8	An Act relating to pharmacy; 59 O.S. 2011, Section 353.7, as last amended by Section 4, Chapter 106,
9	O.S.L. 2018 (59 O.S. Supp. 2018, Section 353.7), which relates to powers of the State Board of
10	Pharmacy; adding certain powers and duties; and providing an effective date.
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13	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
14	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2011, Section 353.7, as
15	last amended by Section 4, Chapter 106, O.S.L. 2018 (59 O.S. Supp.
16	2018, Section 353.7), is amended to read as follows:
17	Section 353.7. The State Board of Pharmacy shall have the power
18	and duty to:
19	1. Regulate the practice of pharmacy;
20	2. Regulate the sale and distribution of drugs, medicines,
21	chemicals and poisons;
22	3. Regulate the dispensing of drugs and medicines in all places
23	where drugs and medicines are compounded and/or dispensed;
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4. Examine and issue appropriate certificates of licensure as
 Doctor of Pharmacy to all applicants whom the Board deems qualified
 under the provisions of the Oklahoma Pharmacy Act;

5. Issue licenses to manufacturers, repackagers, outsourcing
facilities, wholesale distributors, third-party logistics providers,
pharmacies, and other dispensers, medical gas suppliers, and medical
gas distributors;

8 6. Issue sterile compounding and drug supplier permits for
9 pharmacies at the fee set by the Board, with the expiration date of
10 such permits to coincide with the pharmacy license annual expiration
11 date;

12 7. Prescribe minimum standards with respect to floor space and other physical characteristics of pharmacies and hospital drug rooms 13 as may be reasonably necessary for the maintenance of professional 14 surroundings and for the protection of the safety and welfare of the 15 public, and to refuse the issuance of new or renewal licenses for 16 failure to comply with such standards. Minimum standards for 17 hospital drug rooms shall be consistent with the State Department of 18 Health, Hospital Standards, as defined in OAC 310:667; 19

8. Authorize its inspectors, compliance officers, and duly
 authorized representatives to enter and inspect any and all places,
 including premises, vehicles, equipment, contents and records, where
 drugs, medicines, chemicals, or poisons are stored, sold, vended,

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1 given away, compounded, dispensed, manufactured, repackaged or 2 transported;

3 9. Employ the number of inspectors and pharmacist compliance officers necessary in the investigation of criminal activity or 4 5 preparation of administrative actions at an annual salary to be fixed by the Board, and to authorize necessary expenses. Any 6 inspector certified as a peace officer by the Council of Enforcement 7 Education and Training shall have statewide jurisdiction to perform 8 9 the duties authorized by this section. In addition, the inspectors 10 shall be considered peace officers and shall have the same powers 11 and authority as that granted to peace officers. In addition, such 12 inspectors or pharmacist compliance officers shall have the authority to take and copy records and the duty to confiscate all 13 drugs, medicines, chemicals or poisons found to be stored, sold, 14 vended, given away, compounded, dispensed or manufactured contrary 15 to the provisions of the Oklahoma Pharmacy Act; 16

17 10. Investigate complaints, subpoena witnesses and records,
18 initiate prosecution, and hold hearings;

19 11. Administer oaths in all manners pertaining to the affairs 20 of the Board and to take evidence and compel the attendance of 21 witnesses on questions pertaining to the enforcement of the Oklahoma 22 Pharmacy Act;

12. Reprimand, place on probation, suspend, revoke permanentlyand levy fines not to exceed Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00) for

1 each count for which any person charged with violating the Oklahoma 2 Pharmacy Act or Oklahoma Board of Pharmacy administrative rules has 3 been convicted in Board hearings. The Board also may take other disciplinary action. The Board may impose as part of any 4 5 disciplinary action the payment of costs expended by the Board for any legal fees and costs, including, but not limited to, staff time, 6 salary and travel expense, witness fees and attorney fees. 7 The Board may also require additional continuing education, including 8 9 attendance at a live continuing education program, and may require 10 participation in a rehabilitation program for the impaired. The 11 Board may take such actions singly or in combination, as the nature 12 of the violation requires;

13 13. Adopt and establish rules of professional conduct 14 appropriate to the establishment and maintenance of a high standard 15 of integrity and dignity in the profession of pharmacy. Such rules 16 shall be subject to amendment or repeal by the Board as the need may 17 arise;

Make and publish rules such as may be necessary for 18 14. carrying out and enforcing the provisions of the Oklahoma Pharmacy 19 Act, Oklahoma drug laws and rules, federal drug laws and 20 regulations, and make such other rules as in its discretion may be 21 necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the public; 22 15. Establish and collect appropriate fees for licenses, 23 permits, inspections, and services provided; and such fees shall be 24

nonrefundable. Such fees shall be promulgated to implement the
 provisions of the Oklahoma Pharmacy Act under the provisions of the
 Administrative Procedures Act;

4 16. Regulate:

- a. personnel working in a pharmacy, such as interns and
  supportive personnel, including technicians, and issue
  pharmacy technician permits and intern licenses,
- b. interns, preceptors and training areas through which
  the training of applicants occurs for licensure as a
  pharmacist, and
- c. such persons regarding all aspects relating to the handling of drugs, medicines, chemicals, and poisons;
  17. Ensure that all Oklahoma-licensed pharmacies, inside and outside the state, are in compliance with all laws and regulations
  governing pharmacies, including but not limited to laws and
- 16 regulations related to:
- 17 <u>a.</u> <u>technician-to-pharmacist ratio</u>, which shall not exceed 18 a two-to-one (2:1) ratio, and

19 <u>b.</u> storage requirements for medications until received by 20 the patient;

21 <u>18.</u> Acquire by purchase, lease, gift, solicitation of gift or 22 by any other manner, and to maintain, use and operate or to contract 23 for the maintenance, use and operation of or lease of any and all 24 property of any kind, real, personal or mixed or any interest

1 therein unless otherwise provided by the Oklahoma Pharmacy Act;
2 provided, all contracts for real property shall be subject to the
3 provisions of Section 63 of Title 74 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

4 <u>18. 19.</u> Perform other such duties, exercise other such powers
5 and employ such personnel as the provisions and enforcement of the
6 Oklahoma Pharmacy Act may require; and

7 19. 20. Approve pilot projects designed to utilize new or 8 expanded technology or processes and provide patients with better 9 pharmacy products or provide pharmacy services in a more safe and 10 efficient manner. Such approvals may include provisions granting 11 exemptions to any rule adopted by the Board; and

12 <u>21. Set a maximum number of prescriptions per shift that a</u> 13 <u>pharmacist may fill, which shall not exceed five hundred (500)</u> 14 <u>prescriptions</u>.

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
