**Research Analysis**

SUBPCS1 to SB 469 requires the Oklahoma Health Care Authority (OHCA) to provide Medicaid coverage for medically necessary pasteurized donor human milk and donor human milk-derived products in a home setting. Certain medical practitioners licensed in the state must sign an order stating such milk is medically necessary for an infant if the infant is unable to receive maternal breast milk or the infant's mother is unable to produce breast milk in sufficient quantities. The order also states that milk will be provided by a donor human milk bank licensed by the Oklahoma Health Care Authority which meet the quality standards set forth.

SUBPCS1 requires OHCA to promulgate rules and establish minimum quality standards and licensing of all human milk banks in the state. It also requires OHCA to seek any federal approval necessary to implement this act.

Lastly, an emergency is declared.

**Fiscal Analysis**

The SUBPCS does not eliminate the previous fiscal impact. SB469 expands donor milk Medicaid coverage to both the home setting. The revised impact drastically reduces the assumptions on the total number of newborns requiring service and their overall utilization based on comparable data from other states.

OHCA estimates 1,440 oz would be sufficient for 56 newborns at 60 days each. This cost would be approximately \$200k of which the state share would be approximately \$64k.
