7	An Act relating to home- and community-based
8	services; amending 56 O.S. 2021, Section 1025.1, which relates to definitions; modifying and adding
9	definitions; amending 56 O.S. 2021, Section 1025.2, which relates to community services provider
10	requirements; broadening allowed criminal history records searches for certain providers; authorizing
11	the Department of Human Services to obtain national criminal history records search for certain community
12	services providers; describing certain searches; broadening applicability of certain provisions;
13	increasing time period of certain temporary employment; requiring certain community services
14	providers to provide national criminal history records search for certain workers; updating
15	statutory references; and providing an effective date.
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17	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
18	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 56 O.S. 2021, Section 1025.1, is
19	amended to read as follows:
20	Section 1025.1. For the purposes of Sections 1025.2 through
21	1025.4 of this title:
22	1. "Administrative information" means information reported to
23	or obtained by the Department of Human Services regarding the
24 27	community services provider during the investigative process that

<sup>1</sup> may be appropriate for internal administrative action but does not <sup>2</sup> have the potential to impact the immediate health, safety or welfare <sup>3</sup> of recipients of community services, has not been verified as true <sup>4</sup> and is for informational purposes only;

5 2. "Area of concern" means an issue that does not rise to the 6 level of abuse or neglect but may constitute a possible deficiency, 7 irregularity or deviation from policies and best practices by the 8 community services provider which has the potential to impact the 9 health, safety or welfare of recipients of community-based services, 10 and the Department of Human Services has conducted sufficient 11 inquiry into the issue to meet the probable cause investigative 12 standard;

13 3. "Bureau" means the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation; 14 "Community services provider" means a community-based 4. 15 program, corporation, or individual who contracts with, or is 16 licensed or funded by, the Department of Human Services to provide 17 residential or vocational services through in-person supports or 18 through the use of remote supports to persons who are elderly or 19 persons with intellectual or developmental disabilities, or 20 contracts with the Oklahoma Health Care Authority to provide 21 services to individuals with intellectual disabilities through a 22 Home and Community-Based Waiver, except a private ICF/IID;

5. "Community services worker" means any person employed by or under contract with a community services provider who provides, for

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1	compensation or as a volunteer, health-related services, training,
2	or supportive assistance to persons who are elderly or persons with
3	developmental disabilities, and who is not a licensed health
4	professional or any person who contracts with the Oklahoma Health
5	Care Authority to provide specialized foster care, habilitation
6	training specialist services, or homemaker services to persons with
7	developmental disabilities;
8	6. "Department" means the Department of Human Services;
9	7. "Developmental disability" means a severe, chronic
10	disability of a person which:
11	a. is attributable to a mental or physical impairment or
12	combination of mental and physical impairments, such
13	as an intellectual development disorder, cerebral
14	palsy, or autism,
15	b. is manifested before the person attains twenty-two
16	(22) years of age,
17	c. is likely to continue indefinitely,
18	d. results in substantial functional limitations in three
19	or more of the following areas of major life activity:
20	(1) self-care,
21	(2) receptive and expressive language,
22	(3) learning,
23	(4) mobility,
24	(5) self-direction,
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(6) capacity for independent living, and

(7) economic self-sufficiency, and

e. reflects the person's need for a combination and sequence of special, interdisciplinary, or generic care, treatment, or other services which are of lifelong or extended duration and are individually planned and coordinated;

8 8. "Health-related services" means those services provided by 9 community services providers or community services workers to 10 persons who are elderly or persons with developmental disabilities 11 that include, but are not limited to, personal hygiene, 12 transferring, range of motion, supervision or assistance in 13 activities of daily living, basic nursing care such as taking 14 temperature, pulse or respiration, positioning, incontinent care, 15 and identification of signs and symptoms of disease. Certain tasks 16 that may be performed as basic nursing care by community services 17 workers require appropriate training provided or approved by the 18 Department, written agreement by the service recipient's personal 19 support team, and the primary care physician's acknowledgement and 20 specific order related to the task. Under such circumstances, basic 21 nursing care may include, but need not be limited to:

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jejeunostomy jejunostomy tube,

nutrition including meals by gastrostomy tube or

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b. blood glucose monitoring,

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- c. ostomy bag care,
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- d. oral suctioning, and
- e. administration of oral metered dose inhalers and nebulizers;

5 9. "Supportive assistance" means the service rendered to 6 persons with developmental disabilities which is sufficient to 7 enable such person to meet an adequate level of daily living. 8 Supportive assistance includes, but is not limited to, training, 9 supervision, assistance in housekeeping, assistance in the 10 preparation of meals, and assistance in activities of daily living 11 as necessary for the health and comfort of persons with 12 developmental disabilities;

13 "Remote supports" means the utilization of technology by 10. 14 community services workers who are in remote locations, away from 15 the residences or locations of individuals with developmental or 16 intellectual disabilities, to provide health-related services or 17 supportive assistance to those individuals. Communication with 18 individuals with developmental or intellectual disabilities shall be 19 achieved with the use of two-way communications by community 20 services workers through such means as telephone or video feeds;

21 <u>11.</u> "Maltreatment" means abuse, verbal abuse, sexual abuse, 22 neglect, financial neglect, exploitation or sexual exploitation of 23 vulnerable adults as defined in Section 10-103 of Title 43A of the 24 Oklahoma Statutes or abuse, neglect, sexual abuse or sexual

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1 exploitation of children as defined in Section 1-1-105 of Title 10A
2 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

3 11. 12. "Personal care" means a level of assistance provided in 4 the home of an individual to meet the individual's activities of 5 daily living needs such as bathing, grooming, meal preparation, 6 light housekeeping, laundry, and care plan-directed errands; 7 12. 13. "Medicaid personal care services provider" means a 8 program, corporation or individual who provides services under the 9 state Medicaid program personal care program or ADvantage Waiver 10 Program to individuals who are elderly or who have a physical

<sup>12</sup> <u>13. 14.</u> "Medicaid personal care assistant" means a person who <sup>13</sup> provides Medicaid services funded under the state Medicaid <del>program</del> <sup>14</sup> personal care program, who is not a certified nurse aide or a <sup>15</sup> licensed professional;

<sup>16</sup> <u>14. 15.</u> "Specialized foster care" means the home- and <sup>17</sup> community-based service as defined in the 1915(c) waiver approved by <sup>18</sup> the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services;

<sup>19</sup> 15. <u>16.</u> "Habilitation training specialist services" means the <sup>20</sup> home- and community-based service as defined in the 1915(c) waiver <sup>21</sup> approved by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services; and

<sup>22</sup> <u>16. 17.</u> "Homemaker services" means the home- and community-<sup>23</sup> based service as defined in the 1915(c) waiver approved by the <sup>24</sup> Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

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1SECTION 2.AMENDATORY56 O.S. 2021, Section 1025.2, is2amended to read as follows:

3 Section 1025.2. A. 1. Except as otherwise provided by 4 subsection C of this section, before any community services provider 5 or Medicaid personal care services provider makes an offer to employ 6 or to contract with a community services worker applicant or a 7 Medicaid personal care assistant applicant to provide health-related 8 services, training, or supportive assistance to a person with a 9 developmental disability, or personal care services to a person who 10 receives the services of the state Medicaid personal care program, 11 the community services provider or Medicaid personal care services 12 provider shall:

13 provide, prior to a check with the Department of Human а. 14 Services, for a criminal history records search to be 15 made on the community services worker applicant or 16 Medicaid personal care assistant or contractor 17 pursuant to the provisions of this section, and 18 check with the Department of Human Services to b. 19 determine if the name of the applicant seeking 20 employment or contract has been entered on the 21 community services worker registry created pursuant to 22 Section 1025.3 of this title. Prior to a decision by 23 the Department to enter the name of a community 24 services worker or a Medicaid personal care assistant \_ \_

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1 on such registry, the Department shall allow for 2 notice and opportunity for due process for such 3 community services worker or Medicaid personal care 4 assistant against whom a final investigative finding 5 by the Department of Human Services of maltreatment of 6 an individual has been made. If the name of the 7 applicant seeking employment or a contract with the 8 community services provider or Medicaid personal care 9 assistant is listed on the registry as having a 10 finding by an Administrative Law Judge pursuant to the 11 requirements of Section 1025.3 of this title, and the 12 Department has allowed for notice and opportunity for 13 due process for such applicant, the provider shall not 14 hire the applicant.

15 2. If the Department of Human Services contracts directly with 16 a Medicaid personal care assistant, the Department shall follow the 17 screening procedures required by this section for Medicaid personal 18 care services providers.

19 3. If the Oklahoma Health Care Authority contracts directly 20 with a specialized foster care provider or habilitation training 21 specialist services provider or a homemaker services provider, the 22 Department shall follow the screening procedures required by this 23 section for community services providers.

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1	4. Community services providers and Medicaid personal care	
2	services providers are authorized to obtain records of any criminal	
3	conviction, guilty plea, or plea of nolo contendere maintained by	
4	the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation <u>(Bureau), or a Federal</u>	
5	Bureau of Investigation (FBI) national criminal history records	
6	search, based on fingerprints which the employer is required or	
7	authorized to request pursuant to the provisions of this section.	
8	5. The Department of Human Services is authorized to obtain a	
9	national criminal history records search based on submission of	
10	fingerprints for community services providers that provide remote	
11	supports. The search shall:	
12	a. be conducted by the Oklahoma State Bureau of	
13	Investigation and the Federal Bureau of Investigation	
14	pursuant to Section 150.9 of Title 74 of the Oklahoma	
15	Statutes, with the Department as the authorized	
16	agency,	
17	b. be submitted and have results received between the	
18	Department and the Oklahoma State Bureau of	
19	Investigation through secure electronic transmissions,	
20	and	
21	c. be paid for by the applicant or the community services	
22	provider.	
23	6. A criminal history records search for community services

23	and shall provide to the Bure	au <u>or FBI</u> any relevant information
24	required by the bureau or PBI	to conduct the search. The community

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services provider shall pay a reasonable fee to the Bureau for each criminal history records search that is conducted pursuant to such a request. Such fee shall be determined by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation.

5 7.9. A community services provider that provides remote 6 supports shall request the Department to conduct a national criminal 7 history records search based on submission of fingerprints on a 8 community services worker or applicant who will be providing remote 9 supports and shall provide to the Department any relevant 10 information required by the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation 11 and the Federal Bureau of Investigation to conduct the search. The 12 community services worker or applicant shall pay a reasonable fee to 13 the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation for each national 14 criminal history records search that is conducted pursuant to such a 15 request. Such fee shall be determined by the Oklahoma State Bureau 16 of Investigation. 17 10. The requirement of a criminal history records search shall 18 not apply to an offer of employment made to: 19 any person who is the holder of a current license or a. 20 certificate issued pursuant to the laws of this state

- authorizing such person to practice the healing arts,
  b. a registered nurse or practical nurse licensed
  pursuant to the Oklahoma Nursing Practice Act,

21	of subsection A of this section, at any time during the period of	
22	employment of	such worker with the provider.
23	C. A con	munity services provider may make an offer of temporary
24 4 -	employment to	a community services worker pending the results of

1 such criminal history records search and the registry review on the 2 applicant. The community services provider in such instance shall 3 provide to the Bureau the name and relevant information relating to 4 the applicant within seventy-two (72) hours after the date the 5 applicant accepts temporary employment. Temporary employment shall 6 not extend longer than the time necessary to receive the results of 7 the criminal history records search and registry review, not to 8 exceed thirty (30) forty-five (45) days. The community services 9 provider shall not hire or contract with an applicant as a community 10 services worker on a permanent basis until the results of the 11 criminal history records search and the registry review are 12 received.

D. Within five (5) days of receipt of a request to conduct a criminal history records search, the Bureau shall complete the criminal history records search and report the results of the search to the requesting community services provider.

17 Every community services provider and Medicaid personal care Ε. 18 services provider shall inform each applicant for employment, or 19 each prospective contract worker, as applicable, that the community 20 services provider or Medicaid personal care services provider is 21 required to obtain a criminal history records search and a registry 22 review before making an offer of permanent employment or a contract 23 with the community services worker or Medicaid personal care 24 assistant or applicant described in subsection A of this section. \_ \_

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1 When a community services provider will be providing remote F. 2 supports from outside this state, the community services provider 3 shall provide an FBI national criminal history records search, based 4 on fingerprints, on out-of-state community services workers or 5 applicants in lieu of a criminal history records search by the 6 Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation pursuant to this section. 7 If the results of any criminal history records search G. 1. 8 from any jurisdiction reveals that the subject worker or applicant 9 has been convicted, or pled guilty or nolo contendere to a felony or 10 to a misdemeanor assault and battery, the employer shall not hire or 11 contract with the applicant, but shall immediately terminate the 12 community services worker's employment, contract, or volunteer 13 arrangement, subject to the provisions of paragraph 2 of this 14 subsection.

15 2. The community services provider may request, in writing, a 16 waiver of the provisions of paragraph 1 of this subsection from the 17 Director of the Department of Human Services, or a designee of the 18 The Director or a designee of the Director may waive the Director. 19 provisions based upon standards promulgated by the Commission for 20 Human Services after concurrence by the Chief Executive Officer of 21 the Oklahoma Health Care Authority as the State Medicaid Agency. No 22 waiver shall be granted for offenses resulting in a felony 23 conviction or plea of guilty or nolo contendere to a felony that 24 occurred less than five (5) calendar years prior to the date of \_ \_

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<sup>1</sup> request. In no case shall a waiver be granted for employment of a <sup>2</sup> community services worker who has been convicted of, or pled guilty <sup>3</sup> or nolo contendere to, a felony count of aggravated assault and <sup>4</sup> battery, homicide, murder, attempted murder, rape, incest, sodomy, <sup>5</sup> or abuse, neglect, or financial exploitation of any person entrusted <sup>6</sup> to the worker's care.

7 G. H. All criminal history records received by the community 8 services provider or Medicaid personal care services provider are 9 for the exclusive use of the Department of Human Services, the 10 Oklahoma Health Care Authority and the community services provider 11 or Medicaid personal care services provider that requested the 12 information. Except as otherwise provided by this chapter or upon 13 court order or with the written consent of the person being 14 investigated, the criminal history records shall not be released or 15 otherwise disclosed to any other person or agency.

<sup>16</sup> H. <u>I.</u> Any person releasing or disclosing any information in <sup>17</sup> violation of this section, upon conviction thereof, shall be guilty <sup>18</sup> of a misdemeanor.

19 I. J. As part of any inspections required by law, the
20 Department of Human Services shall review the employment files of
21 the community services provider or Medicaid personal care services
22 provider required to conduct a criminal history records search to
23 ensure such provider is in compliance with the provisions of this
24 section.

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1	$\frac{1}{3}$ K. The Department of Human Services shall disclose all
2	registry information, all criminal records gathered and any
3	inspections conducted as a result of this section to the Oklahoma
4	Health Care Authority upon the request of the Oklahoma Health Care
5	Authority.
6	SECTION 3. This act shall become effective November 1, 2024.
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
