WHEREAS, the Japanese population quickly grew in Oklahoma in the 1920s and 1940s, and during World War II, several fought for the United States including four sons of Kutaro Nishimuta, a farmer in Payne County. His sons served in the U.S. Army 442nd Regimental Unit, an all-Japanese outfit and one of the most decorated units in the war; and

WHEREAS, nearly three percent of all Oklahomans identify as
Asian American or Pacific Islander, citing origins in Cambodia,
China, India, Japan, Korea, Malaysia, Pakistan, the Philippines,
Thailand, Vietnam, Hawaii, Guam, Samoa, or other Pacific Islands;
and

WHEREAS, Oklahoma City is home to an Asian District made up of the state's largest population of Asian descendants, predominately Vietnamese. Visitors flock to the district each year to experience the international cuisine, culture, and shopping; and

WHEREAS, Asian American and Pacific Islander citizens have made a tremendous impact on our state and nation, serving in vital roles as state and national leaders, starting businesses, making breakthroughs in science and technology, serving in our military, excelling in sports, arts, education, and more.
