Impact:	FY-19: possible negative fiscal impact for DOC

Research Analysis

The Senate amendments to HB 1483 increases from 3 to 5 business days after the court orders the judgment and sentence by which the county must transmit the judgement and sentence to the Department of Corrections. The measure requires the Department of Corrections to establish a method for issuing receipts certifying that the Department has received the judgment and sentence document. The measure requires the Department of Corrections to notify the county if the judgment and sentence document includes inaccurate information. If a corrected judgment and sentence document is not received by the Department within 5 business days from the date of notification, the Department will not be responsible for the cost of housing the inmate in the county jail until such time that an accurate judgment and sentence documents is received by the Department.

The measure provides that the reimbursement rate is \$27 per day unless the actual daily cost exceeds \$27. If the actual daily cost exceeds \$27, the county must notify the Department no later than September 30. The Department may accept that cost and begin paying the reimbursement rate to the county beginning the next fiscal year. If the Department does not accept the county rate, the State Auditor shall determine the actual daily cost.

Fiscal Analysis

The Senate amendment to HB 1483 is estimated to have a negative fiscal impact for the agency beginning in FY-19. Currently, DOC pays all county jails no more than \$27.00 per day per inmate. Below are the current annual costs from DOC for county jail back up:

This measure increases the 3-day rule to 5 days. The bill allows counties to exceed the stated reimbursement cap under certain circumstances as well. This would have to be approved by DOC. If it is not, the daily rate for a specific county would be up to the State Auditor to decide for the next fiscal year. This could create a negative impact on DOC, but that would depend on how many counties claim to require a rate over the set \$27/day per inmate and the State Auditor's determination.
