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11	WHEREAS, Oklahoma has some of the most beautiful landscapes on
12	earth that are incredibly rich in wildlife, including the prairies
13	of the Osage Hills, the playa lakes and wetlands of the Southern
14	High Plains, the Ouachita Mountains, the Ozark Highlands, the Red
15	Hills, the floodplain of the Red River, and the Arbuckle Plains; and
16	WHEREAS, public land under the management of the Oklahoma
17	Department of Tourism and Recreation, Oklahoma Department of
18	Wildlife Conservation, U.S. Forest Service, and other state/federal
19	agencies constitutes just over six percent (6%) of the land in
20	Oklahoma; and
21	WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the essential
22	role of nature, recreation and outdoor spaces in the physical and
23	mental health of Oklahomans; and
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1 WHEREAS, these state and federally owned lands are essential to 2 the quality of life in Oklahoma for every economic class, providing 3 public recreational opportunity for hunting, fishing, kayaking, 4 riding all-terrain vehicles, wildlife viewing, photography, 5 backpacking, cycling, sightseeing, and numerous other outdoor recreational activities; and 6 7 WHEREAS, outdoor recreation is a major economic driver in Oklahoma, generating an estimated \$10.6 billion in consumer spending 8 9 and supporting more than 97,000 jobs in the state according to a 10 study conducted by the Outdoor Industry Association; and 11 WHEREAS, Oklahoma's agriculture industry includes upwards of 50 12 different ranching lessees who depend on grazing on federal and 13 state public land to sustain their operations; and 14 WHEREAS, Oklahoma's timber industry is dependent on federal land 15 for a part of its timber supply, while supporting more than 19,000 16 jobs and contributing \$3.3 billion in revenue to Oklahoma; and 17 WHEREAS, agencies that manage these lands employ hundreds of

Oklahomans who pay taxes and contribute to their communities; and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma's prairies, playas, and forests are naturally

prone to fire and other disturbances, including periodic large-scale

fires and seasonal wet-dry cycles, as part of the ecosystems in

which they have existed for ages, although increasing occurrences of

wildfires and drought are due to fire suppression over many decades;

and

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WHEREAS, federal and state money to fund firefighting costs and other management practices is essential, including prescribed burning and wetland restoration, to protect communities and public infrastructure, including municipal watersheds, particularly in dry or flood years; and

WHEREAS, in 2020, the U.S. Congress enacted the Great American Outdoors Act which prioritizes maintaining and improving existing public lands and parks; and also enacted America's Conservation Enhancement Act, authorizing the North American Wetlands

Conservation Act, which supports voluntary wetland conservation
projects that benefit migratory birds and waterfowl; and supports
outdoor recreation on Oklahoma's public lands like Hackberry Flat
and Drummond Flat Wildlife Management Areas; and

WHEREAS, Americans from throughout the country value these public lands as a part of our national heritage.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE 1ST SESSION OF THE 58TH OKLAHOMA LEGISLATURE:

THAT the Oklahoma House of Representatives supports efforts that highlight the importance of public lands to Oklahomans as well as recognizes the benefits public lands have as a critical part of the state's economy.
