the diagnosis, evaluation and treatment of lymphedema. The coverage 20 required by this section shall include benefits for equipment, 21 supplies, complex decongestive therapy, gradient compression 22 garments and self-management training and education if the treatment 23 is determined to be medically necessary and is provided by a

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licensed occupational or physical therapist or licensed nurse that

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has experience providing this treatment or other licensed health care professional whose treatment of lymphedema is within the professional's scope of practice.

- B. The same deductibles, co-insurance and other limitations for similar services covered under the health benefit plan shall also apply to coverage for the diagnosis, evaluation and treatment of lymphedema required to be covered under this section.
 - C. As used in this section, "gradient compression garments":
 - 1. Require a prescription;
 - 2. Are custom-fit for the covered individual; and
- 3. Do not include disposable medical supplies such as over-thecounter compression or elastic knee-high or other stocking products.
- SECTION 2. This act shall become effective November 1, 2018.

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
