AMENDATORY 22 amended to read as follows: 23 Section 1025.3. A. The Director of the Department of Human 24 Services shall promulgate rules to establish and maintain a

community services worker registry. Such rules may include, but need not be limited to:

- 1. A procedure for notation in such registry of a final

 Department of Human Services investigative finding or a finding by
 an Administrative Law Judge administrative law judge of maltreatment
 of an individual by a community services worker or a Medicaid
 personal care assistant;
- 2. A procedure for notice and due process for a community services worker, or a Medicaid personal care assistant, or applicant before the entering of such person's name in the registry as having a final Department of Human Services investigative finding or Administrative Law Judge administrative law judge finding of maltreatment of an individual;
 - 3. Disclosure requirements for information in the registry; and
- 4. Procedures for granting a waiver of the provisions of paragraph 1 of subsection F of Section 1025.2 of this title by the Director of Human Services.
- B. The community services worker registry shall include, but not be limited to, the following information on each community services worker and each Medicaid personal care assistant:
 - 1. The individual's full name;
 - 2. Information necessary to identify each individual;
 - 3. The date the individual's name was placed in the registry;

4. Information on any final Department of Human Services investigative finding or Administrative Law Judge administrative law judge finding of maltreatment concerning the worker.

- C. A community services worker, a Medicaid personal care assistant, or applicant who is adversely affected by an Administrative Law Judge administrative law judge finding of maltreatment of an individual may seek judicial review pursuant to Article II of the Administrative Procedures Act. The finding of the Administrative Law Judge administrative law judge may be appealed to the district court of the county in which the community services worker, Medicaid personal care assistant, or applicant resides within thirty (30) days of the date of the decision. A copy of the petition shall be served by mail upon the general counsel of the Department of Human Services.
- D. An investigation conducted under Section 1025.1 et seq. of this title shall include a process for notifying a community services provider of areas of concern and administrative information. An area of concern or administrative information shall not be considered final investigative findings, nor shall the area of concern or administrative information be included in a final investigative report of the Department of Human Services. The Department shall develop a procedure by which a community services provider may request an investigative status update within ten (10)

calendar days of the initiation of an investigation conducted under Section 1025.1 et seq. of this title.

- E. Except as otherwise provided for in this section, the reports, records, and working papers used or developed in an investigation pursuant to this section shall be kept confidential and may be disclosed only as provided in Section 1-2-108 of Title 10A of the Oklahoma Statutes in the case of a child or Section 10-110 or 10-110.1 of Title 43A of the Oklahoma Statutes in the case of a vulnerable adult.
- SECTION 2. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1025.5 of Title 56, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:
- A. Upon receiving a report of alleged maltreatment of persons receiving services from a community services worker, Medicaid personal care assistant, or paid caretaker working with the person where such services are provided, the Department of Human Services shall make a prompt and thorough investigation. When feasible, law enforcement and the Department shall conduct joint investigations to reduce potential trauma to the victim and to eliminate duplicative efforts.
 - B. The investigation shall include:
- 1. Notification of the local law enforcement agency. Upon the request of a law enforcement agency, the Department shall submit copies of any results or records of an examination on the person

alleged to have been maltreated and any other clinical notes, x-rays, photographs, or previous or current records relevant to the case;

- 2. Sharing of any findings of maltreatment with any state agency that has concurrent jurisdiction over persons or issues identified in the investigation including, but not limited to, where appropriate, the State Department of Health, the Oklahoma Board of Nursing, or any other appropriate state licensure or certification board, agency, or registry;
- 3. Every reasonable effort to locate and notify the legal guardian of the person alleged to have suffered maltreatment pursuant to Section 3 of this act;
- 4. Any photographs necessary to document injuries or conditions which have resulted or may result in an injury or serious harm to the person; and
- 5. Other relevant information or procedures as determined by the Department.
- C. 1. Investigations conducted pursuant to this section shall include a visit to the home or other place of residence of the person who is the subject of the report, a private interview with such person and any other potential victims, and consultation with persons who have knowledge of or may be witnesses to the circumstances.

2. Investigators shall be suitably trained in interview techniques and shall utilize such techniques in interviews with elderly and incapacitated adults and individuals with intellectual disabilities. Interviews shall be conducted at the appropriate developmental age level of the victim. A reasonable effort shall be made to conduct interviews of victims with an intellectual disability or diminished capacity utilizing appropriate personnel and following protocols and procedures established for interviews with such persons, including the use of forensic interview techniques when appropriate.

3. If, in the course of an investigation, the Department is denied entrance to the home or other place of residence of a person believed to be a victim of maltreatment, or is denied a private interview with the person, the Department may petition the court for an order allowing entry to the premises or private access to the person. The court shall make a finding of probable cause of the vulnerability of the person before issuing the order. If documentation, or access to records, or other information relating to such person as provided by this section is denied, the Department may petition the court for an order allowing entry or access. The petition shall state the name and address of the person who is the subject of the report and shall allege specific facts sufficient to show that the circumstances of the person are in need of investigation. If it is necessary to forcibly enter the premises,

the representative of the Department shall make the entry accompanied by a peace officer.

- 4. The Department shall make all reasonable attempts to interview the community services worker, Medicaid personal care assistant, or other person alleged to be involved in the maltreatment.
- D. 1. The Department shall forward its final findings, including, but not limited to, any administrative appeal findings, to the owner or administrator of the community services provider or Medicaid personal care services provider to prevent further incidents.
- 2. When a report is received pertaining to a person who has a legal guardian, a copy of the final investigative report of the Department shall be filed with the court with jurisdiction over the guardianship.
- 3. In the case of a final investigative report pertaining to an individual who is a resident of a facility licensed by the State Department of Health and who is alleged to be a victim of maltreatment by an employee of such facility, the Department of Human Services shall forward a copy of the final investigative report to the State Department of Health.
- E. 1. The Department of Human Services shall be deemed a party pursuant to the Administrative Procedures Act for the final investigative reports filed by the Department with the State

Department of Health regarding persons who are residents of facilities licensed by the State Department of Health.

- 2. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the final investigative report submitted by the Department of Human Services pursuant to this section, the State Department of Health shall provide the Department of Human Services with a written summary of any action taken as a result of the complaint including, but not limited to, results of any inspections, enforcement actions, or other actions which may be taken by the State Department of Health.
- 3. Whenever the Department of Human Services believes that the conditions leading to a report investigated by the Department alleging a serious threat to the health, safety, or welfare of a resident of a facility licensed by the State Department of Health have not been adequately addressed, the Department of Human Services may request the State Department of Health to hold a hearing on the complaint as provided by Section 309 of Title 75 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
- 4. Nothing in this subsection shall prevent the State Department of Health from conducting any type of investigation or taking any appropriate remedial or other action pursuant to the provisions of the Nursing Home Care Act, the Residential Care Act, or the Continuum of Care and Assisted Living Act.

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SECTION 3. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1025.6 of Title 56, unless there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

- A. As soon as possible after initiating an investigation of a report pursuant to Section 2 of this act, and within one business day of identifying the legal guardian of the alleged victim, the Department of Human Services shall provide notification to the legal guardian of the alleged victim including an easily understood written description of the investigation process.
- B. The written notification specified by subsection A of this section shall include:
- 1. A statement that the investigation is being undertaken by the Department of Human Services in response to a report of maltreatment. The statement shall include the name and office telephone number of the Department representative with primary responsibility for the investigation;
- 2. A statement that the identity of the person who reported the incident of abuse, if known, shall remain confidential;
- 3. A statement that the investigation is required by law to be conducted to enable the Department of Human Services to identify incidents of maltreatment;
- 4. An explanation of the procedures of the Department of Human Services for conducting an investigation of alleged maltreatment, including a statement that:

- a. the alleged victim of maltreatment is the Department's primary client in such an investigation,
- b. findings of all investigations are provided to the office of the district attorney, and
- c. law enforcement may conduct a separate investigation to determine whether a criminal violation occurred;
- 5. A statement that, upon completion of the investigation, the legal guardian will receive a letter from the Department which will inform the legal guardian that:
 - a. the Department has found insufficient evidence of maltreatment, or
 - b. there appears to be probable cause to suspect the existence of maltreatment in the judgment of the Department;
- 6. The procedures to follow if there is a complaint regarding the actions of the Department;
- 7. References to the statutory and regulatory provisions governing abuse, neglect, or exploitation and how the legal guardian may obtain copies of those provisions; and
- 8. An explanation that the legal guardian may review specific information gathered during the investigation subject to the requirements and exceptions provided in Sections 10-110 and 10-110.1 of Title 43A of the Oklahoma Statutes.

2	of the public peace, health or safety, an emergency is hereby
3	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
4	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
