20	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
21	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 85A O.S. 2021, Section 13, is
22	amended to read as follows:
23	Section 13. A. 1. A mental injury or illness is not a
24	compensable injury unless caused by a physical injury to the

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1 employee, and shall not be considered an injury arising out of and 2 in the course and scope of employment or compensable unless demonstrated by a preponderance of the evidence; provided, however, 3 4 that this physical injury limitation shall not apply to any victim 5 of a crime of violence or to a law enforcement officer, firefighter, 6 or emergency medical technician on a full-time basis by a 7 municipality, county, or the State of Oklahoma, or a volunteer firefighter who suffers post traumatic stress disorder, as defined 8 9 herein, while responding to an emergency. For the purpose of this 10 section, such employee shall be referred to as a first responder. 11 2. No mental injury or illness under this section shall be 12 compensable unless it is also diagnosed by a licensed psychiatrist 13 or psychologist and unless the diagnosis of the condition meets the 14 criteria established in the most current issue of the Diagnostic and 15 Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders. 16 Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, where a в. 1. 17 claim is for mental injury or illness, the employee shall be limited 18 to twenty-six (26) weeks of disability benefits unless it is shown 19 by clear and convincing evidence that benefits should continue for a

20 set period of time, not to exceed a total of fifty-two (52) weeks.

21 If the treating physician is of the opinion that the first responder

22 is temporarily unable to perform his or her job or any alternative

24 compensation which is the greater of the weekly benefit provided for

4	section, means a person who holds a license as an emergency medical
5	technician, an intermediate or advanced emergency medical
6	technician, or a paramedic, such license issued by the Oklahoma
7	State Department of Health to perform emergency medical services in
8	accordance with the Oklahoma Emergency Response Systems Development
9	Act and the rules and standards promulgated by the State

11	G. Any city or town in this state that incurs a claim relating
12	to post traumatic stress disorder may, at the city or town's option,
13	transfer the payment of all or any portion of the claim or increased
14	workers compensation premiums to the judgment rolls of the
15	geographic area or areas serviced by the department of the injured
16	worker, including any unincorporated areas serviced by the
17	department, and shall be listed on official publications as "First
18	Responder PTSD".
19	SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 85 O.S. 2021, Section 380, is
20	amended to read as follows:
21	Section 380. A. 1. Volunteer fire departments organized
22	pursuant to state law may obtain workers' compensation insurance for
23	volunteer firefighters through the Volunteer Firefighter Group
24	Insurance Pool pursuant to requirements established by CompSource

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1 Mutual Insurance Company the Office of Management and Enterprise 2 Services which shall administer the Pool. For the premium set by CompSource Mutual Insurance Company the Office of Management and 3 4 Enterprise Services, the state shall provide Fifty-five Dollars 5 (\$55.00) per firefighter per year. Except as otherwise provided by 6 subsection D of this section, the total amount paid by the state 7 shall not exceed Three Hundred Twenty Thousand Three Hundred Thirty-8 eight Dollars (\$320,338.00) per year or so much thereof as may be 9 necessary to fund the Volunteer Firefighter Group Insurance Pool. 10 2. CompSource Mutual Insurance Company The Office of Management 11 and Enterprise Services shall collect the premium from state 12 agencies, public trusts and other instrumentalities of the state. 13 Any funds received by CompSource Mutual Insurance Company the Office 14 of Management and Enterprise Services from any state agency, public 15 trust, or other instrumentality for purposes of workers' 16 compensation insurance pursuant to this section shall be deposited 17 to the credit of the Volunteer Firefighter Group Insurance Pool. 18 CompSource Mutual Insurance Company The Office of Management and 19 Enterprise Services hall collect premiums, pay claims, and provide 20 for excess insurance as needed.

B. CompSource Mutual Insurance Company <u>The Office of Management</u>
 and Enterprise Services shall report, annually, to the Governor, the
 Speaker of the Oklahoma House of Representatives, and the President
 Pro Tempore of the State Senate the number of enrollees in the

Volunteer Firefighter Group Insurance Pool, and the amount of any anticipated surplus or deficiency of the Pool; and shall also provide to the Governor, the Speaker of the Oklahoma House of Representatives and the President Pro Tempore of the State Senate sixty (60) days advance notice of any proposed change in rates for the Volunteer Firefighter Group Insurance Pool.

The amount of claims paid, claim expenses, underwriting losses, loss ratio, or any other financial aspect of the Volunteer 8 9 Firefighter Group Insurance Pool shall not be considered when 10 determining or considering bids for the amount of any premiums, 11 rates, or expenses owed by, or any discounts, rebates, dividends, or 12 other financial benefits owed to any other policyholder of 13 CompSource Mutual Insurance Company the Office of Management and 14 Enterprise Services.

15 Except as otherwise provided by law, any increase in the D. 16 state payment rate for volunteer firefighters under the Volunteer 17 Firefighter Group Insurance Pool shall not exceed five percent (5%) 18 Any proposed change in rates for the Volunteer per annum. 19 Firefighter Group Insurance Pool must be approved by the Board of 20 Directors of CompSource Mutual Insurance Company the Office of 21 Management and Enterprise Services with notice provided pursuant to 22 subsection B of this section. CompSource Mutual Insurance Company 23 The Office of Management and Enterprise Services shall not increase

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premiums for the Volunteer Firefighter Group Insurance Pool more
 than once per annum.

3	E. For purposes of this section, the term "volunteer fire
4	departments" includes those volunteer fire departments which have
5	authorized voluntary or uncompensated workers rendering services as
6	firefighters and are created by statute pursuant to Section 592 of
7	Title 18 of the Oklahoma Statutes, Sections 29-201 through 29-204 of
8	Title 11 of the Oklahoma Statutes, and those defined by Section 351
9	of Title 19 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
10	SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2022.
