**Bill Analysis**

SB 1974 authorizes law enforcement to issue a written no-trespass order and remove an individual from private property upon the first encounter and request from the property owner or authorized designee. The measure authorizes law enforcement to move the trespassing person at least 1 mile away from the original location or back to the person's homeless encampment or shelter. The measure authorizes law enforcement to create a database of such orders that uses photo-matching software. The measure provides that any person who violates 3 orders shall be subject to 1 day of work detail. Each subsequent offense will subject the person to double the amount of work detail. Such persons shall be held in the jail overnight for each work detail. Persons found to have violated more than 6 orders within 2 years shall receive a mental health assessment by a state or county healthcare official who holds a doctoral degree in psychology or psychiatry. Such an offender shall then be placed in counseling, mandatory mental health treatment, or prison without the possibility of parole for 1 year. The measure provides that a person who violates 9 orders within 2 years shall either be placed in mandatory mental health confinement or be imprisoned in the county jail without the possibility of parole for 1 year.
