1 ENGROSSED SENATE BILL NO. 597 By: Newhouse of the Senate 2 and 3 Hasenbeck of the House 4 5 An Act relating to the State Board of Medical 6 Licensure and Supervision; amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 481, which relates to membership of the 7 Board; allowing graduates of certain foreign medical schools to serve on the Board; allowing retired 8 physicians to serve on the Board under certain 9 condition; amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 482, which relates to appointment to the Board; limiting certain restriction on appointment; amending 59 O.S. 2021, 10 Section 509.1, which relates to disciplinary actions; making letters of concern privileged; requiring Board 11 to keep certain information confidential and privileged; permitting information to be offered in 12 certain proceedings; providing certain exclusions from specified law and proceedings; authorizing 13 certain provision of information under specified conditions; amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 503.2, 14 which relates to administrative remedies for licensee violations; specifying applicability of remedies; 15 amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 536.8, which relates to Registered Electrologists; eliminating certain 16 requirements for licensees and county clerks; making language gender neutral; amending 59 O.S. 2021, 17 Sections 2030 and 3203, which relate to duties of the Board; excluding social security number from certain 18 information sharing requirements; establishing Anesthesiologist Assistants Advisory Committee; 19 providing for appointment of members, expiration of terms, and filling of vacancies; prohibiting and 20 requiring certain compensation; stating powers and duties; amending 59 O.S. 2021, Section 4000.1, as 21 amended by Section 1, Chapter 279, O.S.L. 2022 (59 O.S. Supp. 2022, Section 4000.1), which relates to 22 grounds for denial of a license or certification to practice an occupation; modifying applicability of 23 section; updating statutory language; providing for codification; and providing an effective date. 24

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3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

4 SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 481, is 5 amended to read as follows:

6 Section 481. <u>A.</u> A State Board of Medical Licensure and 7 Supervision hereinafter referred to as the "Board", is hereby re-8 created, to continue until July 1, 2024, in accordance with the 9 provisions of the Oklahoma Sunset Law. The Board shall be composed 10 of seven (7) allopathic physicians licensed to practice medicine in 11 this state and represent the public and four (4) lay members.

<u>B.</u> The physician members of the Board shall be graduates of
 legally chartered medical schools recognized by the Oklahoma State
 Regents for Higher Education or the Liaison Council Committee on
 Medical Education or foreign medical schools recognized by the State
 <u>Board of Medical Licensure and Supervision</u>. The physician members
 shall have:

Be currently licensed physicians who have actively practiced
 as licensed physicians continuously in this state for the three (3)
 years immediately preceding their appointment to the Board; or

21 <u>2. Be retired physicians; provided, that such physicians must</u> 22 <u>demonstrate satisfactorily to the Board that since retirement they</u> 23 <u>have remained in compliance with, and are currently in compliance</u> 24 with, continuing medical education requirements of the Board. 1 <u>C.</u> All members of the Board shall be residents of this state 2 and shall be appointed by the Governor as provided for in Section 3 482 of this title. All present members of the Board shall continue 4 to serve for the remainder of their current terms.

5 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 482, is 6 amended to read as follows:

Section 482. Physician members of the State Board of Medical 7 Licensure and Supervision shall be appointed for terms of seven (7) 8 9 years. The lay members of the Board shall serve terms coterminous with that of the Governor and until a qualified successor has been 10 duly appointed and shall serve at the pleasure of the Governor. 11 No 12 member shall be appointed to serve more than two complete consecutive terms. Each physician member shall hold office until 13 the expiration of the term for which appointed or until a qualified 14 successor has been duly appointed. An appointment shall be made by 15 the Governor within ninety (90) days after the expiration of the 16 term of any member or the occurrence of a vacancy on the Board due 17 to resignation, death, or any cause resulting in an unexpired term. 18 The appointment of allopathic physicians shall be made from a list 19 of three names submitted to the Governor by the Oklahoma State 20 Medical Association. The Association may submit names of members or 21 nonmembers of the Association. No member of the Board shall be a 22 stockholder in or full-time salaried or full-time geographic member 23 of the faculty or board of trustees of any medical school. 24

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1SECTION 3.AMENDATORY59 O.S. 2021, Section 509.1, is2amended to read as follows:

Section 509.1. A. RANGE OF ACTIONS: The State Board of 3 Medical Licensure and Supervision may impose disciplinary actions in 4 5 accordance with the severity of violation of the Oklahoma Allopathic Medical and Surgical Licensure and Supervision Act. Disciplinary 6 actions may include, but are not limited to the following: 7 1. Revocation of the medical license with or without the right 8 9 to reapply; Suspension of the medical license; 10 2. 3. Probation; 11 Stipulations, limitations, restrictions, and conditions 12 4. relating to practice; 13 5. Censure, including specific redress, if appropriate; 14 6. Reprimand; 15 A period of free public or charity service; 16 7. 8. Satisfactory completion of an educational, training, and/or 17 treatment program or programs; and 18 9. Administrative fines of up to Five Thousand Dollars 19 (\$5,000.00) per violation. 20 Provided, as a condition of disciplinary action sanctions, the Board 21 may impose as a condition of any disciplinary action, the payment of 22 costs expended by the Board for any legal fees and costs and 23 probation and monitoring fees including, but not limited to, staff 24

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1 time, salary and travel expense, witness fees and attorney fees.
2 The Board may take such actions singly or in combination as the
3 nature of the violation requires.

B. LETTER OF CONCERN: The Board may authorize the secretary to issue a confidential <u>and privileged</u> letter of concern to a licensee when evidence does not warrant formal proceedings, but the secretary has noted indications of possible errant conduct that could lead to serious consequences and formal action. The letter of concern may contain, at the secretary's discretion, clarifying information from the licensee.

11 C. EXAMINATION/EVALUATION: The Board may, upon reasonable 12 cause, require professional competency, physical, mental, or 13 chemical dependency examinations of any licensee, including 14 withdrawal and laboratory examination of body fluids.

15 D. DISCIPLINARY ACTION AGAINST LICENSEES:

The Board shall promulgate rules describing acts of
 unprofessional or unethical conduct by physicians pursuant to the
 Oklahoma Allopathic Medical and Surgical Licensure and Supervision
 Act; and

20 2. Grounds for Action: The Board may take disciplinary action 21 for unprofessional or unethical conduct as deemed appropriate based 22 upon the merits of each case and as set out by rule. The Board 23 shall not revoke the license of a person otherwise qualified to 24 practice allopathic medicine within the meaning of the Oklahoma

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Allopathic Medical and Surgical Licensure and Supervision Act solely
 because the person's practice or a therapy is experimental or
 nontraditional.

Reports of all disciplinary action provided for in this section 4 5 will be available to the public upon request. Investigative files shall remain confidential and privileged. The Board, its employees, 6 or other agents of the Board shall keep confidential and privileged 7 all information that initiated, was obtained during, or is related 8 9 to an investigation into possible violations of any and all acts 10 governing any and all professional licensees under the legislative 11 jurisdiction of the State Board of Medical Licensure and 12 Supervision. However, such information may be offered by the state 13 in administrative proceedings before the Board and if admitted the information then becomes a public record. Unless admitted into 14 administrative proceedings, the information shall not be deemed to 15 be a record as that term is defined in the Oklahoma Open Records 16 Act, nor shall the information be subject to subpoena or discovery 17 in any civil or criminal proceedings, except that the Board may give 18 such information to law enforcement and other state agencies as 19 necessary and appropriate in the discharge of the duties of that 20 agency and only under circumstances that ensure against unauthorized 21 access to the information. 22 Е. SURRENDER IN LIEU OF PROSECUTION: 23

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The Board may accept a surrender of license from a licensee
 who has engaged in unprofessional conduct in lieu of Board staff
 prosecuting a pending disciplinary action or filing formal
 disciplinary proceedings only as provided in this section. To
 effect such a surrender, the licensee must submit a sworn statement
 to the Board:

- a. expressing the licensee's desire to surrender the
 8 license,
- 9 b. acknowledging that the surrender is freely and
 10 voluntarily made, that the licensee has not been
 11 subjected to coercion or duress, and that the licensee
 12 is fully aware of the consequences of the license
 13 surrender,
- c. stating that the licensee is the subject of an
 investigation or proceeding by the Board or a law
 enforcement or other regulatory agency involving
 allegations which, if proven, would constitute grounds
 for disciplinary action by the Board, and
- d. specifically admitting to and describing the
 misconduct.

2. The sworn written statement must be submitted with the
 licensee's wallet card and wall certificate. The Secretary or
 23 Executive Director of the Board may accept the sworn statement,
 wallet card and wall certificate from a licensee pending formal

1 acceptance by the Board. The issuance of a complaint and citation 2 by the Board shall not be necessary for the Board to accept a surrender under this subsection. A surrender under this subsection 3 shall be considered disciplinary action by the Board in all cases, 4 5 even in cases where surrender occurs prior to the issuance of a formal complaint and citation, and shall be reported as disciplinary 6 action by the Board to the public and any other entity to whom the 7 Board regularly reports disciplinary actions. 8

9 3. As a condition to acceptance of the surrender, the Board may 10 require the licensee to pay the costs expended by the Board for any 11 legal fees and costs and any investigation, probation and monitoring 12 fees including, but not limited to, staff time, salary and travel 13 expense, witness fees and attorney fees.

4. The licensee whose surrender in lieu of prosecution is
accepted by the Board shall be ineligible to reapply for
reinstatement of his or her license for at least one (1) year from
the date of the accepted surrender.

F. ALL LICENSED PROFESSIONALS: All disciplinary actions defined in this section are applicable to any and all professional licensees under the legislative jurisdiction of the State Board of Medical Licensure and Supervision.

22 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 503.2, is 23 amended to read as follows:

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1 Section 503.2. A. The State Board of Medical Licensure and 2 Supervision may promulgate rules to create administrative remedies for licensee violations of statutory or regulatory prescribed 3 unprofessional conduct. 4 5 Β. The Board is authorized to prescribe by rule administrative remedies, disciplinary actions and administrative procedures to 6 provide remedies and disciplinary actions for licensee violations of 7 statutory or regulatory prescribed unprofessional conduct, to 8 9 include fines up to the limits otherwise prescribed by statute or rule. 10 C. Any such administrative action rules promulgated by the 11 12 Board shall provide procedure: 13 1. For the licensee to contest or dispute any administrative action; 14 2. For procedures for resolution of any such contest or 15 dispute; and 16 3. For appropriate protection of private information consistent 17 with state and federal law. 18 D. ALL LICENSED PROFESSIONALS: All administrative remedies 19 defined in this section are applicable to any and all professional 20 licensees under the legislative jurisdiction of the State Board of 21 Medical Licensure and Supervision. 22 SECTION 5. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 536.8, is 23 amended to read as follows: 24

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1 Section 536.8. A. Every person who is licensed pursuant to the 2 provisions of the Registered Electrologist Act and who is licensed to practice electrolysis in this state shall register the license 3 with the county clerk of the county in which said person has legal 4 5 residence. The county clerk to whom such license is presented shall register the name and address of the person designated in the 6 license, together with the date and the number inscribed thereon, 7 which record shall be open to the public, and shall file with the 8 9 Board annually, during the month of February, a notice of the record 10 so made.

B. Every person who is licensed pursuant to the provisions of 11 the Registered Electrologist Act to practice electrolysis in this 12 13 state shall keep said the license displayed in his place of business as long as he or she is engaged in the practice of electrolysis. 14 The receipt for the annual renewal of license shall be kept at such 15 person's place of business and shall be shown to any person 16 17 requesting to see the same. The licensee shall keep the Board informed of his or her current address. A license issued by the 18 Board is the property of the Board and shall be surrendered on 19 demand of the Board. 20

21 SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 2030, is 22 amended to read as follows:

23 Section 2030. The State Board of Medical Licensure and 24 Supervision shall:

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1 1. Examine, license and renew the licenses of duly qualified
 2 applicants;

2. Maintain an up-to-date list of every person licensed to
practice respiratory care pursuant to the Respiratory Care Practice
Act. The list shall show the licensee's last-known place of
employment, last-known place of residence, and the date and number
of the license;

8 3. Cause the prosecution of all persons violating the
9 Respiratory Care Practice Act and incur necessary expenses therefor;

Keep a record of all proceedings of the Board and make such
 record available to the public for inspection during reasonable
 business hours;

13 5. Conduct hearings upon charges calling for discipline of a14 licensee, or denial, revocation or suspension of a license; and

6. Share information on a case-by-case basis of any person whose license has been suspended, revoked or denied. This information shall include the name, social security number, type and cause of action, date and penalty incurred, and the length of penalty. This information shall be available for public inspection during reasonable business hours and shall be supplied to similar boards in other states upon request.

22 SECTION 7. AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2021, Section 3203, is 23 amended to read as follows:

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Section 3203. The State Board of Medical Licensure and
 Supervision shall:

3 1. Examine, license and renew the licenses of duly qualified 4 applicants;

Maintain an up-to-date list of every person licensed to
 practice pursuant to the Oklahoma Anesthesiologist Assistant Act.
 The list shall show the licensee's last-known place of employment,
 last-known place of residence, and the date and number of the
 license;

Cause the prosecution of all persons violating the Oklahoma
 Anesthesiologist Assistant Act and incur necessary expenses
 therefor;

4. Keep a record of all proceedings of the Board and make such
record available to the public for inspection during reasonable
business hours;

16 5. Conduct hearings upon charges calling for discipline of a 17 licensee, or denial, revocation or suspension of a license; and

6. Share information on a case-by-case basis of any person whose license has been suspended, revoked or denied. The information shall include the name, social security number, type and cause of action, date and penalty incurred, and the length of penalty. The information shall be available for public inspection during reasonable business hours and shall be supplied to similar boards in other states upon request.

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SECTION 8. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified
 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 3209 of Title 59, unless there
 is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

A. There is hereby established the Anesthesiologist Assistants
Advisory Committee to advise the State Board of Medical Licensure
and Supervision on matters pertaining to the licensure, education,
and continuing education of licensed anesthesiologist assistants and
the practice of anesthesiologist assistants.

9 B. The Board shall appoint five (5) members to the
10 Anesthesiologist Assistants Advisory Committee as follows:

Three members shall be qualified physicians who have been
 actively practicing anesthesiology in this state for at least five
 (5) years; and

14 2. Two members shall be licensed anesthesiologist assistants
15 who have been actively practicing as an anesthesiologist assistant
16 in this state for at least three (3) years.

17 C. The physician members of the Committee shall be appointed 18 for staggered terms of one (1), two (2), and three (3) years, 19 respectively.

D. Terms of office of each appointed member shall expire July 1 of that year in which they expire regardless of the calendar date when such appointments were made. Subsequent appointments shall be made for a term of three (3) years or until successors are appointed and qualified.

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E. Vacancies shall be filled by the Board in the same manner as
 the original appointment.

F. Members of the Committee shall serve without compensation,
except that members shall be reimbursed for necessary travel
expenses incurred in the performance of their duties in accordance
with the State Travel Reimbursement Act.

G. The Committee shall have the power and duty to:
1. Meet at least twice a year or as otherwise called by the
Board; and

Advise the Board on matters pertaining to the licensure,
 education, and continuing education requirements for and the
 practice of anesthesiologist assistants in this state.

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 SECTION 9.
 AMENDATORY
 59 O.S. 2021, Section 4000.1, as

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 amended by Section 1, Chapter 279, O.S.L. 2022 (59 O.S. Supp. 2022,

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 Section 4000.1), is amended to read as follows:

16 Section 4000.1. A. As used in this section:

17 1. "Substantially relate" means the nature of the criminal
 18 conduct for which the person was convicted has a direct bearing on
 19 the fitness or ability to perform one or more of the duties or
 20 responsibilities necessarily related to the occupation; and

2. "Pose a reasonable threat" means the nature of the criminal 22 conduct for which the person was convicted involved an act or threat 23 of harm against another and has a bearing on the fitness or ability 24 to serve the public or work with others in the occupation.

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1 B. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a conviction, plea of guilty or nolo contendere, or pending criminal charge of a 2 crime may be grounds for the denial of an applicant for a state 3 license or state certification to practice an occupation only if the 4 5 underlying offense substantially relates to the duties and responsibilities of the occupation and poses a reasonable threat to 6 public safety, health, or welfare. When making a determination 7 pursuant to this subsection, a licensing or certification authority 8 9 shall consider:

10 1. The nature and seriousness of the offense;

The amount of time that has passed since the offense;
 The age of the person at the time the offense was committed;
 Evidence relevant to the circumstances of the offense
 including any aggravating or mitigating circumstances of social
 conditions surrounding the commission of the offense;

16 5. The nature of the specific duties and responsibilities for 17 which the license or certification is required; and

6. Any evidence of rehabilitation submitted by the applicant
including, but not limited to, evidence related to the person's
compliance with any conditions of community supervision, parole, or
mandatory supervision, the conduct and work activity of the person,
programming, or treatment undertaken by the person, and testimonials
or personal reference statements.

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C. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a licensing or
 certification authority shall not deny a state license or state
 certification to practice an occupation due to:

An arrest that was not followed by a valid plea of guilty or
 nolo contendere unless charges are currently pending;

2. A conviction that has been sealed, or expunged;

3. A conviction or plea of guilty or nolo contendere for which more than five (5) years have elapsed since the date of conviction, plea, or release from incarceration, whichever is later, so long as the person has not been convicted of a new crime. This paragraph shall not apply to any conviction or plea of guilty or nolo contendere for:

- a. an offense enumerated in Section 571 of Title 57 of
 the Oklahoma Statutes,
- b. a felony involving domestic assault, domestic assault
 and battery, or domestic abuse as defined in Section
 644 of Title 21 of the Oklahoma Statutes,
- c. an offense that would require registration as a sex
 offender pursuant to the Sex Offenders Registration
 Act, or
- d. any equivalent law enumerated in this paragraph from
 another jurisdiction; or
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4. A finding that an applicant lacks good character or fails to
 meet any other similarly vague standard where a criminal conviction
 is the basis for the finding.

D. Before a state licensing or state certification authority
makes a final determination that a criminal conviction, plea of
guilty or nolo contendere, or pending criminal charge may disqualify
an applicant for licensure, that authority shall provide written
notice of:

9 1. The specific offense that is the basis for the intended10 denial;

11 2. The reasons the offense was determined to substantially 12 relate to the duties and responsibilities of the occupation and 13 posed a reasonable threat to public safety, health, or welfare, 14 including findings for each of the factors in subsection B of this 15 section that the licensing or certification authority deemed 16 relevant to the determination; and

3. The right to submit additional evidence relevant to each of the factors listed in subsection B of this section within thirty (30) days, which the licensing or certification authority shall consider before issuing a final determination.

E. A final determination that a criminal conviction, plea of guilty or nolo contendere, or pending criminal charge may prevent a person from receiving a license shall be in writing and include notice of the right to appeal the determination pursuant to the

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Administrative Procedures Act, or a more specific statutory
 authority, and notice of the earliest date the applicant may reapply
 for a license.

A person with a criminal history record may request a 4 F. 5 determination of whether his or her criminal history record may disqualify him or her from obtaining the desired license or 6 certification in the occupation from a state licensing or state 7 certification authority at any time, including before obtaining any 8 9 required education or training for such occupation. The request shall be in writing and shall include either a copy of the person's 10 criminal history record with explanation of each conviction 11 12 mentioned in the criminal history record or a statement describing each criminal conviction including the date of each conviction, the 13 court of jurisdiction and the sentence imposed. The person may 14 include a statement with his or her request describing additional 15 information for consideration by the licensing or certification 16 authority including, but not limited to, information relevant to any 17 of the factors for consideration described in subsection B of this 18 section. 19

G. Upon receipt of a written request for consideration of a criminal history record for an occupation as provided in subsection F of this section, the licensing or certification authority shall evaluate the request and make a determination based upon the information provided in such request whether the stated conviction

is a disqualifying offense for the occupation. A notice of the determination shall be issued to the petitioner within sixty (60) days from the date such request was received by the licensing or certification authority; except, however, a licensing or certification authority regulating fifty thousand or more members in its occupation shall be allowed ninety (90) days to make its initial determination and issue notice to the requestor.

H. A determination made pursuant to subsection F of this 8 9 subsection that a person may not be disqualified for licensure or certification due to criminal history shall be binding upon a 10 licensing or certification authority unless, at the time a full 11 application for a license is submitted, the applicant has 12 subsequently pled guilty or nolo contendere to a crime, has pending 13 criminal charges, or has previously undisclosed criminal 14 convictions. 15

16 I. The notice of a determination made pursuant to subsection F 17 of this section shall be in writing and mailed to the requestor at 18 the address provided in his or her request, and shall contain the 19 following statements:

Whether the person is eligible for licensure or
 certification in the occupation at the current time based upon the
 information submitted by the requestor;

23 2. Whether there is a disqualifying offense that would24 disqualify the person from engaging in the occupation at the current

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1 time and a statement identifying such offense in the criminal 2 history record or information submitted for consideration;

3 3. Any actions the person may take to remedy a4 disqualification, if any;

5 4. The earliest date the person may submit another request for6 consideration, if any; and

7 5. A statement that the determination may be rescinded if, at
8 the time a full application for a license is submitted, the
9 applicant has subsequently pled guilty or nolo contendere to a
10 crime, has pending criminal charges, or has previously undisclosed
11 criminal convictions.

J. A state entity charged with oversight of an occupational license or certification may promulgate forms for requests for determinations for the occupation as authorized in subsection F of this section. Each state licensing or certification authority may charge a fee not to exceed Ninety-five Dollars (\$95.00) for each initial determination of eligibility it makes for the occupation based upon the information provided by the requestor.

19 K. Each state licensing or state certification authority shall 20 include in its application for a license or certification and 21 publish on its public website the following information:

Whether the criminal offenses of applicants may be used as a
 basis for denial;

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1 2. If criminal history may be used as a basis for denial as listed in subsection B of this section, which offenses the licensing 2 or certification authority shall consider; and 3 3. Notice of the right to request a determination pursuant to 4 5 subsection F of this section. L. Each state licensing or state certification authority 6 authorized to consider the criminal conviction of an applicant shall 7 annually provide to the Legislature, and publish on its public 8 9 website, the following: 1. The number of license applications received; 10 2. The number of applications that resulted in a license being 11 12 granted; 3. The number of applications that resulted in a license being 13 denied; 14 4. The number of applications that were denied due to criminal 15 history; 16 5. A list of criminal offenses reported by individuals who were 17 granted a license; 18 6. A list of criminal offenses reported by individuals who were 19 denied a license due to criminal history along with the time elapsed 20 since the commission of the offense; and 21 7. The number of petitions received by the licensing or 22 certification authority pursuant to subsection F of this section. 23 24

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1	M. The provisions of this section shall not be construed to
2	apply to the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training, the
3	Bail Bonds Division of the Oklahoma Insurance Department, the State
4	Board of Education, the State Board of Medical Licensure and
5	Supervision, or individuals applying to these authorities for
6	licensure or certification.
7	SECTION 10. This act shall become effective November 1, 2023.
