16	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 51 O.S. 2011, Section 24A.8, as
17	last amended by Section 2, Chapter 370, O.S.L. 2015 (51 O.S. Supp.
18	2018, Section 24A.8), is amended to read as follows:
19	Section 24A.8. A. Law enforcement agencies shall make
20	available for public inspection and copying, if kept, the following
21	records:
22	1. An arrestee description, including the name, date of birth,
23	address, race, sex, physical description, and occupation of the
24	arrestee;

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2. Facts concerning the arrest, including the cause of arrest
 and the name of the arresting officer;

3 3. A chronological list of all incidents, including initial
4 offense report information showing the offense, date, time, general
5 location, officer, and a brief summary of what occurred;

6 4. Radio logs, including a chronological listing of the calls7 dispatched;

8 5. Conviction information, including the name of any person9 convicted of a criminal offense;

Disposition of all warrants, including orders signed by a
 judge of any court commanding a law enforcement officer to arrest a
 particular person;

13 7. A crime summary, including an agency summary of crimes 14 reported and public calls for service by classification or nature 15 and number;

8. Jail registers, including jail blotter data or jail booking information recorded on persons at the time of incarceration showing the name of each prisoner with the date and cause of commitment, the authority committing the prisoner, whether committed for a criminal offense, a description of the prisoner, and the date or manner of discharge or escape of the prisoner;

1 <u>10.</u> Audio and video recordings from recording equipment 2 attached to law enforcement vehicles or associated audio recordings 3 from recording equipment on the person of a law enforcement officer; 4 provided, the law enforcement agency may, before releasing any audio 5 or video recording provided for in this paragraph, redact or obscure 6 specific portions of the recording which:

- a. depict the death of a person or a dead body, unless

Such personal information shall 13 include any government-issued identification 14 number, date of birth, address or financial 15 information,
 - (12) include information that would materially compromise an ongoing criminal investigation or ongoing criminal prosecution, provided that:
- (a) ten (10) days following the formal arraignment or initial appearance, whichever occurs first, of a person charged in the case in question, the recording shall be made available for public inspection and copying with no redaction of the portions

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that were temporarily withheld by reliance on this division. Provided, before potential release of a recording as provided for in this subdivision, the prosecutor or legal representative of the person charged may request from the appropriate district court an extension of time during which the recording may be withheld under the provisions of this division. When a request for an extension of time has been filed with the court, the recording in question may be withheld until the court has issued a ruling. Such requests for an extension of the time during which the recording may be withheld may be made on the grounds that release of the recording will materially compromise an ongoing criminal investigation or criminal prosecution or on the grounds that release of the recording will materially compromise the right of an accused to a fair trial that has yet to begin. Courts considering such requests shall conduct a hearing and consider whether the interests of the public outweigh the

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1 interests asserted by the parties. In 2 response to such requests, the court shall 3 order that the recording be made available for public inspection and copying with no 4 5 redaction of the portions that were temporarily withheld by reliance on this 6 division or order an extension of time 7 during which the recording may be withheld 8 9 under the provisions of this division. Provided further, each such time extension 10 11 shall only be ordered by the court for an additional six-month period of time or less 12 13 and cumulative time extensions shall not add up to more than eighteen (18) months, or 14 in the event that one hundred twenty (120) 15 (b) days expire from the date of the events 16 17 depicted in the recording without any person being criminally charged in the case in 18 question and release of a recording or 19 portions of a recording have been denied on 20 the grounds provided for in this division, 21 an appeal of such denial may be made to the 22 appropriate district court. In situations 23 where one hundred twenty (120) days have 24

expired since the creation of the recording, criminal charges have not been filed against a person and the recording is being withheld on the grounds provided for in this division, courts considering appeals to the use of the provisions of this division for temporarily withholding a recording shall conduct a hearing and consider whether the interests of the public outweigh the interests of the parties protected by this division. In response to such appeals, the district court shall order that the recording be made available for public inspection and copying with no redaction of the portions that were temporarily withheld by reliance on this division or order an extension of time during which the recording may be withheld under the provisions of this division. An order granting an extension of time shall be applicable to the recording against all appellants for the duration of the extension. Provided, each such time extension shall only be ordered by the district court for an additional twelve-

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1 month period of time or less and cumulative time extensions shall not add up to more 2 3 than three (3) years. Provided, charges being filed against a person in the case in 4 5 question automatically cancels any extension of time. A new request for an extension of 6 7 time following an arraignment or initial appearance may be requested by the parties 8 9 on the grounds and under the terms provided for in subdivision (a) of this division. 10 The options presented in this division to 11 12 potentially withhold a recording or portions of a 13 recording on the grounds provided for in this division shall expire in totality four (4) years 14 after the recording was made at which time all 15 recordings previously withheld on the grounds 16 provided for in this division shall be made 17 available for public inspection and copying, or 18 (13) reveal the identity of law enforcement officers 19 who have become subject to internal investigation 20 by the law enforcement agency as a result of an 21 event depicted in the recording. The option to 22 protect the identity of a law enforcement officer 23 shall not be available to the law enforcement 24

1 agency after the law enforcement agency has 2 concluded the investigation and rendered a 3 decision as to final disciplinary action. At such time when an investigation has concluded and 4 5 the law enforcement agency has rendered its decision as to final disciplinary action, the 6 7 portions of the recordings previously withheld as provided for in this division shall be available 8 9 for public inspection and copying. The audio and 10 video recordings withheld on the grounds provided for in this division shall be available for 11 12 public inspection and copying before the 13 conclusion of the investigation if the investigation lasts for an unreasonable amount of 14 time. 15

Except for the records listed in subsection A of this 16 Β. section and those made open by other state or local laws, law 17 enforcement agencies may deny access to law enforcement records 18 except where a court finds that the public interest or the interest 19 of an individual outweighs the reason for denial. The provisions of 20 this section shall not operate to deny access to law enforcement 21 records if such records have been previously made available to the 22 public as provided in the Oklahoma Open Records Act or as otherwise 23 24 provided by law.

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 recordkeeping requirements. Law enforcement records shall be kept
 for as long as is now or may hereafter be specified by law. Absent
 a legal requirement for the keeping of a law enforcement record for
 a specific time period, law enforcement agencies shall maintain
 their records for so long as needed for administrative purposes.

D. Registration files maintained by the Department of
Corrections pursuant to the provisions of the Sex Offenders
Registration Act shall be made available for public inspection in a
manner to be determined by the Department.

11 Е. The Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training 12 (C.L.E.E.T.) shall keep confidential all records it maintains pursuant to Section 3311 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes and 13 deny release of records relating to any employed or certified full-14 time officer, reserve officer, retired officer or other person; 15 teacher lesson plans, tests and other teaching materials; and 16 personal communications concerning individual students except under 17 the following circumstances: 18

To verify the current certification status of any peace

11 Patrol Division, the Communications Division, and other divisions of

- a. training, lesson plans, teaching materials, tests, and
 test results,
- b. policies, procedures, and operations, any of which areof a tactical nature, and
- 17 c. the following information from radio logs:
- 18 (1) telephone numbers,
- addresses other than the location of incidents to
 which officers are dispatched, and
- (3) personal information which is contrary to the
 provisions of the Driver's Privacy Protection
 Act, 18 United States Code, Sections 2721 through
 2725; and

2. For the purpose of preventing identity theft and invasion of
 2 law enforcement computer systems, except as provided in Title 47 of
 3 the Oklahoma Statutes, all driving records.

SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 63 O.S. 2011, Section 2-506, as
last amended by Section 1, Chapter 225, O.S.L. 2016 (63 O.S. Supp.
2018, Section 2-506), is amended to read as follows:

7 Section 2-506. A. Any peace officer of this state shall seize8 the following property:

9 1. Any property described in subsection A of Section 2-503 of 10 this title. Such property shall be held as evidence until a 11 forfeiture has been declared or release ordered, except for property 12 described in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of subsection A of Section 2-503 of this title, or in the case of money, coins, and currency, 13 deposited as provided in subsection E of Section 2-503 of this 14 title; provided, any money, coins and currency taken or detained 15 pursuant to this section may be deposited in an interest-bearing 16 account by or at the direction of the district attorney in the 17 office of the county treasurer if the district attorney determines 18 the currency is not to be held as evidence. All interest earned on 19 such monies shall be returned to the claimant or forfeited with the 20 money, coins and currency which was taken or detained as provided by 21 law; 22

23 2. Any property described in subsection B of Section 2-503 of24 this title; or

3. Any property described in subsection C of Section 2-503 of
 this title.

B. Notice of seizure and intended forfeiture proceeding shall be filed in the office of the clerk of the district court for the county wherein such property is seized and shall be given all owners and parties in interest. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, no filing fees shall be assessed by the court clerk for the filing of any forfeiture action.

9 C. Notice shall be given by the agency seeking forfeiture10 according to one of the following methods:

Upon each owner or party in interest whose right, title or
 interest is of record in the Tax Commission, by mailing a copy of
 the notice by certified mail to the address as given upon the
 records of the Tax Commission;

15 2. Upon each owner or party in interest whose name and address 16 is known to the attorney in the office of the agency prosecuting the 17 action to recover unpaid fines, by mailing a copy of the notice by 18 registered mail to the last-known address; or

19 3. Upon all other owners or interested parties, whose addresses 20 are unknown, but who are believed to have an interest in the 21 property, by one publication in a newspaper of general circulation 22 in the county where the seizure was made.

D. Within forty-five (45) days after the mailing or publicationof the notice, the owner of the property and any other party in

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1 interest or claimant may file a verified answer and claim to the 2 property described in the notice of seizure and of the intended 3 forfeiture proceeding.

If at the end of forty-five (45) days after the notice has 4 Ε. 5 been mailed or published there is no verified answer on file, the court shall hear evidence upon the fact of the unlawful use and 6 7 shall order the property forfeited to the state, if such fact is proved. Except as otherwise provided for in Section 2-503 of this 8 9 title, any such property shall be forfeited to the state and sold 10 under judgment of the court pursuant to the provisions of Section 2-508 of this title. 11

F. If a verified answer is filed, the forfeiture proceedingshall be set for hearing.

G. At a hearing in a proceeding against property described in paragraphs 3 through 9 of subsection A or subsections B and C of Section 2-503 of this title, the requirements set forth in said the paragraph or subsection, respectively, shall be satisfied by the state by a preponderance of the evidence.

H. The claimant of any right, title, or interest in the property may prove a lien, mortgage, or conditional sales contract to be a bona fide or innocent ownership interest and that such right, title, or interest was created without any knowledge or reason to believe that the property was being, or was to be, used for the purpose charged.

 property released to the bona fide or innocent owner, lien holder,
 mortgagee or vendor if the amount due him is equal to, or in excess
 of, the value of the property as of the date of the seizure, it
 being the intention of this section to forfeit only the right, title
 or interest of the purchaser.

If the amount due to such person is less than the value of the property, or if no bona fide claim is established, the property shall be forfeited to the state and sold under judgment of the court, as provided for in Section 2-508 of this title, except as otherwise provided for in Section 2-503 of this title.

L. The proceeds of the sale of any property not taken or
detained by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous
Drugs Control, the Department of Public Safety, the Oklahoma State
Bureau of Investigation, the Alcoholic Beverage Laws Enforcement
Commission, the Department of Corrections or the Office of the
Attorney General shall be distributed as follows, in the order
indicated:

To the bona fide or innocent purchaser, conditional sales
 vendor or mortgagee of the property, if any, up to the amount of his
 or her interest in the property, when the court declaring the
 forfeiture orders a distribution to such person;

18 2. To the payment of the actual expenses of preserving the 19 property and legitimate costs related to the civil forfeiture 20 proceedings. For purposes of this paragraph, the term "legitimate 21 costs" shall not include court costs associated with any civil 22 forfeiture proceeding; and

3. The balance to a revolving fund in the office of the county
treasurer of the county wherein the property was seized, said the

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1 fund to be used as a revolving fund solely for enforcement of 2 controlled dangerous substances laws, drug abuse prevention and drug 3 abuse education, and maintained by the district attorney in his or her discretion for those purposes with a yearly accounting to the 4 5 board of county commissioners in whose county the fund is 6 established and to the District Attorneys Council; provided, one hundred percent (100%) of the balance of the proceeds of such sale 7 of property forfeited due to nonpayment of a fine imposed pursuant 8 9 to the provisions of Section 2-415 of this title shall be 10 apportioned as provided in Section 2-416 of this title. The 11 revolving fund shall be audited by the State Auditor and Inspector 12 at least every two (2) years in the manner provided in Section 171 of Title 19 of the Oklahoma Statutes. Said The audit shall include, 13 but not be limited to, a compliance audit. A district attorney may 14 15 enter into agreements with municipal, tribal, county or state 16 agencies to return to such an agency a percentage of proceeds of the sale of any property seized by the agency and forfeited under the 17 provisions of this section. The District Attorneys Council shall 18 adopt guidelines which ensure that such agencies receive a 19 reasonable percentage of such proceeds, considering the relative 20 contribution of each agency to the drug enforcement and prosecution 21 operations relating to the seizure. In formulating said the 22 quidelines, the District Attorneys Council shall examine federal 23 guidelines on asset distribution and use said the guidelines as a 24

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basis for establishing guidelines for this state. The Attorney
General is hereby authorized to mediate disputes between district
attorneys and such agencies concerning the application of said the
guidelines in particular instances. Any agency that receives
proceeds from an asset distribution shall maintain a true and
accurate record of all such assets.

M. Whenever any vehicle, airplane or vessel is forfeited under the Uniform Controlled Dangerous Substances Act, the district court of jurisdiction may order that the vehicle, airplane or vessel seized may be retained by the state, county or city law enforcement agency which seized the vehicle, airplane or vessel for its official use.

N. If the court finds that the state failed to satisfy the required showing provided for in subsection G of this section, the court shall order the property released to the owner or owners.

16 0. Except as provided for in subsection Q of this section, a 17 bona fide or innocent owner, lien holder, mortgagee or vendor that 18 recovers property pursuant to this section shall not be liable for 19 storage fees.

P. Except as provided for in subsection Q of this section, storage fees shall be paid by the agency which is processing the seizure and forfeiture from funds generated by seizure and forfeiture actions.

Q. The bona fide or innocent owner, lien holder, mortgagee or vendor shall reclaim subject seized property within thirty (30) days of written notice from the seizing agency. If such person fails to reclaim the property within the thirty-day time period, then storage fees may be assessed against their secured interest.

1. At any hearing held relevant to this section, a report 6 R. 7 of the findings of the laboratory of the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation, the medical examiner's report of investigation or 8 9 autopsy report, or a laboratory report from a forensic laboratory 10 operated by the State of Oklahoma or any political subdivision 11 thereof, which has been made available to the accused by the office 12 of the district attorney or other party to the forfeiture at least five (5) days prior to the hearing, with reference to all or part of 13 the evidence submitted, when certified as correct by the persons 14 making the report shall be received as evidence of the facts and 15 findings stated, if relevant and otherwise admissible in evidence. 16 If such report is deemed relevant by the forfeiture applicant or the 17 respondent, the court shall admit such report without the testimony 18 of the person making the report, unless the court, pursuant to this 19 subsection, orders such person to appear. 20

21 2. When any alleged controlled dangerous substance has been
 22 submitted to the laboratory of the OSBI for analysis, and such
 23 analysis shows that the submitted material is a controlled dangerous
 24 substance, the distribution of which constitutes a felony under the

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1 laws of this state, no portion of such substance shall be released 2 to any other person or laboratory except to the criminal justice agency originally submitting the substance to the OSBI for analysis, 3 absent an order of a district court. The defendant shall 4 5 additionally be required to submit to the court a procedure for transfer and analysis of the subject material to ensure the 6 7 integrity of the sample and to prevent the material from being used in any illegal manner. 8

The court, upon motion of either party, shall order the 10 attendance of any person preparing a report submitted as evidence in 11 the hearing when it appears there is a substantial likelihood that 12 material evidence not contained in said the report may be produced by the testimony of any person having prepared a report. 13 The hearing shall be held and, if sustained, an order issued not less 14 15 than five (5) days prior to the time when the testimony shall be required. 16

If within five (5) days prior to the hearing or during a hearing, a motion is made pursuant to this section requiring a person having prepared a report to testify, the court may hear a report or other evidence but shall continue the hearing until such time notice of the motion and hearing is given to the person making the report, the motion is heard, and, if sustained, the testimony ordered can be given.

In any forfeiture proceeding under this chapter in which the defendant or claimant prevails, the court may order the plaintiff 2 3 processing the seizure and forfeiture to pay from funds generated by seizure and forfeiture actions: 4 5 1. Reasonable attorney fees and other litigation costs reasonably incurred by the defendant or claimant directly related to 6 the claim on which the defendant or claimant prevailed; 7 Postjudgment interest; and 8 2. 9 3. In cases involving currency or other negotiable instruments: interest actually paid to the state from the date of 10 a. seizure or arrest of the property that resulted from 11 12 the investment of the property in an interest-bearing account or instrument, and 13 b. an imputed amount of interest that such currency, 14 instruments, or proceeds would have earned at the rate 15 applicable to the thirty-day Treasury Bill, for any 16 period during which no interest was paid, not 17 including any period when the property reasonably was 18 in use as evidence in an official proceeding or in 19 conducting scientific tests for the purpose of 20

21 collecting evidence, commencing fifteen (15) days 22 after the property was seized by a law enforcement 23 agency or was turned over to a law enforcement agency 24 by a federal law enforcement authority.

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1	T. Any law enforcement agency seizing property pursuant to this
2	section shall submit an annual report identifying the property
3	seized and the disposition of such property to the Governor, the
4	President Pro Tempore of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of
5	Representatives and the Office of the State Auditor and Inspector.
6	All reports submitted pursuant to this subsection shall be made
7	available to the public.
8	SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2019.
