1 ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 362 By: Stanislawski of the Senate 2 and 3 Baker of the House 4 5 6 [ State Aid Formula - school district budgets average daily membership - withholding of State Aid -7 calculation of State Aid - effective date ] 8 9 10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA: SECTION 1. 11 AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 5-155, is 12 amended to read as follows: 13 Section 5-155. A. The school district budget shall represent a complete plan for the school district and shall present information 14 15 necessary and proper to disclose the financial position and condition of the school district and the revenues and expenditures 16 thereof, both past and anticipated. 17 B. A school district budget shall contain a budget summary. It 18 shall also be accompanied by a budget message which shall explain 19 the budget and describe its important features. It shall contain at 20 least the following in tabular form for each fund: 21 1. Actual revenues and expenditures for the immediate prior 22 23 fiscal year; 24

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1 2. Revenues and expenditures for the current fiscal year as 2 shown by the budget for the current year as adopted or amended; and 3 3. Estimates of revenues and expenditures for the budget year. С. The school district governing body shall hold a public 4 5 hearing on the proposed budget within forty-five (45) days preceding the beginning of the budget year. Notice of the date, time and 6 place of the hearing, together with the proposed budget summary, 7 shall be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the 8 9 school district not less than five (5) days before the date of the 10 hearing. The clerk of the board shall make available a sufficient 11 number of copies of the proposed budget as the governing body shall determine and shall have them available for review or for 12 distribution at the office of the chief financial officer. At the 13 public hearing on the budget any person may present to the governing 14 body comments, recommendations or information on any part of the 15 16 proposed budget.

D. The adopted budget shall be in effect no later than the first day of the fiscal year to which it applies. The budget as adopted and filed with the State Auditor and Inspector shall constitute an appropriation for each fund, and the appropriation thus made shall not be used for any other purpose except as provided by law.

E. Each school district shall amend the original budget afterJune 30 of each year after the June financial activity has been

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recorded, the annual Foundation and Salary Incentive Aid allocation has been released, and the property tax valuations have been certified for all affected counties within the school district. The amended budget shall include all of the following information which is applicable:

6 1. Valuation of the school district by county and
7 classification, excluding homestead exemptions;

8 2. Bonded debt and judgments outstanding, including interest9 rates by maturity;

10 3. Matured debt and judgments;

4. Sinking fund balance, including cash and investments;
 5. Sinking fund levy calculations, including surplus/deficit,
 principal accrual, annual interest, judgment installment and
 interest, total net levy and delinquency;

15 6. Levies in millage for general fund, building fund and16 sinking fund;

17 7. Millage adjustment factor, if applicable;

8. Previous year sinking fund collections, including total
 proceeds as certified, additions or deductions, reserve for
 delinquent tax, reserve for protest pending, tax apportioned, net
 balance in process of collection, and excess collections; and

9. Surplus analysis, including itemized sources of excess anddeductions.

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1 F. At the time required by law, the county excise board shall levy the taxes necessary for the school district general fund, 2 building fund and sinking fund for the budget year pursuant to 3 Sections 397 and 399 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes, and for 4 5 the school district general and building funds for the budget year pursuant to Section 9 of Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution. 6 SECTION 2. 70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-109.5, as 7 AMENDATORY amended by Section 1, Chapter 228, O.S.L. 2018 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018, 8 9 Section 18-109.5), is amended to read as follows:

10 Section 18-109.5. A. As used in Section 18-201.1 of this 11 title:

1. "Visual impairment" means an impairment in vision that, even
 with correction, adversely affects a child's educational
 performance. This includes both partial sight and blindness;

"Specific learning disability" means a disorder in one or 15 2. more of the basic psychological processes involved in understanding 16 17 or in using language, spoken or written, that may manifest itself in the imperfect ability to listen, think, speak, read, write, spell or 18 to do mathematical calculations, including conditions such as 19 perceptual disabilities, brain injury, minimal brain dysfunction, 20 dyslexia and developmental aphasia. The term does not include 21 learning problems that are primarily the result of visual, hearing 22 or motor disabilities, of intellectual disability, of emotional 23 disturbance or of environmental, cultural or economic disadvantage; 24

3. "Deafness" means a hearing impairment that is so severe that 1 the child is impaired in processing linguistic information through 2 hearing, with or without amplification, that adversely affects a 3 child's educational performance; 4 5 4. "Economically disadvantaged" means all children who qualify for free or reduced lunches; 6 "Intellectual disability" means significantly subaverage 7 5. general intellectual functioning, existing concurrently with 8 9 deficits in adaptive behavior and manifested during the development 10 period, that adversely affects a child's educational performance; "Emotional disturbance" means a condition exhibiting one or 11 6. 12 more of the following characteristics over a long period of time and to a marked degree that adversely affects a child's educational 13 performance: 14 an inability to learn which cannot be explained by 15 a. intellectual, sensory or health factors, 16 b. an inability to build or maintain satisfactory 17 interpersonal relationships with peers and teachers, 18 inappropriate types of behavior or feelings under 19 с. normal circumstances, 20

- d. a general pervasive mood of unhappiness or depression,
   or
- e. a tendency to develop physical symptoms or fearsassociated with personal or school problems.

The term includes children who are schizophrenic. The term does not include children who are socially maladjusted, unless it is determined that they are seriously emotionally disturbed;

4 7. "Gifted" means identified students as outlined in Section
5 1210.301 of this title;

8. "Hearing impairment" means an impairment in hearing, whether
permanent or fluctuating, that adversely affects a child's
educational performance but that is not included under the
definition of "deafness";

9. "Multiple disabilities" means concomitant impairments, such as intellectual disability-blindness or intellectual disabilityorthopedic impairment, the combination of which causes such severe educational needs that they cannot be accommodated in special education programs solely for one of the impairments. The term does not include deaf-blindness;

"Orthopedic impairment" means a severe orthopedic 16 10. impairment that adversely affects a child's educational performance. 17 The term includes impairments caused by a congenital anomaly, 18 impairments caused by disease such as poliomyelitis and bone 19 tuberculosis, and impairments from other causes such as cerebral 20 palsy, amputations and fractures or burns that cause contractures; 21 11. "Other health impairment" means having limited strength, 22 vitality or alertness, including a heightened alertness to 23 environmental stimuli, that results in limited alertness with 24

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respect to the educational environment that adversely affects a child's educational performance and is due to chronic or acute health problems such as asthma, attention deficit disorder or attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, diabetes, epilepsy, a heart condition, hemophilia, lead poisoning, leukemia, nephritis, rheumatic fever, sickle cell anemia and Tourette syndrome;

7 12. "Speech or language impairment" means a communication 8 disorder, such as stuttering, impaired articulation, a language 9 impairment, or a voice impairment, that adversely affects a child's 10 educational performance;

11 13. "Deaf-blindness" means concomitant hearing and visual 12 impairments, the combination of which causes such severe 13 communication and other developmental and educational problems that 14 they cannot be accommodated in special education programs solely for 15 children with deafness or children with blindness;

"Autism" means a developmental disability significantly 16 14. affecting verbal and nonverbal communication and social interaction, 17 generally evident before age three (3), that adversely affects a 18 child's educational performance. Other characteristics often 19 associated with autism are engagement in repetitive activities and 20 stereotyped movements, resistance to environmental change or change 21 in daily routines, and unusual responses to sensory experiences. 22 Autism does not apply if a child's educational performance is 23

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adversely affected primarily because the child has an emotional
 disturbance, as defined in this subsection;

3 15. "Traumatic brain injury" means an acquired injury to the brain caused by an external physical force, resulting in total or 4 5 partial functional disability or psychosocial impairment, or both, that adversely affects a child's educational performance. 6 Traumatic brain injury applies to open or closed head injuries resulting in 7 impairments in one or more areas such as cognition; language; 8 9 memory; attention; reasoning; abstract thinking; judgment; problem-10 solving; sensory, perceptual, and motor abilities; psychosocial 11 behavior; physical functions; information processing; and speech. Traumatic brain injury does not apply to brain injuries that are 12 13 congenital or degenerative or to brain injuries induced by birth trauma; 14

15 16. "Bilingual" "English learner" means those students <u>a</u>
16 <u>student</u> who have limited English speaking abilities or who come from
17 homes where English is not the dominant language as reported on the
18 current year application for accreditation:

19	<u>a.</u>	(1)	was not born in the United States or whose native
20			language is a language other than English,
21		(2)	is a Native American or Alaska Native or a native
22			resident of the outlying areas and who comes from
23			an environment where a language other than
24			English has had a significant impact on the

1		individual's level of English language
2		proficiency, or
3		(3) is migratory, whose native language is a language
4		other than English and who comes from an
5		environment where a language other than English
6		is dominant, and
7	b.	whose difficulties in speaking, reading, writing or
8		understanding the English language may be sufficient
9		to deny the individual the ability to meet the subject
10		matter standards adopted pursuant to Section 11-103.6
11		of this title, the ability to successfully achieve in
12		classrooms where the language of instruction is
13		English, or the opportunity to participate fully in
14		<pre>society;</pre>

17. "Special Education Summer Program" means those summer 15 school programs which school districts may provide for children who 16 are severely or profoundly multiple-handicapped if their 17 individualized education program states the need for a continuing 18 educational experience to prevent loss of educational achievement or 19 basic life skills. Any school district receiving funds for such 20 special education summer programs shall provide services as provided 21 in Section 13-101 of this title; and 22

23 18. "Optional Extended School Year Program" means the program 24 defined in Section 1-109.1 of this title. B. The State Board of Education is hereby authorized to modify
 and redefine by rule the definitions set out in this section
 whenever such modification is required to receive federal assistance
 therefor.

5 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-112.2, is 6 amended to read as follows:

Section 18-112.2. A. For the 1987-88 school year and for each 7 school year thereafter, each school district which, pursuant to the 8 9 provisions of Section 18-112 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes, 10 received funding for the 1986-87 school year in excess of the sum of 11 Foundation Aid, Salary Incentive Aid, and Transportation Supplement otherwise authorized pursuant to Section 18-109.2 of Title 70 of the 12 13 Oklahoma Statutes shall receive a Supplement in State Aid: For the 1987-88 school year, said Supplement shall be equal to sixty-seven 14 15 percent (67%) of the amount of said excess funding, less the amount by which the sum of Foundation Aid, Salary Incentive Aid, and 16 17 Transportation Supplement exceeds said sum for the preceding school year; for the 1988-89 2020-2021 school year and thereafter, the 18 Supplement in State Aid shall be an amount equal to the previous 19 year's Supplement less the amount by which the sum of Foundation 20 Aid, Salary Incentive Aid, and Transportation Supplement for the 21 school year being considered exceeds said sum for the preceding 22 school year. No school district shall receive for any school year 23 subsequent to the 1987-88 school year a Supplement in State Aid 24

larger than said Supplement received for the year preceding the
 subsequent year. Districts <u>must shall</u> levy thirty-five (35) General
 Fund mills to receive this Supplement.

Eligibility of a district for a Supplement in State Aid 4 Β. 5 shall not cause the district to be exempt from penalties required by the provisions of Section 18-113.1 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma 6 7 Statutes this title. Calculation of the Supplement in State Aid shall be based on use of unreduced average daily attendance 8 9 membership for determination of the sum of Foundation Aid, Salary 10 Incentive Aid, and Transportation Supplement. The actual amount of 11 Foundation Aid, Salary Incentive Aid, and Transportation Supplement 12 to be paid, however, shall be subject to the provisions of Section 13 18-113.1 of <del>Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes</del> this title.

14SECTION 4.AMENDATORY70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-124, is15amended to read as follows:

Section 18-124. A. Any school district with an average daily 16 attendance (ADA) of more than one thousand five hundred (1,500) 17 students for the preceding year which expends for administrative 18 services in the 2005-06 school year or any school year thereafter, 19 less expenditures for legal services, more than five percent (5%) of 20 the amount it expends for total expenditures, less expenditures for 21 legal services, shall have the amount which exceeds the five percent 22 (5%) withheld the following year from the Foundation and Salary 23 Incentive Aid for the school district. 24

1 Any school district with an average daily attendance (ADA) В. of more than five hundred (500) students but not more than one 2 thousand five hundred (1,500) students for the preceding year which 3 expends for administrative services in the 2005-06 school year or 4 5 any school year thereafter, less expenditures for legal services, more than seven percent (7%) of the amount it expends for total 6 expenditures, less expenditures for legal services, shall have the 7 amount which exceeds the seven percent (7%) withheld the following 8 9 year from the Foundation and Salary Incentive Aid for the school district. 10

11 C. Any school district with an average daily attendance (ADA) 12 of five hundred (500) or fewer students for the preceding year which expends for administrative services in the 2005-06 school year or 13 any school year thereafter, less expenditures for legal services, 14 15 more than eight percent (8%) of the amount it expends for total expenditures, less expenditures for legal services, shall have the 16 amount which exceeds the eight percent (8%) withheld the following 17 year from the Foundation and Salary Incentive Aid for the school 18 district. 19

20 D. For purposes of this section, "administrative services" 21 means costs associated with:

22 1. Staff for the board of education;

23 2. The secretary/clerk for the board of education;

24 3. Staff relations;

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4. Negotiations staff;

Immediate staff of the superintendent, any elementary
 superintendent or any assistant superintendent;

4 6. Any superintendent, elementary superintendent, or assistant5 superintendent;

7. Any employee of a school district employed as a director,
coordinator, supervisor, or who has responsibility for
administrative functions of a school district; and

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8. Any consultant hired by the school district.

10 Ε. If an employee of a school district is employed in a 11 position where part of the employee's time is spent as an 12 administrator and part of the time is spent in nonadministrative 13 functions, the percentage of time spent as an administrator shall be included as administrative services. A superintendent who spends 14 part of the time performing exempted nonadministrative services such 15 as teaching in the classroom, serving as a principal, counselor, or 16 17 library media specialist, can code up to forty percent (40%) of their salary to other nonadministrative functions. The total amount 18 of time a superintendent of a school district spends performing 19 services for a school district shall be included as administrative 20 services even if part of the time the superintendent is performing 21 nonexempted nonadministrative service functions. The total amount 22 received by a superintendent from the school district as salary, for 23 the performance of administrative and nonexempted nonadministrative 24

services, shall be recorded under the code for superintendent salary
 as provided for in the Oklahoma Cost Accounting System.

F. Each school site within a school district shall take steps to ensure that the administrative costs for the school comply with the expenditure limits established for school districts in this section.

G. Funds withheld pursuant to the provisions of this section
shall be distributed through the State Aid formula to the districts
not so penalized.

H. For the 2003-04 and 2004-05 school year, school districts shall report to the State Department of Education the costs associated with administrative services for the school district as defined in subsection D of this section.

14SECTION 5.AMENDATORY70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-200.1, is15amended to read as follows:

Section 18-200.1. A. Beginning with the 1997-98 2020-2021 16 school year, and each school year thereafter, each school district 17 shall have its initial allocation of State Aid calculated based on 18 the state dedicated revenues actually collected during the preceding 19 fiscal year, the adjusted assessed valuation of the preceding year 20 and the highest weighted average daily membership for the school 21 district of the two (2) preceding school years; however, the 22 weighted membership of nonresident, transferred pupils enrolled in 23 24 online courses shall be based on the weighted average daily

1 membership of the preceding school year. Each school district shall
2 submit the following data based on the first nine (9) weeks, to be
3 used in the calculation of the average daily membership of the
4 school district:

5 1. Student enrollment by grade level;

6 2. Pupil category counts; and

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3. Transportation supplement data.

On or before December 30, the State Department of Education 8 9 shall determine each school district's current year allocation 10 pursuant to subsection D of this section. The State Department of 11 Education shall complete an audit, using procedures established by 12 the Department, of the student enrollment by grade level data, pupil category counts and transportation supplement data to be used in the 13 State Aid Formula pursuant to subsection D of this section by 14 December 1 and by January 15 shall notify each school district of 15 the district's final State Aid allocation for the current school 16 year. The January payment of State Aid and each subsequent payment 17 for the remainder of the school year shall be based on the final 18 State Aid allocation as calculated in subsection D of this section. 19 Except for reductions made due to the assessment of penalties by the 20 State Department of Education according to law, the January payment 21 of State Aid and each subsequent payment for the remainder of the 22 school year shall not decrease by an amount more than the amount 23 that the current chargeable revenue increases for that district. 24

1 The State Department of Education shall retain not less than В. 2 one and one-half percent  $(1 \ 1/2\%)$  of the total funds appropriated for financial support of schools, to be used to make midyear 3 adjustments in State Aid and which shall be reflected in the final 4 5 allocations. If the amount of appropriated funds, including the one and one-half percent (1 1/2%) retained, remaining after January 1 of 6 each year is not sufficient to fully fund the final allocations, the 7 Department shall recalculate each school district's remaining 8 9 allocation pursuant to subsection D of this section using the 10 reduced amount of appropriated funds.

C. On and after July 1, 1997 July 1, 2020, the amount of State 11 12 Aid each district shall receive shall be the sum of the Foundation Aid, the Salary Incentive Aid and the Transportation Supplement, as 13 adjusted pursuant to the provisions of subsection G of this section 14 and Section 18-112.2 of this title; provided, no district having per 15 pupil revenue in excess of three hundred percent (300%) of the 16 average per pupil revenue of all districts shall receive any State 17 Aid or Supplement in State Aid. 18

19 The July calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by 20 dividing the district's second preceding year's total weighted 21 average daily membership (ADM) into the district's second preceding 22 year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss 23 payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds,

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unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses,
 and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

The December calculation of per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the district's preceding year's total weighted average daily membership (ADM) into the district's preceding year's total revenues excluding federal revenue, insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and less the amount of any transfer fees paid in that year.

D. For the <u>1997-98</u> <u>2020-2021</u> school year, and each school year thereafter, Foundation Aid, <u>and</u> the Transportation Supplement <del>and</del> <u>Salary Incentive Aid</u> shall be calculated as follows:

Foundation Aid shall be determined by subtracting the amount
 of the Foundation Program Income from the cost of the Foundation
 Program and adding to this difference the Transportation Supplement.
 The Foundation Program shall be a district's highest

weighted average daily membership based on the first 17 nine (9) weeks of the current school year, the 18 preceding school year or the second preceding school 19 year of a school district, as determined by the 20 provisions of subsection A of Section 18-201.1 of this 21 title and paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of subsection B of 22 Section 18-201.1 of this title, multiplied by the Base 23 Foundation Support Level. However, for the portion of 24

In the event that ad valorem taxes of a school district 6 F. 1. 7 are determined to be uncollectible because of bankruptcy, clerical error, or a successful tax protest, and the amount of such taxes 8 9 deemed uncollectible exceeds Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) or 10 an amount greater than twenty-five percent (25%) of ad valorem taxes per tax year, or the valuation of a district is lowered by order of 11 12 the State Board of Equalization, the school district's State Aid, for the school year that such ad valorem taxes are calculated in the 13 State Aid Formula, shall be determined by subtracting the net 14 15 assessed valuation of the property upon which taxes were deemed uncollectible from the assessed valuation of the school district and 16 the state. Upon request of the local board of education, it shall 17 be the duty of the county assessor to certify to the Director of 18 Finance of the State Department of Education the net assessed 19 valuation of the property upon which taxes were determined 20 uncollectible. 21

22 2. In the event that the amount of funds a school district
23 receives for reimbursement from the Ad Valorem Reimbursement Fund is
24 less than the amount of funds claimed for reimbursement by the

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1 school district due to insufficiency of funds as provided in Section 2 193 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes, then the school district's 3 assessed valuation for the school year that such ad valorem 4 reimbursement is calculated in the State Aid Formula shall be 5 adjusted accordingly.

By February 1 the State Department of Education shall send 23

24 by certified mail, with return receipt requested, to notify each

1 School District Superintendent, Auditor and Regional Accreditation Officer a notice of and calculation sheet reflecting the general 2 3 fund balance penalty to be assessed against that school district. Calculation of the general fund balance penalty shall not include 4 5 federal revenue. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of this written notice the school district shall submit to the Department a written 6 7 reply either accepting or protesting the penalty to be assessed against the district. If protesting, the school district shall 8 9 submit with its reply the reasons for rejecting the calculations and 10 documentation supporting those reasons. The Department shall review all school district penalty protest documentation and notify each 11 district by March 15 of its finding and the final penalty to be 12 assessed to each district. General fund balance penalties shall be 13 assessed to all school districts by April 1. 14

3. Any school district which receives proceeds from a tax settlement or a Federal Emergency Management Agency settlement during the last two (2) months of the preceding fiscal year shall be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the tax settlement.

4. Any school district which receives an increase in State Aid
 because of a change in Foundation and/or Salary Incentive Aid
 factors during the last two (2) months of the preceding fiscal year
 shall be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if

the penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from
 the increase in State Aid.

If a school district does not receive Foundation and/or 3 5. Salary Incentive Aid during the preceding fiscal year, the State 4 5 Board of Education may waive the penalty assessed in this subsection if the penalty would result in a loss of more than forty percent 6 (40%) of the remaining State Aid to be allocated to the school 7 district between April 1 and the remainder of the school year and if 8 9 the Board determines the penalty will cause the school district not 10 to meet remaining financial obligations.

6. Any school district which receives gross production revenue apportionment during the 2002-2003 school year or in any subsequent school year that is greater than the gross production revenue apportionment of the preceding school year shall be exempt from the penalty assessed in this subsection, if the penalty would occur solely as a result of the gross production revenue apportionment, as determined by the State Board of Education.

7. Beginning July 1, 2003, school districts that participate in consolidation or annexation pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall be exempt from the penalty assessed in this subsection for the school year in which the consolidation or annexation occurs and for the next three (3) fiscal years.

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1 8. Any school district which receives proceeds from a sales tax 2 levied by a municipality pursuant to Section 22-159 of Title 11 of 3 the Oklahoma Statutes or proceeds from a sales tax levied by a county pursuant to Section 1370 of Title 68 of the Oklahoma Statutes 4 5 during the 2003-2004 school year or the 2004-2005 school year shall be exempt from the penalties assessed in this subsection, if the 6 penalty would occur solely as a result of receiving funds from the 7 sales tax levy. 8

9 9. For purposes of calculating the general fund balance
10 penalty, the terms "carryover" and "general fund balance" shall not
11 include federal revenue.

12 Η. In order to provide startup funds for the implementation of early childhood programs, State Aid may be advanced to school 13 districts that initially start early childhood instruction at a 14 school site. School districts that desire such advanced funding 15 shall make application to the State Department of Education no later 16 than September 15 of each year and advanced funding shall be awarded 17 to the approved districts no later than October 30. The advanced 18 funding shall not exceed the per pupil amount of State Aid as 19 calculated in subsection D of this section per anticipated Head 20 Start eligible student. The total amount of advanced funding shall 21 be proportionately reduced from the monthly payments of the 22 district's State Aid payments during the last six (6) months of the 23 same fiscal year. 24

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1 I. 1. Beginning July 1, 1996, the Oklahoma Tax Commission, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall report 2 3 monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly apportionment of the following information: 4 5 a. the assessed valuation of property, b. motor vehicle collections, 6 R.E.A. tax collected, and 7 с. d. gross productions tax collected. 8 9 2. Beginning July 1, 1997, the State Auditor and Inspector's 10 Office, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall

11 report monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly 12 apportionment of the proceeds of the county levy.

3. Beginning July 1, 1996, the Commissioners of the Land
Office, notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall
report monthly to the State Department of Education the monthly
apportionment of state apportionment.

4. Beginning July 1, 1997, the county treasurers' offices,
notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, shall report
monthly to the State Department of Education the ad valorem tax
protest amounts for each county.

5. The information reported by the Tax Commission, the State Auditor and Inspector's Office, the county treasurers' offices and the Commissioners of the Land Office, pursuant to this subsection

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shall be reported by school district on forms developed by the State
 Department of Education.

3 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2011, Section 18-201.1, as
4 amended by Section 2, Chapter 228, O.S.L. 2018 (70 O.S. Supp. 2018,
5 Section 18-201.1), is amended to read as follows:

Section 18-201.1. A. Beginning with the 1997-98 school year, 6 and each school year thereafter, the weighted membership of a school 7 district for calculation of Foundation Aid purposes pursuant to 8 9 paragraph 1 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall 10 be the sum of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district 11 calculation and the weighted teacher experience and degree 12 calculation. The weighted membership of a school district for 13 calculation of Salary Incentive Aid purposes pursuant to paragraph 3 14 15 of subsection D of Section 18-200.1 of this title shall be the sum 16 of the weighted pupil grade level calculation, the weighted pupil category calculation, the weighted district calculation and the 17 weighted teacher experience and degree calculation. 18

B. The weighted calculations provided for in subsection A of this section shall be based on the highest weighted average daily membership of the first nine (9) weeks of the current school year, the preceding school year or the second preceding school year of a school district, unless otherwise specified. The highest of the three (3) weighted average daily memberships shall be used

1 consistently in all of the calculations; however, the portion of 2 weighted membership derived from nonresident, transferred pupils 3 enrolled in online courses shall be based on the weighted average daily membership of the first nine (9) weeks of the current school 4 5 year. The average daily membership data used for all calculations in paragraphs 1, 2, 3 and 4 of this subsection shall be the same as 6 7 used in the calculation of the State Aid Formula. The weighted calculations provided for in subsection A of this section shall be 8 9 determined as follows:

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Multiply the membership of each subparagraph of this paragraph by 1 the weight assigned to such subparagraph of this paragraph and add 2 the totals together to determine the weighted pupil grade level 3 calculation for a school district. Determination of the pupils 4 5 eligible for the early childhood program weight shall be pursuant to the provisions of Section 1-114 of this title. The pupils eligible 6 for the out-of-home placement pupil weight shall be students who are 7 not residents of the school district in which they are receiving 8 9 education pursuant to the provisions of subsection D of Section 1-10 113 of this title. Such weight may be claimed by the district providing educational services to such student for the days that 11 student is enrolled in that district. If claimed, the out-of-home 12 placement weight shall be in lieu of the pupil grade level and any 13 pupil category weights for that student. Provided, if a student 14 resides in a juvenile detention center that is restricted to less 15 than twelve (12) beds, the out-of-home placement pupil weight for 16 17 such students shall be calculated as follows: for a center with six (6) beds -3.0; for a center with eight (8) beds -2.3 and for a 18 center with ten (10) beds - 1.80. 19

The weighted pupil category calculation shall be determined
 by assigning a weight to the pupil category as follows:

3. The weighted district calculation shall be determined by determining the calculations for each school district for both the small school district formula and the district sparsity - isolation

1 formula, applying whichever is the greater of the calculations of 2 the two formulas and then applying the restrictions pursuant to 3 subparagraph c of this paragraph.

a. Small school district formula: 529 minus the average daily membership divided by 529 times .2 times total average daily membership.

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7 The small school district formula calculation shall apply only to school districts whose highest average daily 8 9 membership is less than 529 pupils. School districts which are consolidated or annexed after July 1, 2003, pursuant to 10 11 the Oklahoma School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation 12 Act shall have the weighted district size calculation for the three (3) school years following the fiscal year in 13 which such consolidation occurred calculated to be the sum 14 15 of the individual consolidated districts computed as if the consolidation had not taken place. Thereafter, any such 16 district which is consolidated pursuant to the Oklahoma 17 School Voluntary Consolidation and Annexation Act shall not 18 qualify for the weighted district calculation unless the 19 district can satisfy the specifications herein. Subject to 20 the provisions of subparagraph c of this paragraph, the 21 resulting number shall be counted as additional students 22 for the purpose of calculating State Aid. 23

b. District sparsity - isolation formula:

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The district sparsity - isolation formula calculation shall apply only to school districts:

- (1) whose total area in square miles is greater than the average number of square miles for all school districts in this state; and
- (2) whose areal density is less than one-fourth (1/4) of the state average areal density. Areal density shall be determined by dividing the school district's average daily membership by the school district's total area in square miles.

The district sparsity - isolation formula calculation shall be calculated as follows:

13The school district student cost factor multiplied by14the school district area factor. The resulting15product shall be multiplied by the school district's16average daily membership. Subject to the provisions17of subparagraph c of this paragraph, the resulting18number shall be counted as additional students for the19purpose of calculating State Aid.

20 The school district student cost factor shall be calculated 21 as follows:

The State Board of Education shall define geographical barriers 6 whose location in a school district would inhibit the district from 7 consolidation or annexation. The Board shall make available an 8 9 application process, review applications, and for districts the 10 Board deems necessary allow additional square miles to be used for 11 the purposes of calculations used for the weighted district sparsity 12 - isolation formula. Provided, that the additional square miles 13 allowed for geographical barriers shall not exceed thirty percent (30%) of the district's actual size. 14

15 c. State Aid funds which a district is calculated to
 16 receive as a result of the weighted district
 17 calculation shall be restricted as follows:

18If, after the weighted district calculation is19applied, the district's projected per pupil20revenue exceeds one hundred fifty percent (150%)21of the projected state average per pupil revenue,22then the district's State Aid shall be reduced by23an amount that will restrict the district's24projected per pupil revenue to one hundred fifty

percent (150%) of the projected state average per pupil revenue. Provided, in applying the restriction provided in this division, the district's State Aid shall not be reduced by an amount greater than by the amount of State Aid which was generated by the weighted district calculation.

The July calculation of the projected per pupil 8 9 revenue shall be determined by dividing the highest of 10 the district's preceding two (2) years average daily 11 membership (ADM) as weighted by the pupil grade level, 12 the pupil category, the district and the teacher 13 experience degree index calculations for projected State Aid into the district's projected total revenues 14 15 including projected funds for the State Aid Formula for the preceding year, net assessed valuation for the 16 preceding calendar year times thirty-nine (39) mills, 17 county revenues excluding the county four-mills 18 revenues for the second preceding year, other state 19 appropriations for the preceding year and the 20 collections for the preceding year of state 21 apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross production 22 tax and R.E.A. tax. 23

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1 The December calculation of the projected per pupil revenue shall be determined by dividing the highest of 2 the district's first nine (9) weeks of the current 3 school year or the two (2) preceding school years 4 5 average daily membership (ADM) as weighted by the pupil grade level, the pupil category, the district 6 7 and the teacher experience degree index calculations for projected State Aid into the district's projected 8 9 total revenues including funds for the December 10 calculation of the current year State Aid Formula, net assessed valuation for the current calendar year times 11 12 thirty-nine (39) mills, county revenues excluding the county four-mills revenue for the preceding year, 13 other state appropriations for the preceding year and 14 15 the collections for the preceding year of state apportionment, motor vehicle revenue, gross production 16 tax and R.E.A. tax. 17 The district's projected total revenues for each 18 calculation shall exclude the following collections 19 for the second preceding year: federal revenue, 20 insurance loss payments, reimbursements, recovery of 21 overpayments and refunds, unused reserves, prior 22 expenditures recovered, prior year surpluses, and 23

other local miscellaneous revenues.

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4. The weighted teacher experience and degree calculation shall
 be determined in accordance with the teacher experience and degree
 index. The State Department of Education shall determine an index
 for each state teacher by using data supplied in the school
 district's teacher personnel reports of the preceding year and
 utilizing the index as follows:

The school district teacher index for each school district shall 16 be determined by subtracting the weighted average state teacher from 17 the weighted average district teacher. Multiply the school district 18 teacher index if greater than zero by .7 and then multiply that 19 product by the sum of the district's weighted pupil grade level 20 calculation provided in paragraph 1 of this subsection and the 21 weighted pupil category calculation provided in subparagraph m of 22 paragraph 2 of this subsection to determine the weighted teacher 23 experience and degree calculation. 24
