11	An Act relating to laser hair removal; creating the Laser Hair Removal Act; providing short title;
12	providing definitions; limiting hair removal performance to certain instruments; requiring certain
13	credential; mandating certain training and education program; requiring physician oversight of certain
14	facilities; providing exemption; mandating establishment of protocols; describing supervision
15	requirements; regulating professional conduct of laser practitioners; providing for codification; and
16	providing an effective date.
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19	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
20	SECTION 1. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
21	in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 538.1 of Title 59, unless there
22	is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
23	This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Laser Hair
24	Removal Act".

SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 538.2 of Title 59, unless there
 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

"Health professional" means a physician, physician assistant
 as defined in Section 519.2 of Title 59 of the Oklahoma Statutes,
 Advanced Practice Registered Nurse as defined in Section 567.3a of
 Title 59 of the Oklahoma Statutes, Registered Nurse as defined in
 Section 567.3a of Title 59 of the Oklahoma Statutes, or Licensed
 Practical Nurse as defined in Section 567.3a of Title 59 of the
 Oklahoma Statutes;

11 2. "Laser hair removal" means the use of a class three or class 12 four laser light-based device approved by the United States Food and 13 Drug Administration (FDA) to perform a nonablative hair removal 14 procedure that does not remove the epidermis. Laser hair removal 15 does not include electrolysis as defined in Section 536.2 of Title 16 59 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

17 3. "Laser hair removal facility" means a business location that 18 provides laser hair removal;

4. "Laser practitioner" means a person who practices laser hair
 removal pursuant to this act; and

S. "Physician" means a person licensed to practice medicine
 pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Allopathic Medical and
 Surgical Licensure and Supervision Act or the Oklahoma Osteopathic
 Medicine Act.

SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 538.3 of Title 59, unless there
 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. A laser practitioner shall only perform laser hair removal
using lasers or pulsed light devices approved by the United States
Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for noninvasive procedures.

A person shall not perform or attempt to perform laser hair 7 в. removal unless the person holds the appropriate health professional 8 9 license or certificate as defined in Section 2 of this act. A laser 10 practitioner who is not a physician shall complete a laser practitioner training and education program. A laser training and 11 12 education program may be completed internally at the laser hair removal facility or via a third party, provided such third-party 13 program is overseen by a physician. A laser practitioner training 14 and education program shall include forty (40) total hours of 15 training which may be a combination of didactic training, in-person 16 hands-on training, and performance of laser hair removal procedures. 17

C. A laser hair removal facility shall be overseen by a
physician; provided, that Advanced Practice Registered Nurses shall
be exempt from this oversight requirement.

21 D. The overseeing physician shall:

Establish proper protocols for laser hair removal provided
 at a facility including, but not limited to, complication
 management. A laser practitioner shall follow all written procedure

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protocols established and revised by the overseeing physician. Such
 protocols shall require utilizing a physician, physician assistant,
 or Advanced Practice Registered Nurse for complication management;

4 2. Determine the number of laser practitioners under such5 physician's supervision; and

6 3. Review not less than ten percent (10%) of laser hair removal7 patient records.

E. A physician shall not be required to be physically present
or to supervise laser hair removal, but shall be available for
communication during the procedure, either in person or by two-way,
real time interactive communication.

F. A laser practitioner may perform laser hair removal on a patient without the prior evaluation or referral of such patient by a physician.

The conduct of allopathic physicians and physician 15 G. assistants pursuant to this act shall be regulated by the State 16 17 Board of Medical Licensure and Supervision. The conduct of osteopathic physicians pursuant to this act shall be regulated by 18 the State Board of Osteopathic Examiners. The conduct of Registered 19 Nurses, Licensed Practical Nurses, and Advanced Practice Registered 20 Nurses pursuant to this act shall be regulated by the Oklahoma Board 21 of Nursing. 22

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1	H. Nothing in this act shall prohibit any person in the healing
2	arts, in this state under any other act, from engaging in the
3	practice for which he or she is duly licensed.
4	SECTION 4. This act shall become effective November 1, 2024.
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
