**Fiscal Analysis**

This measure establishes the Oklahoma Workforce Commission. It sets up nine (9) Commissioners, none of whom will be paid a salary, but does allow them to seek reimbursements for their travel from their appointing authorities. This should create a minimal impact for the Governor's Office, Oklahoma House or Representatives, and Oklahoma State Senate.

It also provides the Commission the ability to create and staff an office to help out with the duties of the Commission, but it does not give a guideline on how many personal may be hired and at what salaries. Therefore, there is no known impact from the staffing of the office, just that it will likely cost some money.

As the measure provides no funding source for the Commission from state funds, nor is there any money appropriated in the state budget to the Commission from House Bill No. 1004 of the 1<sup>st</sup> Extraordinary Session of the 59<sup>th</sup> Oklahoma Legislature. Therefore, any funds used to operate the office will not likely come from state funds currently.
