Research Analysis

HB 2919 modifies the crime of trespass on posted property. The measure provides that a person who enters into a house or attached or detached outbuilding within the curtilage of a house, a fenced-in patio or garden area of a house, or any other enclosed and locked property belonging to another person or legal entity, without prior consent under circumstances where the person reasonably should know that the person does not have permission to enter is guilty of trespass. The measure also allows the owner of a public business, trade or profession to forbid the entry or presence of any person if the owner believes the person has been a participant in a crime occurring on the property.

Fiscal Analysis

HB 2919 expands the types of trespassing eligible for a misdemeanor punishable by a fine not exceeding \$500, imprisonment, or both. This could have a small revenue increase for the state, however, this is estimated to be negligible.
