Research Analysis

HB3689 amends the Successful Adulthood Act to specify that an individual is eligible to receive services between the ages of 18 and 21 if they are seeking higher education, in an employment program, employed, or incapable of any of the listed activities. Additionally, eligible individuals may regain services between 18 and 21. Successful adulthood services may also continue until age 21 if an individual in the custody of DHS or a federally recognized Indian tribe due to abuse or neglect is in an out-of-home placement at the time of the their 16th birthday or if they are 16 or older and have been released from custody because of adoption or guardianship. The measure also authorizes the Department of Human Services to seek federal funding or participate in federal programs developed for the purpose of providing successful adulthood services to eligible individuals.

Fiscal Analysis

HB 3689 authorizes OKDHS to seek federal funding to implement the proposed changes. OKDHS Child Welfare Services and OKSA worked with a consultant to calculate the cost. The total annual cost to implement will be \$9.6 million with \$4 million in federal funding with the state needing to fund \$5.6 million annually. This program will not begin at the full performance level and is estimated to build over a three year time frame. The below chart shows the funding for each of the first three years.
