COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE
An Act relating to the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Trust; amending 70 O.S. 2021,
Sections 2621 and 2623, which relate to administration of the Trust; modifying provisions
related to award of scholarships; modifying qualifying income limit; modifying provisions related
to number of scholarships; modifying organization for verification; modifying parties involved in
administration; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2621, is
amended to read as follows:
Section 2621. There is hereby created the Tulsa Reconciliation
Education and Scholarship Program. The purpose of the program is to
provide a scholarship award to residents of the Tulsa School
District, which was greatly impacted both socially and economically
by the civil unrest that occurred in the City of Tulsa during 1921.
Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, or as soon thereafter as
practicable, and subject to the availability of funds, the program

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shall each year make scholarships available to as many as feasible 1 2 up to three hundred scholarships to qualified residents of the Tulsa School District, and to qualified residents of any other common 3 4 school district of the state who are direct lineal descendants as 5 defined in subsection C of Section 2623 of this title and who meet 6 the criteria set forth in Sections 2623 and 2624 of this title, and 7 who are intending to pursue studies at an institution of higher 8 education in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education or a 9 private institution of higher education, or who are intending to 10 pursue studies in a postsecondary career technology education 11 The scholarship shall be an amount of not more than the program. equivalent of the average amount of resident tuition for which an 12 13 eligible Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program 14 participant enrolled at an institution in The Oklahoma State System 15 of Higher Education or a postsecondary career technology education 16 program, whichever is applicable, is obligated to pay. The 17 scholarship shall be paid as provided for in Section 2625 of this 18 title. The further purpose of this program is to establish and 19 maintain a variety of educational support services whereby residents 20 who qualify for the program will be prepared for success in 21 postsecondary endeavors.

22 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2623, is 23 amended to read as follows:

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Section 2623. A. Subject to the availability of funds, the
 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education may annually award a
 maximum of three hundred full-time-equivalent scholarships for the
 Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program to residents
 of the Tulsa School District.

B. To qualify for a scholarship, an applicant shall satisfy thefollowing criteria:

8 1. The family income of the applicant from taxable sources is
9 not more than Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00) One Hundred
10 Twenty Thousand Dollars (\$120,000.00) per year. The Free
11 Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form may be used to
12 verify family income;

13 2. The applicant attended a Tulsa public school where seventy-14 five percent (75%) or more of the students enrolled in the school 15 qualify for the free and reduced lunch program; and

16 3. The applicant resides in a census block area within the 17 Tulsa School District where thirty percent (30%) or more of the 18 residents are at or below the poverty level established by the 19 United States Bureau of the Census.

C. The Regents may consider as a <u>and the selection process</u> <u>shall factor in first</u>, when determining the order of preference of the <u>applicant or</u> applicants, whether an applicant is a direct lineal descendant of <u>a direct lineal descendant of</u> a person who resided in the Greenwood Area in the City of Tulsa between April 30, 1921, and

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1 June 1, 1921. If the Regents use descent as a preference factor, it shall be applied to all applicants regardless of race. 2 The applicants shall be required to present verifiable documentation of 3 4 their lineage. The Oklahoma Historical Society An organization or 5 individual engaged in genealogy and research of descendants and history of the Tulsa, Oklahoma, 1921 race massacre and Greenwood 6 7 area shall verify the authenticity and accuracy of the documentation submitted by an applicant and shall establish confirm the boundaries 8 9 of the Greenwood Area. Verifiable documentation shall include, but 10 not be limited to the following:

Family records including family Bibles, vital records,
 correspondence, memoirs, journals, diaries, unrecorded deeds,
 diplomas, certificates, or testimonials;

Public records including censuses, government records,
military records, pensions, land bounty records, passport
applications, passenger lists, original grants, naturalization or
immigration records, records of entry, or state, province, or local
records; or

Institutional records including church records, cemetery
 records and inscriptions, education institutions, insurance records,
 or societies and fraternal organizations.

D. The Regents shall promulgate rules establishing the
 application requirements for the program and the system for
 evaluating applications based on the preference factors. The

1 application form shall include a small outlined box graphic, 2 followed by language, "Mark the box, if you are a direct lineal descendant of a person greatly impacted socially and economically 3 4 during the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre who resided in the Greenwood 5 area of Tulsa, Oklahoma between April 30, 1921 and June 1, 1921." 6 E. Applicants shall also meet the eligibility criteria established in Section 2624 of this title. 7 The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education shall also 8 F. 9 be authorized to annually award scholarships for the Tulsa 10 Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program to two students at 11 each of the high schools in the Tulsa School District for the 12 purpose of preserving awareness of the history and meaning of the 13 civil unrest that occurred in Tulsa in 1921. The following

14 provisions shall apply to the scholarship provided in this 15 subsection:

Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B of this
 section, eligibility for the scholarships awarded pursuant to this
 subsection shall be:

19a.enrollment in the appropriate high school,20b.family income of the applicant from taxable sources21not to exceed Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00)22One Hundred Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000.00)23per year,

7	2. The State	Regents shall involve the administration of the Tulsa
8	School Distri	ct and a Community Advisory Committee in the selection
9	process. The	Community Advisory Committee shall be comprised of
10	seven members	appointed by the Oklahoma Chancellor for Higher
11	Education. T	he Community Advisory Committee shall combine seven
12	members compr	ised of the following list:
13	a.	<u> One - President of Langston University or Designee,</u>
14	b.	<u> One - Superintendent of Tulsa Public Schools or</u>
15		Designee,
16	<u>C.</u>	<u>Two - Members of the Oklahoma Legislature representing</u>
17		the Greenwood area in the city of Tulsa, Oklahoma or
18		their Designee/s,
19	<u>d.</u>	Two - Descendants of socially and economically,
20		adversely impacted persons who resided in the
21		Greenwood area in the city of Tulsa, Oklahoma between
22		April 30, 1921 and June 1, 1921,
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1	e. One - Citizen with ties to the historic Greenwood
2	community who may be engaged in faith based,
3	education, social, business or advocacy work.
4	The President of Langston University, or Designee, shall be
5	responsible for coordinating the advisory committee and shall submit
6	to the Chancellor for Higher Education a list of proposed committee
7	members for review and approval;

The award shall be limited to a one-year full-time-8 3. 9 equivalent period. Following successful completion of such award, 10 recipients who meet the criteria provided in subsection B of this 11 section shall be eligible to apply and be considered for continued 12 participation in the full Tulsa Reconciliation Education and 13 Scholarship Program. Any student subsequently awarded such 14 scholarship shall have the duration of the scholarship provided 15 pursuant to this subsection deducted from the limits set in 16 subsection D of Section 2625 of this title;

17 4. The award may only be funded with state funds appropriated 18 to the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Trust Fund and 19 income therefrom, and shall be made subject to the availability of 20 such funds; and

5. The awards made pursuant to this subsection shall be included within the maximum number of scholarships specified in subsection A of this section.

24 SECTION 3. This act shall become effective July 1, 2024.

1	SECTION 4. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
2	of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
3	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
4	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
