1 SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 68 O.S. 2021, Section 1356, as 2 last amended by Section 1, Chapter 539, O.S.L. 2021, is amended to 3 read as follows:

Section 1356. Exemptions - Governmental and nonprofit entities.
There are hereby specifically exempted from the tax levied by
Section 1350 et seq. of this title:

7 Sale of tangible personal property or services to the United 1. States government or to the State of Oklahoma this state, any 8 9 political subdivision of this state, or any agency of a political 10 subdivision of this state; provided, all sales to contractors in 11 connection with the performance of any contract with the United 12 States government, State of Oklahoma this state, or any of its 13 political subdivisions shall not be exempted from the tax levied by 14 Section 1350 et seq. of this title, except as hereinafter provided;

15 2. Sales of property to agents appointed by or under contract 16 with agencies or instrumentalities of the United States government 17 if ownership and possession of such property transfers immediately 18 to the United States government;

3. Sales of property to agents appointed by or under contract with a political subdivision of this state if the sale of such property is associated with the development of a qualified federal facility, as provided in the Oklahoma Federal Facilities Development Act, and if ownership and possession of such property transfers immediately to the political subdivision or the state;

Sales made directly by county, district, or state fair authorities of this state, upon the premises of the fair authority, 2 for the sole benefit of the fair authority or sales of admission 3 tickets to such fairs or fair events at any location in the state 4 5 authorized by county, district, or state fair authorities; provided, the exemption provided by this paragraph for admission tickets to 6 fair events shall apply only to any portion of the admission price 7 that is retained by or distributed to the fair authority. As used 8 9 in this paragraph, "fair event" shall be limited to an event held on the premises of the fair authority in conjunction with and during 10 the time period of a county, district, or state fair; 11

5. Sale of food in cafeterias or lunchrooms of elementary schools, high schools, colleges, or universities which are operated primarily for teachers and pupils and are not operated primarily for the public or for profit;



YWCA or YMCA organization which is part of a national nonprofit
community service organization working to meet the health and social
service needs of its members across the United States;
