6	An Act relating to agriculture; designating the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and
7	Forestry as the state educational agency referenced by the National School Lunch Act; providing that the
8	Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry may secure and administer the benefits of
9	the National School Lunch Act; directing the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry to
10	provide general supervision of the school lunch program; creating the School Lunch Workshop Revolving
11	Fund; providing for the allocation of funds for the school lunch program; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Section
12	3-104, which relates to the State Board of Education's powers and duties; removing the State
13	Board of Education from overseeing and administering school lunch program under the National School Lunch
14	Act; repealing 70 O.S. 2021, Section 3-119, which relates to the school lunch program; providing for
15	codification; and providing an effective date.
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17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
18	SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
19	in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3041 of Title 2, unless there is
20	created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
21	The Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry
22	shall:
23	1. Be and is hereby designated as the "State Educational
24	Agency" referred to in Public Law 396 of the 79th Congress of the

1 United States, which law states that said act may be cited as the 2 "National School Lunch Act", and said Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry is hereby authorized and directed to 3 4 accept the terms and provisions of said act and to enter into such 5 agreements, not in conflict with the Constitution of Oklahoma or the 6 Constitution and statutes of the United States, as may be necessary 7 or appropriate to secure for the State of Oklahoma the benefits of 8 the school lunch program established and referred to in said act;

9 2. Have authority to secure and administer the benefits of the 10 National School Lunch Act, Public Law 396 of the 79th Congress of the United States, in the State of Oklahoma and is hereby authorized 11 12 to employ or appoint and fix the compensation of such additional 13 officers or employees and to incur such expenses as may be necessary 14 for the accomplishment of the above purpose, administer the 15 distribution of any state funds appropriated by the Legislature 16 required as federal matching to reimburse on children's meals; and

17 3. Have general supervision of the school lunch program. The 18 Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry may sponsor 19 workshops for personnel and participants in the school lunch program 20 and may develop, print, and distribute free of charge or sell any 21 materials, books, and bulletins to be used in such school lunch 22 programs. There is hereby created in the State Treasury a revolving 23 fund for the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry, 24 to be designated the "School Lunch Workshop Revolving Fund". The

1 fund shall consist of all fees derived from or on behalf of any participant in any such workshop sponsored by the Oklahoma 2 Department of Agriculture, Food, and Forestry, or from the sale of 3 4 any materials, books, and bulletins, and such funds shall be 5 disbursed for expenses of such workshops and for developing, printing, and distributing such materials, books, and bulletins 6 7 related to the school lunch program. The fund shall be administered in accordance with Section 155 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes. 8 9 SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 10 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3042 of Title 2, unless there is 11 created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows: 12 Funds appropriated to the Oklahoma Department of Agriculture, 13 Food, and Forestry for school lunch matching and the school lunch 14 program shall be apportioned by the Oklahoma Department of 15 Agriculture, Food, and Forestry to each school district for the 16 purpose of providing meals for children in compliance with the 17 National School Lunch Act and the Child Nutrition Act of 1966 and 18 Public Law 91-248, as they may hereafter be amended or supplemented. 19 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 3-104, is 20 amended to read as follows: 21 Section 3-104. Α. The supervision of the public school system 22 of Oklahoma shall be vested in the State Board of Education and, 23 subject to limitations otherwise provided by law, the State Board of 24 Education shall:

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Adopt policies and make rules for the operation of the
 public school system of the state;

2. Appoint, prescribe the duties and fix the compensation of a
secretary, an attorney and all other personnel necessary for the
proper performance of the functions of the State Board of Education.
The secretary shall not be a member of the Board;

7 3. Submit to the Governor a departmental budget based upon major functions of the Department as prepared by the State 8 9 Superintendent of Public Instruction and supported by detailed data 10 on needs and proposed operations as partially determined by the 11 budgetary needs of local school districts filed with the State Board 12 of Education for the ensuing fiscal year. Appropriations therefor 13 shall be made in lump-sum form for each major item in the budget as 14 follows:

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a. State Aid to schools,

16 b. the supervision of all other functions of general and 17 special education including general control, free 18 textbooks, school lunch, Indian education and all 19 other functions of the Board and an amount sufficient 20 to adequately staff and administer these services, and 21 с. the Board shall determine the details by which the 22 budget and the appropriations are administered. 23 Annually, the Board shall make preparations to 24 consolidate all of the functions of the Department in

such a way that the budget can be based on two items, administration and aid to schools. A maximum amount for administration shall be designated as a part of the total appropriation;

4. On the first day of December preceding each regular session
of the Legislature, prepare and deliver to the Governor and the
Legislature a report for the year ending June 30 immediately
preceding the regular session of the Legislature. The report shall
contain:

- a. detailed statistics and other information concerning
 enrollment, attendance, expenditures including State
 Aid, and other pertinent data for all public schools
 in this state,
- b. reports from each and every division within the State
 Department of Education as submitted by the State
 Superintendent of Public Instruction and any other
 division, department, institution or other agency
 under the supervision of the Board,
- c. recommendations for the improvement of the public
 school system of the state,
- d. a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the
 State Board of Education for the past year, and
 e. a statement of plans and recommendations for the
 management and improvement of public schools and such

1 other information relating to the educational
2 interests of the state as may be deemed necessary and
3 desirable;

5. Provide for the formulation and adoption of curricula,
courses of study and other instructional aids necessary for the
adequate instruction of pupils in the public schools;

7 6. Have authority in matters pertaining to the licensure and certification of persons for instructional, supervisory and 8 9 administrative positions and services in the public schools of the 10 state subject to the provisions of Section 6-184 of this title, and 11 shall formulate rules governing the issuance and revocation of 12 certificates for superintendents of schools, principals, 13 supervisors, librarians, clerical employees, school nurses, school 14 bus drivers, visiting teachers, classroom teachers and for other 15 personnel performing instructional, administrative and supervisory 16 services, but not including members of boards of education and other 17 employees who do not work directly with pupils, and may charge and 18 collect reasonable fees for the issuance of such certificates:

19a.the State Department of Education shall not issue a20certificate to and shall revoke the certificate of any21person who has been convicted, whether upon a verdict22or plea of guilty or upon a plea of nolo contendere,23or received a suspended sentence or any probationary24term for a crime or an attempt to commit a crime

1 provided for in Section 843.5 of Title 21 of the 2 Oklahoma Statutes if the offense involved sexual abuse 3 or sexual exploitation as those terms are defined in 4 Section 1-1-105 of Title 10A of the Oklahoma Statutes, 5 Section 741, 843.1, if the offense included sexual abuse or sexual exploitation, 865 et seq., 885, 888, 6 7 891, 1021, 1021.2, 1021.3, 1040.13a, 1087, 1088, 1111.1, 1114 or 1123 of Title 21 of the Oklahoma 8 9 Statutes or who enters this state and who has been 10 convicted, received a suspended sentence or received a 11 deferred judgment for a crime or attempted crime 12 which, if committed or attempted in this state, would 13 be a crime or an attempt to commit a crime provided 14 for in any of said laws, and 15 all funds collected by the State Department of b. 16 Education for the issuance of certificates to 17 instructional, supervisory and administrative 18 personnel in the public schools of the state shall be 19 deposited in the "Teachers' Certificate Fund" in the 20 State Treasury and may be expended by the State Board 21 of Education to finance the activities of the State 22 Department of Education necessary to administer the 23 program, for consultative services, publication costs, 24 actual and necessary travel expenses as provided in

1 the State Travel Reimbursement Act incurred by persons 2 performing research work, and other expenses found 3 necessary by the State Board of Education for the 4 improvement of the preparation and certification of 5 teachers in Oklahoma. Provided, any unobligated balance in the Teachers' Certificate Fund in excess of 6 7 Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) on June 30 of any fiscal year shall be transferred to the General 8 9 Revenue Fund of the State of Oklahoma. Until July 1, 10 1997, the State Board of Education shall have 11 authority for approval of teacher education programs. 12 The State Board of Education shall also have authority 13 for the administration of teacher residency and 14 professional development, subject to the provisions of 15 the Oklahoma Teacher Preparation Act;

16 7. Promulgate rules governing the classification, inspection, 17 supervision and accrediting of all public nursery, kindergarten, 18 elementary and secondary schools and on-site educational services 19 provided by public school districts or state-accredited private 20 schools in partial hospitalization programs, day treatment programs, 21 and day hospital programs as defined in this act for persons between 22 the ages of three (3) and twenty-one (21) years of age in the state. 23 However, no school shall be denied accreditation solely on the basis 24 of average daily attendance.

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1 Any school district which maintains an elementary school and 2 faces the necessity of relocating its school facilities because of construction of a lake, either by state or federal authority, which 3 will inundate the school facilities, shall be entitled to receive 4 5 probationary accreditation from the State Board of Education for a period of five (5) years after the effective date of this act and 6 7 any school district, otherwise qualified, shall be entitled to receive probationary accreditation from the State Board of Education 8 9 for a period of two (2) consecutive years to attain the minimum 10 average daily attendance. The Head Start and public nurseries or 11 kindergartens operated from Community Action Program funds shall not 12 be subjected to the accrediting rules of the State Board of Education. Neither will the State Board of Education make rules 13 14 affecting the operation of the public nurseries and kindergartens 15 operated from federal funds secured through Community Action 16 Programs even though they may be operating in the public schools of 17 the state. However, any of the Head Start or public nurseries or 18 kindergartens operated under federal regulations may make 19 application for accrediting from the State Board of Education but 20 will be accredited only if application for the approval of the 21 programs is made. The status of no school district shall be changed 22 which will reduce it to a lower classification until due notice has 23 been given to the proper authorities thereof and an opportunity

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1 given to correct the conditions which otherwise would be the cause 2 of such reduction.

Private and parochial schools may be accredited and classified in like manner as public schools or, if an accrediting association is approved by the State Board of Education, by procedures established by the State Board of Education to accept accreditation by such accrediting association, if application is made to the State Board of Education for such accrediting;

9 8. Be the legal agent of the State of Oklahoma to accept, in
10 its discretion, the provisions of any Act of Congress appropriating
11 or apportioning funds which are now, or may hereafter be, provided
12 for use in connection with any phase of the system of public
13 education in Oklahoma. It shall prescribe such rules as it finds
14 necessary to provide for the proper distribution of such funds in
15 accordance with the state and federal laws;

9. Be and is specifically hereby designated as the agency of this state to cooperate and deal with any officer, board or authority of the United States Government under any law of the United States which may require or recommend cooperation with any state board having charge of the administration of public schools unless otherwise provided by law;

22 10. Be and is hereby designated as the "State Educational 23 Agency" referred to in Public Law 396 of the 79th Congress of the 24 United States, which law states that said act may be cited as the ¹ "National School Lunch Act", and said State Board of Education is
² hereby authorized and directed to accept the terms and provisions of
³ said act and to enter into such agreements, not in conflict with the
⁴ Constitution of Oklahoma or the Constitution and Statutes of the
⁵ United States, as may be necessary or appropriate to secure for the
⁶ State of Oklahoma the benefits of the school lunch program
⁷ established and referred to in said act;

11. Have authority to secure and administer the benefits of the 8 9 National School Lunch Act, Public Law 396 of the 79th Congress of 10 the United States, in the State of Oklahoma and is hereby authorized 11 to employ or appoint and fix the compensation of such additional 12 officers or employees and to incur such expenses as may be necessary 13 for the accomplishment of the above purpose, administer the 14 distribution of any state funds appropriated by the Legislature 15 required as federal matching to reimburse on children's meals;

16 12. Accept and provide for the administration of any land, 17 money, buildings, gifts, donation or other things of value which may 18 be offered or bequeathed to the schools under the supervision or 19 control of said Board;

Have authority to require persons having administrative control of all school districts in Oklahoma to make such regular and special reports regarding the activities of the schools in said districts as the Board may deem needful for the proper exercise of its duties and functions. Such authority shall include the right of

the State Board of Education to withhold all state funds under its control, to withhold official recognition, including accrediting, until such required reports have been filed and accepted in the office of said Board and to revoke the certificates of persons failing or refusing to make such reports;

6 14. Have general supervision of the school lunch program. The 7 State Board of Education may sponsor workshops for personnel and participants in the school lunch program and may develop, print and 8 9 distribute free of charge or sell any materials, books and bulletins 10 to be used in such school lunch programs. There is hereby created in the State Treasury a revolving fund for the Board, to be 11 12 designated the School Lunch Workshop Revolving Fund. The fund shall 13 consist of all fees derived from or on behalf of any participant in 14 any such workshop sponsored by the State Board of Education, or from 15 the sale of any materials, books and bulletins, and such funds shall 16 be disbursed for expenses of such workshops and for developing, 17 printing and distributing of such materials, books and bulletins 18 relating to the school lunch program. The fund shall be 19 administered in accordance with Section 155 of Title 62 of the 20 Oklahoma Statutes; 21 15. 12. Prescribe all forms for school district and county

21 officers to report to the State Board of Education where required. 23 The State Board of Education shall also prescribe a list of 24 appropriation accounts by which the funds of school districts shall be budgeted, accounted for and expended; and it shall be the duty of the State Auditor and Inspector in prescribing all budgeting, accounting and reporting forms for school funds to conform to such lists;

5 <u>16. 13.</u> Provide for the establishment of a uniform system of
6 pupil and personnel accounting, records and reports;

7 <u>17. 14.</u> Have authority to provide for the health and safety of 8 school children and school personnel while under the jurisdiction of 9 school authorities;

10 18. 15. Provide for the supervision of the transportation of 11 pupils;

12 <u>19. 16.</u> Have authority, upon request of the local school board, 13 to act in behalf of the public schools of the state in the purchase 14 of transportation equipment;

Have authority and is hereby required to perform all duties necessary to the administration of the public school system in Oklahoma as specified in the Oklahoma School Code; and, in addition thereto, those duties not specifically mentioned herein if not delegated by law to any other agency or official;

20 <u>21. 18.</u> Administer the State Public Common School Building 21 Equalization Fund established by Section 32 of Article X of the 22 Oklahoma Constitution. Any monies as may be appropriated or 23 designated by the Legislature, other than ad valorem taxes, any 24 other funds identified by the State Department of Education, which

1 may include, but not be limited to, grants-in-aid from the federal government for building purposes, the proceeds of all property that 2 shall fall to the state by escheat, penalties for unlawful holding 3 4 of real estate by corporations, and capital gains on assets of the 5 permanent school funds, shall be deposited in the State Public 6 Common School Building Equalization Fund. The fund shall be used to 7 aid school districts and charter schools in acquiring buildings, subject to the limitations fixed by Section 32 of Article X of the 8 9 Oklahoma Constitution. It is hereby declared that the term 10 "acquiring buildings" as used in Section 32 of Article X of the 11 Oklahoma Constitution shall mean acquiring or improving school 12 sites, constructing, repairing, remodeling or equipping buildings, 13 or acquiring school furniture, fixtures, or equipment. It is hereby declared that the term "school districts" as used in Section 32 of 14 15 Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution shall mean school districts 16 and eligible charter schools as defined in subsection B of this 17 section. The State Board of Education shall disburse redbud school 18 grants annually from the State Public Common School Building 19 Equalization Fund to public schools and eligible charter schools 20 pursuant to subsection B of this section. The Board shall 21 promulgate rules for the implementation of disbursing redbud school 22 grants pursuant to this section. The State Board of Education shall 23 prescribe rules for making grants of aid from, and for otherwise 24 administering, the fund pursuant to the provisions of this

1 paragraph, and may employ and fix the duties and compensation of technicians, aides, clerks, stenographers, attorneys and other 2 personnel deemed necessary to carry out the provisions of this 3 4 The cost of administering the fund shall be paid from paragraph. 5 monies appropriated to the State Board of Education for the operation of the State Department of Education. From monies 6 7 apportioned to the fund, the State Department of Education may reserve not more than one-half of one percent (1/2 of 1%) for 8 9 purposes of administering the fund;

10 22. 19. Recognize that the Director of the Oklahoma Department 11 of Corrections shall be the administrative authority for the schools 12 which are maintained in the state reformatories and shall appoint 13 the principals and teachers in such schools. Provided, that rules 14 of the State Board of Education for the classification, inspection 15 and accreditation of public schools shall be applicable to such 16 schools; and such schools shall comply with standards set by the 17 State Board of Education; and

18 23. 20. Have authority to administer a revolving fund which is 19 hereby created in the State Treasury, to be designated the 20 Statistical Services Revolving Fund. The fund shall consist of all 21 monies received from the various school districts of the state, the 22 United States Government, and other sources for the purpose of 23 furnishing or financing statistical services and for any other 24 purpose as designated by the Legislature. The State Board of

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Education is hereby authorized to enter into agreements with school districts, municipalities, the United States Government, foundations and other agencies or individuals for services, programs or research projects. The Statistical Services Revolving Fund shall be administered in accordance with Section 155 of Title 62 of the Oklahoma Statutes.

- 7 B. 1. The redbud school grants shall be determined by the
 8 State Department of Education as follows:
- 9 a. divide the county four-mill levy revenue by four to
 10 determine the nonchargeable county four-mill revenue
 11 for each school district,
- 12 b. determine the amount of new revenue generated by the 13 five-mill building fund levy as authorized by Section 14 10 of Article X of the Oklahoma Constitution for each 15 school district as reported in the Oklahoma Cost 16 Accounting System for the preceding fiscal year, 17 add the amounts calculated in subparagraphs a and b of с. 18 this paragraph to determine the nonchargeable millage 19 for each school district,
- 20d. add the nonchargeable millage in each district21statewide as calculated in subparagraph c of this22paragraph and divide the total by the average daily23membership in public schools statewide based on the24preceding school year's average daily membership,

according to the provisions of Section 18-107 of this title. This amount is the statewide nonchargeable millage per student, known as the baseline local funding per student,

- e. all eligible charter schools shall be included in
 these calculations as unique school districts,
 separate from the school district that may sponsor the
 eligible charter school, and the total number of
 districts shall be used to determine the statewide
 average baseline local funding per student,
- 11 f. for each school district or eligible charter school 12 which is below the baseline local funding per student, 13 the Department shall subtract the baseline local 14 funding per student from the average nonchargeable 15 millage per student of the school district or eligible 16 charter school to determine the nonchargeable millage 17 per student shortfall for each district, and 18 the nonchargeable millage per student shortfall for a g. 19 school district or eligible charter school shall be 20 multiplied by the average daily membership of the 21 preceding school year of the eligible school district 22 or eligible charter school. This amount shall be the 23 redbud school grant amount for the school district or 24 eligible charter school.

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1 2. For fiscal year 2022, monies for the redbud school grants 2 shall be expended from the funds apportioned pursuant to Section 2 3 426 of this act Title 63 of the Oklahoma Statutes. For fiscal year 4 2023 and each subsequent fiscal year, monies for the redbud school 5 grants shall be appropriated pursuant to Section 2 426 of this act Title 63 of the Oklahoma Statutes, not to exceed three-fourths (3/4) 6 7 of the tax collected in the preceding fiscal year pursuant to Section 426 of Title 63 of the Oklahoma Statutes as determined by 8 9 the Oklahoma Tax Commission. For fiscal year 2023 and each 10 subsequent fiscal year, if such appropriated funds are insufficient 11 to fund the redbud school grants, then an additional apportionment 12 of funds shall be made from sales tax collections as provided by 13 subsection D of Section 3 1353 of this act Title 68 of the Oklahoma 14 If both funds are insufficient, the Department shall Statutes. 15 promulgate rules to permit a decrease to the baseline local funding 16 per student to the highest amount allowed with the funding 17 available.

3. As used in this section, "eligible charter school" shall mean a charter school which is sponsored pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Charter School Act. Provided, however, "eligible charter school" shall not include a charter school sponsored by the Statewide Virtual Charter School Board but shall only include those which provide in-person or blended instruction, as provided by

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Section 1-111 of this title, to not less than two-thirds (2/3) of
 students as the primary means of instructional service delivery.

4. The Department shall develop a program to acknowledge the
redbud school grant recipients and shall include elected members of
the Oklahoma House of Representatives and Oklahoma State Senate who
represent the school districts and eligible charter schools.

7 5. The Department shall create a dedicated page on its website
8 listing annual redbud school grant recipients, amount awarded to
9 each recipient and other pertinent information about the Redbud
10 School Funding Act.

6. The Department shall provide the Chair of the House
Appropriations and Budget Committee and the Chair of the Senate
Appropriations Committee no later than February 1 of each year with
an estimate of the upcoming year's redbud school grant allocation as
prescribed by this section.

16 SECTION 4. REPEALER 70 O.S. 2021, Section 3-119, is
17 hereby repealed.

18 SECTION 5. This act shall become effective November 1, 2022.
