11	15, O.S.L. 2023, 6-195.1, 11-107.1, and 1210.508 (70 O.S. Supp. 2024, Section 6-194), which relate to
12	student testing; modifying certain goal for professional development programs; modifying intent
13	of certain continuing education program; modifying reference to certain exam; allowing certain exam
14	scores to be considered in determining whether a student needs a remediation course; modifying
15	reference to certain average exam score to be used in goal for subject matter standards; defining terms;
16	requiring students who take certain test to do so at certain testing site; amending 70 O.S. 2021, Sections
17	2403 and 2603, as amended by Section 1, Chapter 440, O.S.L. 2024 (70 O.S. Supp. 2024, Section 2603), which
18	relate to eligibility for higher education assistance; modifying reference to certain exam to
19	qualify for the Oklahoma State Regents' Academic Scholars Program; allowing certain equivalent scores
20	to be used to determine eligibility for the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program; providing for
21	codification; providing an effective date; and declaring an emergency.
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1 | BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:

SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 6-194, as
last amended by Section 2, Chapter 15, O.S.L. 2023 (70 O.S. Supp.
2024, Section 6-194), is amended to read as follows:

5 Section 6-194. A. The district boards of education of this 6 state shall establish professional development programs for the 7 certified teachers and administrators of the district. Programs 8 shall be adopted by each board based upon recommendations of a 9 professional development committee appointed by the board of 10 education for the district.

Each professional development committee shall include 11 в. classroom teachers, administrators, school counselors or licensed 12 mental health providers, and parents, guardians, or custodians of 13 children in the school district and shall consult with a higher 14 education faculty. A majority of the members of the professional 15 development committee shall be composed of classroom teachers. 16 The teacher members shall be selected by a designated administrator of 17 the school district from a list of names submitted by the teachers 18 in the school district. The members selected shall be subject to 19 the approval of a majority vote of the teachers in the district. 20

C. In developing program recommendations, each professional
development committee shall annually utilize a data-driven approach
to analyze student data and determine district and school
professional development needs. The professional development

1 programs adopted shall be directed toward development of 2 competencies and instructional strategies in the core curriculum 3 areas for the following goals:

4 1. Increasing the academic performance data scores for the5 district and each school site;

6 2. Closing achievement gaps among student subgroups;

7 3. Increasing student achievement as demonstrated on state8 mandated tests and the ACT nationally norm-referenced college
9 entrance exams;

10 4. Increasing high school graduation rates; and

11 5. Decreasing college remediation rates.

12 Each program may also include components on classroom management and student discipline strategies, outreach to parents, guardians, 13 or custodians of students, special education, and racial and ethnic 14 education, which all personnel defined as teachers in Section 1-116 15 of this title shall be required to complete at a frequency as 16 17 determined by the board of education. The State Board of Education shall provide guidelines to assist school districts in developing 18 and implementing racial and ethnic education components into 19 professional development programs. 20

D. A program which includes the following information shall be completed the first year a certified teacher is employed by a school district, and then once every fifth academic year:

Training on recognition of child abuse and neglect;

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2. Recognition of child sexual abuse;

3. Proper reporting of suspected abuse; and

3 4. Available resources.

One time per year, beginning in the 2009-2010 school year, 4 Ε. 5 training in the area of autism shall be offered and all resident teachers of students in early childhood programs through grade three 6 shall be required to complete the autism training during the 7 resident year and at least one time every three (3) years 8 9 thereafter. All other teachers and education support professionals of students in early childhood programs through grade three shall be 10 required to complete the autism training at least one time every 11 three (3) years. The autism training shall include a minimum 12 awareness of the characteristics of autistic children, resources 13 available, and an introduction to positive behavior supports to 14 challenging behavior. Each adopted program shall allow school 15 counselors to receive at least one-third (1/3) of the hours or 16 credit required each year through programs or courses specifically 17 designed for school counselors. 18

Districts are authorized to utilize any means for professional development that is not prohibited by law including, but not limited to, professional development provided by the district, any state agency, institution of higher education, or any private entity. F. One time per year, beginning in the 2020-2021 school year, a dyslexia awareness program shall be offered. Beginning in the 20232024 school year, the program shall include information and training
 in dysgraphia. At a minimum, the program shall include:

3 1. Training in awareness of dyslexia characteristics in4 students;

5 2. Training in effective classroom instruction to meet the6 needs of students with dyslexia; and

7 3. Available dyslexia resources for teachers, students, and
8 parents.

9 G. Except as otherwise provided for in this subsection, each certified teacher in this state shall be required by the district 10 board of education to meet the professional development requirements 11 12 established by the board, or established through the negotiation process. Except as otherwise provided for in this subsection, the 13 professional development requirements established by each board of 14 education shall require every teacher to annually complete a minimum 15 number of the total number of points required to maintain 16 employment; provided, no more than a total of one hundred fifty 17 (150) hours of local, state, or federal professional development or 18 training shall be required for classroom teachers during any five-19 year period. Failure of any teacher to meet district board of 20 education professional development requirements may be grounds for 21 nonrenewal of such teacher's contract by the board. Such failure 22 may also be grounds for nonconsideration of salary increments 23

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affecting the teacher. Teachers shall maintain written
 documentation of all their completed professional development.

Each district shall annually submit a report to the State 3 Η. Department of Education on the district level professional 4 5 development needs, activities completed, expenditures, and results achieved for each school year by each goal as provided in subsection 6 C of this section. If a school district elects not to adopt and 7 offer a professional development program as provided for in 8 9 subsection A of this section, the district shall not be required to submit an annual report as required pursuant to this subsection but 10 shall report to the State Department of Education its election not 11 12 to offer a program and all professional development activities 13 completed by teachers and administrators of the school district.

I. Subject to the availability of funds, the Department shall develop an online system for reporting as required in subsection H of this section. The Department shall also make such information available on its website.

18 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 6-195.1, is
19 amended to read as follows:

20 Section 6-195.1. A. It is hereby declared to be the intent of 21 the Legislature to establish a continuing education program whereby 22 teachers employed to teach mathematics may obtain certification in 23 mathematics and teachers certified to teach mathematics in the state 24 may take higher education courses in order to obtain the

1 competencies needed to enable the teacher to successfully complete the subject area examinations and become certified to teach any of 2 the core curriculum mathematics courses recommended by the American 3 College Test State Department of Education. The program shall pay 4 5 up to One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) per credit hour up to a maximum of twenty-four (24) credit hours for a teacher to take higher 6 education courses in mathematics. Teachers required to gain 7 certification as provided in Section 6-189.1 of this title shall be 8 9 given priority in the funding for the continuing education program. The purpose of the program is to improve the knowledge and skills of 10 teachers and to ensure that the children of the state are taught by 11 12 professional educators, fully prepared in the area of mathematics.

B. Implementation of this section shall be contingent upon the
appropriation of state funds by the Legislature for the specific
purpose of implementing this section. Nothing in this section shall
prevent the State Board of Education or a school district board of
education from utilizing private, local, or federal funds to
implement this section.

C. Implementation of this section shall be delayed until the current expenditure per pupil in average daily attendance in public elementary and secondary schools in unadjusted dollars for the 1998-99 school year or any school year thereafter for Oklahoma, as reported by the National Center for Education Statistics annually in the Digest of Education Statistics, reaches at least ninety percent

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1 (90%) of the regional average expenditure for that same year, and 2 funds are provided. For purposes of this section, the regional average expenditure shall consist of the current expenditure per 3 pupil in average daily attendance in public elementary and secondary 4 5 schools in unadjusted dollars for each of the following states: Arkansas, Colorado, Kansas, Missouri, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and 6 Texas, averaged together. By January 1 of each year, the State 7 Board of Education shall report whether or not the ninety-percent 8 9 expenditure level has been reached based on information reported 10 annually in the Digest of Education Statistics by the National Center for Education Statistics. This section shall be implemented 11 12 on July 1 after the first January 1 report verifies that the ninetypercent expenditure level has been reached and funds have been 13 provided for the specific purposes of this section. 14

15 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 11-107.1, is 16 amended to read as follows:

17 Section 11-107.1. A. Each school district in this state may 18 offer a remediation course for high school students who score below 19 a nineteen (19) on the American College Testing (ACT) exam or below 20 an equivalent score on the <u>SAT exam</u> <u>Scholastic Assessment Test (SAT)</u> 21 or Classic Learning Test (CLT) exams.

B. Nothing in subsection A of this section shall be construedto require that a teacher providing instruction in the remediation

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course be certified in any subject matter that is tested on the ACT
 <del>or</del>, SAT <del>exam</del>, or CLT exams.

3 SECTION 4. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 1210.508, is 4 amended to read as follows:

Section 1210.508. A. 1. By no later than December 31, 2016,
the State Board of Education shall adopt a statewide system of
student assessments in compliance with the Elementary and Secondary
Education Act of 1965 (ESEA), as reauthorized and amended by P.L.
No. 114-95, also known as the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA).

The statewide student assessment system adopted by the Board
 pursuant to this subsection shall be aligned with the Oklahoma
 Academic Standards as adopted by the Board and which prepare
 students for college and careers.

B. 1. The Board shall issue a request for proposals for the
selection of assessments to be administered to students in grades
three through twelve as a part of the statewide student assessment
system adopted by the Board pursuant to this section.

18 2. The Board shall adopt assessments from the selected 19 proposals that were submitted pursuant to paragraph 1 of this 20 subsection. The adopted assessments shall be administered by the 21 Board for a period that is in coordination with the six-year subject 22 area textbook adoption cycle unless the vendor does not fulfill the 23 terms of the contract or fails to comply with or violates the terms

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1 of the contract. The Board shall administer the assessments beginning with the 2017-2018 school year. 2 C. The statewide student assessment system adopted by the Board 3 pursuant to this section shall include assessments that: 4 5 1. Are aligned with the Oklahoma subject matter standards as adopted by the Board; 6 2. Provide a measure of comparability among other states; 7 3. Yield both norm-referenced scores and criterion-referenced 8 9 scores; 4. Have a track record of statistical reliability and accuracy; 10 and 11 12 5. For assessments administered in high school, provide a measure of future academic performance. 13 D. For the 2016-2017 school year, the Board shall administer 14 assessments in: 15 1. English Language Arts or Reading reading and Mathematics 16 mathematics in grades three through eight and at least once in high 17 school, during the grade span of nine through twelve; 18 2. Science not less than once during each grade span of three 19 through five, six through nine, and ten through twelve; and 20 3. United States History not less than once during the grade 21 span of nine through twelve. 22 1. Beginning with the 2017-2018 school year, the statewide Ε. 23 student assessment system shall include assessments in: 24

1 English Language Arts and Mathematics mathematics in a. grades three through eight and at least once in high 2 school, during the grade span of nine through twelve, 3 Science science not less than once during each grade 4 b. 5 span of three through five, six through nine, and ten through twelve, and 6 United States History, with an emphasis on civics, not 7 с. less than once during the grade span of nine through 8 9 twelve. Beginning with the 2017-2018 school year, the statewide 10 2. student assessment system may include: 11 assessments in Reading reading and Writing writing in 12 a. certain grades as determined by the Board, and 13 contingent upon the availability of funds, an b. 14 additional nationally recognized college- and career-15 readiness assessment or assessments as recommended by 16 the State Department of Education which will be 17 administered to students in high school at no cost to 18 the student. 19

F. 1. Beginning with students entering the ninth grade in the 21 2017-2018 school year, each student shall take the assessment or 22 assessments included in the statewide student assessment system 23 adopted by the Board pursuant to subsection A of this section in 24 order to graduate from a public high school with a standard diploma.

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All students shall take the assessment or assessments prior to
 graduation, unless otherwise exempt by law.

Beginning with students entering the ninth grade in the 3 2. 2017-2018 school year, each student, in addition to taking the 4 assessment or assessments included in the statewide student 5 assessment system adopted by the Board pursuant to subsection A of 6 this section, shall meet any other high school graduation 7 requirements adopted by the Board pursuant to Section 5 of Enrolled 8 House Bill No. 3218 of the 2nd Session of the 55th Oklahoma 9 10 Legislature in order to graduate from a public high school with a standard diploma. 11

12 3. For students who start the ninth grade prior to or during the 2016-2017 school year, school districts shall adopt a plan that 13 establishes the assessment or assessments those students are 14 required to take in order to graduate from a public high school with 15 a standard diploma. The plan may also include any or all of the 16 other high school graduation requirements adopted by the Board 17 pursuant to Section 5 of Enrolled House Bill No. 3218 of the 2nd 18 Session of the 55th Oklahoma Legislature that those students will be 19 required to meet in order to graduate from a public high school with 20 a standard diploma. 21

4. The Board shall promulgate rules to ensure that students who
transfer into an Oklahoma school district from out-of-state after
the junior year of high school shall not be denied the opportunity

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to be awarded a standard diploma due to differing testing
 requirements.

In order to provide an indication of the levels of 3 G. competency attained by the student in a permanent record for 4 5 potential future employers and institutions of higher education, school districts shall report on the high school transcript of the 6 student the highest-achieved score on the assessment or assessments 7 included in the statewide student assessment system adopted by the 8 9 Board pursuant to subsection A of this section and any business- and industry-recognized endorsements attained. 10

H. Students who do not perform at a proficiency level on
assessments shall be remediated as established in the assessment
requirements adopted by the Board pursuant to Section 5 of Enrolled
House Bill No. 3218 of the 2nd Session of the 55th Oklahoma
Legislature, subject to the availability of funding.

1. All assessments required by this section shall measure 16 I. academic competencies in correlation with the subject matter 17 standards adopted by the Board pursuant to Sections 11-103.6 and 11-18 103.6a of this title and referred to as the Oklahoma Academic 19 Standards. The State Board of Education shall evaluate the subject 20 matter standards to ensure the competencies reflect high standards, 21 are specific, well-defined, measurable, and challenging, and will 22 prepare elementary students for next-grade-level course work and 23 secondary students for postsecondary studies at institutions of 24

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higher education or technology center schools without the need for
 remediation. All subject matter standards shall reflect the goals
 as set forth in Section 11-103.6 of this title and of improving the
 state average ACT score of college entrance exam scores.

5 2. The State Department of Education shall annually evaluate the results of the assessments. The State Board of Education shall 6 ensure that preliminary results for all statewide assessments are 7 reported to districts no later than June 20 of each year and are 8 9 presented in a manner that yields detailed, diagnostic information for the purpose of guiding instruction and student remediation. As 10 11 improvements are made to the assessments required by this section, 12 the Board shall seek to increase the depth of knowledge assessed for each subject. The State Board of Education shall seek to ensure 13 that data yielded from the assessments required in this section are 14 utilized at the school district level to inform instruction, 15 professional development, school improvement, and remediation for 16 17 students.

The Commission for Educational Quality and Accountability
 shall determine the cut scores for the performance levels on all
 statewide assessments. The Commission shall conduct an ongoing
 review to compare the statewide assessment content and performance
 descriptors with those of other states. Upon receipt of the review,
 the Commission may adjust the cut scores as necessary.

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The State Board of Education, for the purposes of conducting 1 4. reliability and validity studies, monitoring contractor adherence to 2 professionally accepted testing standards, and providing 3 recommendations for testing program improvement, shall retain the 4 5 services of an established, independent agency or organization that is nationally recognized for its technical expertise in educational 6 testing but is not engaged in the development of aptitude or 7 achievement tests for elementary or secondary level grades. 8 These 9 national assessment experts shall annually conduct studies of the reliability and validity of the statewide assessments administered 10 pursuant to this section. Validity studies shall include studies of 11 decision validity and concurrent validity. 12

The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules J. 1. 13 setting the assessment window dates for each statewide assessment so 14 that the assessments are administered according to recommended 15 testing protocols $_{\tau}$  and so that the assessment results are reported 16 17 back to school districts in a timely manner. The vendor shall provide a final electronic data file of all school site, school 18 district, and state results to the State Department of Education and 19 the Office of Educational Quality and Accountability prior to August 20 20 of each year. The Department shall forward the final data files 21 for each school district and each school site in that district to 22 the school district. The Board shall ensure the contract with the 23 vendor includes a provision that the vendor report assessment 24

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results directly to the Office of Educational Quality and
 Accountability at the same time it is reported to the Board.

State, district, and site level results of all assessments 3 2. required in this section shall be disaggregated by gender, race, 4 5 ethnicity, disability status, migrant status, English proficiency, and status as economically disadvantaged, except that such 6 disaggregation shall not be required in a case in which the number 7 of students in a category is insufficient to yield statistically 8 9 reliable information or the results would reveal personally identifiable information about an individual student. Each school 10 site shall notify the student's parents or legal guardians of the 11 12 school's performance levels in the Oklahoma School Testing Program 13 as reported in the Oklahoma Educational Indicators Program at the end of each school year. 14

15 K. The State Board of Education shall be responsible for the 16 field-testing and validation of the statewide assessment system 17 required in subsection A of this section.

L. The State Board of Education shall develop, administer, and incorporate as a part of the Oklahoma School Testing Program, other assessment programs or procedures, including appropriate accommodations for the assessment of students with disabilities as required by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), 20 U.S.C., Section 1400 et seq.

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M. For purposes of developing and administering alternate
 assessments for students with the most significant cognitive
 disabilities, the State Board of Education shall not be subject to
 subsections D and E of Section 11-103.6a of this title.

5 SECTION 5. NEW LAW A new section of law to be codified 6 in the Oklahoma Statutes as Section 1210.508-7 of Title 70, unless 7 there is created a duplication in numbering, reads as follows:

8 A. As used in this title:

9 1. "Classic Learning Test" or "CLT" means the Classic Learning
10 Test administered by Classic Learning Initiatives, LLC; and

11 2. "Testing site" means an independently run testing center 12 operated by the assessment company and any physical location where 13 means of education are provided including public school districts, 14 charter schools, private schools, institutions of higher education 15 within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, and private 16 institutions of higher education in this state.

B. Students in this state who take the Classic Learning Test
(CLT) shall only take the test in a brick-and-mortar testing site.
SECTION 6. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2403, is
amended to read as follows:

21 Section 2403. A. No person shall be eligible to participate in 22 the Oklahoma State Regents' Academic Scholars Program unless the 23 person:

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Has complied with all of the rules promulgated by the
 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education pursuant to the
 provisions of the Oklahoma State Regents' Academic Scholars Act,
 Section 2401 et seq. of this title, for the award, regulation, and
 administration of scholarships; and

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2. Qualifies as one of the following:

- an Individual Applicant Qualified Student, which shall 7 a. mean a student who is a resident of the State of 8 9 Oklahoma this state whose American College Testing 10 Program score or whose Scholastic Aptitude Test score 11 on a nationally norm-referenced college entrance exam falls within the 99.5 to 100.0 percentile levels as 12 13 administered in the State of Oklahoma this state and whose grade point average and/or class rank is 14 exceptional, as determined by the State Regents, 15 b. a Presidential Scholar, which shall mean a student 16 selected by the Commission on Presidential Scholars 17 administered by the United States Department of 18 Education, 19
- c. a National Merit Scholar, which shall mean a student
   designated as a National Merit Scholar by the National
   Merit Scholarship Corporation,
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1 d. a National Merit Finalist, which shall mean a student 2 designated as a National Merit Finalist by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, or 3 after October 1, 1999, an Institutional Nominee, which 4 e. 5 shall mean a student nominated by an institution in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education: 6 whose American College Testing Program or 7 (1) Scholastic Aptitude Test score on a nationally 8 9 norm-referenced college entrance exam falls within the 95.0 to 99.49 percentile levels, or 10 who shows exceptional academic achievement as 11 (2) evidenced by factors, including, but not limited 12 13 to, grade point average, class rank, national awards, scholastic achievements, honors, and who 14 shows exceptional promise based on documentation 15 that may include, but not be limited to, teacher 16 recommendations, extracurricular activities, and 17 evidence of overcoming economic and social 18 obstacles as determined by the State Regents. 19 The State Regents shall ensure that standards of 20 high academic ability are documented. 21 Scholarship awards to Institutional Nominees 22 shall become effective when appropriate 23 documentation is verified by the State Regents. 24

B. No person shall be eligible to receive a scholarship
 pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma State Regents' Academic
 Scholars Program unless the person is enrolled as a full-time
 student at a public or private accredited institution of higher
 education in Oklahoma.

The Oklahoma State Regents' Academic Scholars Program shall 6 С. provide a scholarship in an amount not to exceed the average costs 7 of all enrollment fees, tuition and other fees, room and board, and 8 9 all required textbooks or materials for up to five (5) years of 10 undergraduate and/or graduate study at an accredited public or private institution of higher education in Oklahoma as provided in 11 12 subsection E of this section. The State Regents may establish separate scholarship award levels for each qualifying category. 13

D. If a person identifies himself or herself as a student with a disability and requests consideration for a scholarship under the Academic Scholars Program by means other than standard testing procedures, the State Regents shall determine what means of assessment are appropriate and upon the basis of said <u>such</u> assessment results, determine what level of award, if any, shall be made.

E. 1. If the student is attending an institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, the total funding for the scholarship provided in this section, exclusive of any internships, shall not exceed the costs for items specified in subsection C of

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this section at the institution attended as determined annually by
 the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education.

If the student is attending a private institution of higher 3 2. education, the total funding for the scholarship provided in this 4 5 section, exclusive of any internships, shall not exceed the costs for items specified in subsection C of this section at an 6 institution of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education of 7 comparable type which has the highest general enrollment fees of its 8 9 type institution in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education as 10 determined annually by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education. 11

12 SECTION 7. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2603, as 13 amended by Section 1, Chapter 440, O.S.L. 2024 (70 O.S. Supp. 2024, 14 Section 2603), is amended to read as follows:

Section 2603. A. Except as otherwise provided for in subsection B of this section and elsewhere in this section, to be eligible to participate in the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program and to qualify for an award which includes payment of an amount equivalent to resident tuition or other tuition pursuant to Section 2604 of this title for the first semester or other academic unit of postsecondary enrollment, a student shall:

Be a resident of this state or be enrolled in a school
 district located in this state that serves students who reside in

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1 both this state and an adjacent state pursuant to a contract as 2 authorized in Section 5-117.1 of this title;

2. Be a United States citizen or lawfully present in the United 3 States. A student who is not a United States citizen or lawfully 4 5 present in the United States shall not be eligible to participate in the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program and to qualify for an 6 award notwithstanding the provisions of Section 3242 of this title. 7 The provisions of this paragraph shall not apply to any student who 8 9 was enrolled in the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program prior to 10 the end of the 2006-2007 school year;

Have a record of satisfactory compliance with agreements
 executed pursuant to Section 2605 of this title;

4. a. have graduated within the previous three (3) years
from a high school accredited by the State Board of
Education or the Oklahoma School of Science and
Mathematics with a minimum 2.5 cumulative grade point
average on a 4.0 scale for all work attempted in
grades nine through twelve,

b. have graduated within the previous three (3) years
from a high school not accredited by the State Board
of Education with a minimum 2.5 cumulative grade point
average on a 4.0 scale for all work attempted in
grades nine through twelve and have achieved a

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1 composite score of 22 or higher on the ACT test or an 2 equivalent score on the SAT or CLT, or have satisfactorily completed within the previous 3 с. three (3) years an educational program that was 4 5 provided through a means other than a public or private school and have achieved a composite score of 6 22 or higher on the ACT test or an equivalent score on 7 8 the SAT or CLT;

9 5. Have completed the curricular requirements for admission to an institution within The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education 10 and one additional unit or set of competencies in a course that 11 12 meets college admission requirements+, or have completed the core 13 curriculum and be seeking admission to a technology center school overseen by the State Board of Career and Technology Education. The 14 curriculum requirements for admission to an institution within The 15 Oklahoma State System of Higher Education shall include two units or 16 sets of competencies in foreign or non-English language or 17 technology courses that meet the college admission requirements and 18 one unit or set of competencies of a fine arts course. Students 19 shall also have attained a 2.5 grade point average in the core 20 curriculum courses. Students who attended a high school which did 21 not offer all the core curriculum courses or students who were 22 educated by other means and were not offered all the core curriculum 23 courses shall be allowed to satisfy this curriculum requirement by 24

1 participating in a program approved by the Oklahoma State Regents 2 for Higher Education for remediation of high school curricular 3 deficiencies;

6. Have satisfied admission standards as determined by the
Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education for first-time-entering
students for the appropriate type of institution, or, if attending a
private institution, have satisfied admission standards as
determined by the private institution. No student participating in
the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program shall be admitted into
an institution of higher education by special admission standards;

Have secured admission to, and enrolled in, an institution 12 which is a member of The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, 13 a postsecondary vocational-technical program offered by a technology 14 center school that meets the requirements to be eligible for federal 15 student financial aid, or a private institution of higher learning 16 located within this state and accredited pursuant to Section 4103 of 17 this title; and

have established financial need according to the 8. 18 a. provisions of subsection D of Section 2605 of this 19 title and standards and provisions promulgated by the 20 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, 21 b. if the student was adopted between birth and twelve 22 (12) years of age while in the permanent custody of 23 the Department of Human Services, in the court-ordered 24

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custody of a licensed private nonprofit child-placing agency, or federally recognized Indian tribe, as defined by the federal Indian Child Welfare Act <u>of</u> <u>1978</u>, have established financial need according to the provisions of paragraph 1 of subsection E of Section 2605 of this title and standards and provisions promulgated by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education, or

9 с. if the student was adopted between thirteen (13) and seventeen (17) years of age while in the permanent 10 custody of the Department of Human Services, in the 11 court-ordered custody of a licensed private nonprofit 12 child-placing agency, or federally recognized Indian 13 tribe, as defined by the federal Indian Child Welfare 14 Act of 1978, have established financial need according 15 to the provisions of paragraph 2 of subsection E of 16 Section 2605 of this title and standards and 17 provisions promulgated by the Oklahoma State Regents 18 for Higher Education. 19

B. 1. A student shall be eligible to participate in the
Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program and to qualify for an award
which includes payment of an amount equivalent to resident tuition
or other tuition pursuant to Section 2604 of this title for the

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1 first semester or other academic unit of postsecondary enrollment if 2 the student meets all of the following criteria:

- is a child of any person killed after January 1, 2000, 3 a. in the line of duty in any branch of the United States 4 5 Armed Forces or who died after January 1, 2000, as a result of an injury sustained while in the line of 6 duty in any branch of the United States Armed Forces 7 and the person who was killed or died filed an 8 9 individual or joint Oklahoma income tax return for the 10 tax year prior to the year during which the person was killed or died, 11
- b. is a resident of this state or is enrolled in a school
  district located in this state that serves students
  who reside in both this state and an adjacent state
  pursuant to a contract as authorized in Section 5117.1 of this title,
- c. enrolls in an institution within The Oklahoma State
  System of Higher Education prior to reaching the age
  of twenty-one (21),
- d. has satisfied admission standards as determined by the
  Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education for firsttime-entering students for the appropriate type of
  institution, or, if attending a private institution,
  has satisfied admission standards as determined by the

private institution. No student participating in the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Program shall be admitted into an institution of higher education by special admission standards,

- 5 e. has secured admission to, and enrolled in, an institution which is a member of The Oklahoma State 6 System of Higher Education, a postsecondary 7 vocational-technical program offered by a technology 8 9 center school that meets the requirements to be 10 eligible for federal student financial aid, or a private institution of higher learning located within 11 this state and accredited pursuant to Section 4103 of 12 this title, and 13
- f. executes an agreement pursuant to subsection C of
  Section 2605 of this title.

2. A student who is eligible to participate in the program
 pursuant to this subsection shall not be required to meet the
 eligibility requirements set forth in subsection A of this section.

C. To retain eligibility while pursuing the program of higher learning in which enrolled, the student shall:

Meet the requirements for retention and degree completion as
 established by the institution in which the student is enrolled;
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2. Maintain good academic standing and satisfactory academic
 progress according to standards of the Oklahoma State Regents for
 Higher Education;

3. Maintain satisfactory academic progress as required for
eligibility for federal Title IV student financial aid programs.
The provisions of this paragraph shall become effective for the
2012-2013 school year;

8 4. Comply with the standards related to maintenance of
9 eligibility as promulgated by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher
10 Education; and

5. Refrain from conduct that leads to expulsion or suspension
 of more than one semester from an institution of higher education.
 A student who violates the provisions of this paragraph shall
 permanently lose eligibility for program benefits. The provisions
 of this paragraph shall become effective January 1, 2008.

D. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education and the State Board of Career and Technology Education shall promulgate rules relating to maintenance of eligibility under the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Act by a student.

E. It is the intent of the Legislature that students in the ninth grade for the 1992-93 school year who are determined to be eligible Oklahoma Higher Learning Access students pursuant to the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Act shall be the first students

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eligible for benefits from the Oklahoma Higher Learning Access Trust
 Fund.

3	F. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education are
4	authorized to study, develop, and propose criteria for determining
5	award eligibility based upon the completion of seven semesters of
6	high school coursework by a student.
7	SECTION 8. This act shall become effective July 1, 2025.
8	SECTION 9. It being immediately necessary for the preservation
9	of the public peace, health, or safety, an emergency is hereby
10	declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and
11	be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
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
