**Research Analysis**

Engrossed SB687 amends the Oklahoma 9-1-1 Management Authority Act. The measure updates and clarifies the authority of the Oklahoma 9-1-1 Management Authority to direct the Tax Commission to escrow funds collected pursuant to the act attributable to a public agency. The measure requires local plans to deliver Next Generation 9-1-1 services to align with the state's master plan, and allows funds to be escrowed by OTC if an agency fails to provide connectivity between state, regional and local next-generation systems. The authority is given authority to oversee all 9-1-1 fees collected under the 9-1-1 Management Authority Act and the Oklahoma Emergency Telephone Act. The bill further authorizes the authority to establish rules for interoperability between systems, and clarifies its authority to develop a statewide master plan.
