**Research Analysis**

The Senate amendment to HB 3158 removes the previous language and inserts a substitute.

HB 3158, as amended, requires the State Board of Cosmetology and Barbering to issue licenses to nonprofit schools within correctional facilities and mandates specific application procedures, including obtaining approval from the Department of Corrections. The schools may not charge tuition and must operate within designated areas. Inmates enrolled in these programs are considered low-income individuals and may receive fee waivers for licensure, certification, or renewal.

The measure also specifies requirements and limitations regarding facilities, equipment, supplies, and operational procedures within the correctional facilities. Additionally, the measure addresses protocols for handling lockdown situations and exemptions for students during such events.

**Fiscal Analysis**

The Senate amendment to HB 3158 proposes that the State Board of Cosmetology and Barbering shall issue a license to any nonprofit 501 (c) (3) tax-exempt school located within a correctional facility in this state that proposes to provide training courses designed to qualify persons for licensure. Such schools are required to submit an application to the Board, and must obtain a memorandum of understanding from the Department of Corrections.

This measure is not expected to directly impact state revenue or state appropriations.
