Bill Analysis

SB 28 modifies eligibility for parole. For crimes committed before July 1, 1998, the measure allows prisoners, excepting those convicted to life without parole, who completed 1/3 of their sentence to be eligible for parole. Current law establishes different eligibility metrics depending on the crime.

The measure also removes these metrics for crimes committed after July 1, 1998 and before November 1, 2018. Persons convicted of a crime in this timeframe will be eligible for parole after they served 1/3 of their sentence.
