**Research Analysis**

HB 2350 creates a Task Force on State Data Storage and Retrieval Systems. The task force would be required to submit an annual report regarding storage of personal information, including an overview of data maintained by state governmental entities, opportunities to consolidate duplicated data into a central repository, and recommendations for maintenance or enhancement of the central data repository. The task force would also include in its initial report recommendations on the ability of agencies, boards and commissions to access information about a person or business from other agencies and whether that access is consistent with privacy standards or laws.

**Fiscal Analysis**

The measure creates the Task Force on State Data Storage and Retrieval Systems, consisting of 25 persons. The task force is authorized to meet as often as required, but no less than two times each calendar year. An annual report is to be submitted to the Governor, Speaker of the House and President Pro Tempore of the Senate no later than December 31<sup>st</sup> of each year. Staff assistance is to be provided by the House of Representatives, State Senate and the Chief Information Officer.

The activities of the task force are not expected to result in direct measureable costs to any participating agency.
