7	AS INTRODUCED
8	A Concurrent Resolution commemorating American Indians and tribal nations through a showing of
9	respect for the losses suffered by American Indians during removal to the State of Oklahoma; directing that a moment of silence be observed in memory of the
11	hardships endured by American Indians during the removal of Indian tribes to Oklahoma; and directing
12	distribution.
13	
14	WHEREAS, the State of Oklahoma was previously designated as
15	Indian Territory before statehood in 1907, and is currently the home
16	of 38 federally recognized Indian tribes who have ancestral
17	homelands spanning from coast to coast; and
18	WHEREAS, American Indian people have played an integral role in
19	United States history and have contributed to the success and proud
20	heritage of the State of Oklahoma; and
21	WHEREAS, American Indian tribal nations each have a unique and
22	distinguished culture, including languages, spiritual customs,
23	origin stories, music and arts that portray the history and societal
24	structure of each tribe; and

WHEREAS, the United States entered into hundreds of treaties with Indian tribes and assumed many responsibilities in exchange for millions of acres of tribal lands; and

WHEREAS, the forced relocation of several tribes to Indian

Territory, west of the Mississippi River, severely damaged the

government-to-government relationship between tribal governments and

the federal government; and

WHEREAS, the Indian Removal Act, enacted by Congress in 1830 and signed into law by President Andrew Jackson, defied United States

Supreme Court decisions and led to the removal of millions of

American Indians from their historic homelands; and

WHEREAS, due to federal removal policies, tribal nations were forced to travel great distances, through harsh conditions, to modern-day Oklahoma; and

WHEREAS, this forced migration resulted in not only the loss of all that the tribal nations owned but also extreme physical suffering and heartbreak, and led to the deaths of thousands of innocent American Indians; and

WHEREAS, following forced removal to Indian Territory most tribes were provided false promises and hope for a better life but, as settlers encroached on their new lands, were further displaced without legal protection or representation; and

WHEREAS, of the tribes that were already residing in Oklahoma and those that were relocated through removal, all contributed to

the formation and progress of the State of Oklahoma, and today tribal governments in Oklahoma honor and remember their ancestors' sacrifices and journey to a new land; and

WHEREAS, these tribes have persevered by overcoming the hardships inflicted upon them and rebuilt effective governments which today enable the tribes to provide critical social services for their tribal citizens, including health care, housing and education; and

WHEREAS, tribal governments and tribal businesses generate billions of dollars in revenue for core services in Oklahoma and tribes are responsible for creating thousands of jobs, building critical infrastructure and providing economic development opportunities that benefit all Oklahomans; and

WHEREAS, due to the immeasurable impact of tribal nations on the success of the State of Oklahoma, it is crucial that we honor and remember the great sacrifices of their ancestors who endured the horrors of the Trail of Tears and other forced removals and that we commemorate their respective journeys to rebuild the great Indian Nations that we know today.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 56TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE, THE SENATE CONCURRING THEREIN:

THAT the Oklahoma Legislature hereby commemorates American Indians and tribal nations through a showing of respect for the
