Impact:	CIB, a nonappropriated agency: Anticipates minimum negative impact of approximately \$40,000 to the agency in the first year. Cost offsets will be dependent on the number of applications pursued.

Research Analysis

HB 2936, as introduced, directs the Construction Industries Board to issue licenses to licensed electrical apprentices, defined as a person certified as having 10,000 or more hours experience as an apprentice and complied with other provisions of the Electrical License Act. The measure also directs the board to register student electrical interns, as long as applicants are at least 16 years of age, enrolled in high school and enrolled in a work-ready program recognized by the board.

Finally, the measure provides that a licensed electrical apprentice may not supervise a student electrical intern or another apprentice, and does not count against the maximum number of apprentices that may be under the supervision of a journeyman or contractor. One student electrical intern may work on a job site under a single journeyman or contractor.

Fiscal Analysis

Per the Construction Industries Board (CIB), a nonappropriated agency, the fiscal impact for this measure, would be approximately \$40,000 to the agency in the first year. The measure would require a software update to the agency for the new classifications required. The agency would need one FTE to maintain the new records. CIB is working with OMES, and the estimated cost for the software is approximately \$10,000. The FTE to maintain the database has an estimated salary of \$29,736, annually. Cost offsets for this measure will be dependent on the number of applications pursued.
