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6	An Act relating to the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program; amending 70 O.S. 2021,
7	Sections 2621, 2623, and 2625, which relate to creation of and eligibility for the program;
8	modifying eligibility for program; updating statutory
9	language; increasing income limit for certain eligibility; exempting certain applicants from
10	certain income limit; allowing certain form to be used to verify income; removing certain eligibility
11	criteria; directing the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education to give first priority status to
12	certain applicants; modifying process for verifying documentation of lineage; requiring application form
	to include certain language; directing awards to be
13	made in certain specified manner; directing the State Regents to involve certain community advisory
14	committee in selection process; providing for composition of and appointments to advisory
15	committee; directing certain university president to submit a list of proposed members; directing advisory
16	committee to review certain applications and make
17	certain recommendations; directing the State Regents to select recipients from certain list; allowing
18	certain remaining scholarship award funds to be used for certain purposes; directing certain applicants to
19	always be given first priority status; and declaring an emergency.
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21	BE IT ENACTED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF OKLAHOMA:
22	SECTION 1. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2621, is
23	amended to read as follows:
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1 Section 2621. There is hereby created the Tulsa Reconciliation 2 Education and Scholarship Program. The purpose of the program is to provide a scholarship award to residents of the Tulsa School 3 District, which was greatly impacted both socially and economically 4 5 by the civil unrest that occurred in the City of Tulsa during 1921. Beginning with the 2002-2003 school year, or as soon thereafter as 6 practicable, and subject to the availability of funds, the program 7 shall each year make scholarships available to as many students as 8 9 feasible, up to three hundred scholarships, to qualified residents 10 of the Tulsa School District $_{\tau}$ and to qualified students of any other 11 public school district in the United States who are direct lineal 12 descendants as defined in subsection C of Section 2623 of this title and who meet the criteria set forth in Sections 2623 and 2624 of 13 this title, and who are intending to pursue studies at an 14 institution of higher education in The Oklahoma State System of 15 Higher Education or a private institution of higher education τ in 16 17 this state or who are intending to pursue studies in a postsecondary career and technology education program in this state. 18 The scholarship shall be an amount of not more than not exceeding the 19 equivalent of the average amount of resident tuition for which an 20 eligible Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program 21 participant enrolled at an institution of higher education in The 22 Oklahoma State System of Higher Education or a postsecondary career 23 and technology education program, whichever is applicable, is 24

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obligated to pay. The scholarship shall be paid as provided for in
 Section 2625 of this title. The further purpose of this program is
 to establish and maintain a variety of educational support services
 whereby residents students who qualify for the program will be
 prepared for success in postsecondary endeavors.

6 SECTION 2. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2623, is 7 amended to read as follows:

Section 2623. A. Subject to the availability of funds, the 8 9 Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education may annually award a maximum of three hundred full-time-equivalent scholarships for the 10 Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program to residents 11 12 of the Tulsa School District and to qualified students of any other public school district in the United States who are direct lineal 13 descendants as defined in subsection C of this section and who are 14 intending to pursue studies at an institution of higher education in 15 The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education or a private 16 institution of higher education in this state or who are intending 17 to pursue studies in a postsecondary career and technology education 18 program in this state. 19 To qualify for a scholarship, the family income of an 20 Β. applicant shall satisfy the following criteria: 21

22 1. The family income of the applicant, from taxable sources is 23 not more than Seventy Thousand Dollars (\$70,000.00), not exceed One 24 Hundred Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$125,000.00) per year. There

1	shall be no family income limit for an applicant who is a direct
2	lineal descendant as defined in subsection C of this section. The
3	Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form may be used to
4	verify family income;
5	2. The applicant attended a Tulsa public school where seventy-
6	five percent (75%) or more of the students enrolled in the school
7	qualify for the free and reduced lunch program; and
8	3. The applicant resides in a census block area within the
9	Tulsa School District where thirty percent (30%) or more of the
10	residents are at or below the poverty level established by the
11	United States Bureau of the Census.
12	C. The <u>State</u> Regents may consider as a Regents' selection
13	process shall factor, when determining the order of preference of
14	give first priority status to applicants, whether an applicant who
15	is a direct lineal descendant of a person who resided in the
16	Greenwood Area in the City of Tulsa between April 30, 1921, and June
17	1, 1921 <u>, and was a victim of the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre</u> . If the
18	Regents use Use of descent as a preference factor, it shall be
19	applied to all applicants regardless of race. The applicants shall
20	be required to present verifiable documentation of their lineage.
21	The Oklahoma Historical Society An organization or individual
22	engaged in genealogy and research of descendants and history of the
23	1921 Tulsa Race Massacre and Greenwood Area shall verify the
24	authenticity and accuracy of the documentation submitted by an

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1 applicant and shall establish confirm the boundaries of the 2 Greenwood Area. Verifiable documentation shall include, but not be 3 limited to, the following:

Family records including family bibles, vital records,
 correspondence, memoirs, journals, diaries, unrecorded deeds,
 diplomas, certificates, or testimonials;

Public records including censuses, government records,
military records, pensions, land bounty records, passport
applications, passenger lists, original grants, naturalization or
immigration records, records of entry, or state, province, or local
records; or

Institutional records including church records, cemetery
 records and inscriptions, education institutions, insurance records,
 or societies and fraternal organizations.

The State Regents shall promulgate rules establishing the 15 D. application requirements for the program and the system for 16 evaluating applications based on the preference factors. 17 The application form shall include a small outlined box graphic, 18 followed by the following language: "Mark the box if you are a 19 direct lineal descendant of a victim greatly impacted socially and 20 economically during the 1921 Tulsa Race Massacre who resided in the 21 Greenwood Area of Tulsa, Oklahoma, between April 30, 1921, and June 22 1, 1921." 23

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1 E. Applicants shall also meet the eligibility criteria 2 established in Section 2624 of this title.

The Oklahoma In addition to the scholarships authorized 3 F. 4 pursuant to Section 2621 of this title and this section, the State 5 Regents for Higher Education shall also be authorized to annually award scholarships for the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and 6 Scholarship Program to two students at each of the high schools in 7 the Tulsa School District for the purpose of preserving awareness of 8 9 the history and meaning of the civil unrest that occurred in Tulsa in 1921. The following provisions shall apply to the scholarship 10 scholarships provided in this subsection: 11

1. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection B of this 12 13 section, eligibility for the scholarships awarded pursuant to this subsection shall be: 14

15	a.	enrollment in the appropriate high school,

3	2. The S	tate Regents shall involve the administration of the
4	Tulsa School	District and a community advisory committee in the
5	selection pro	cess. The community advisory committee shall be
6	comprised of	seven (7) members appointed by the Chancellor of Higher
7	Education. I	the community advisory committee shall be comprised of:
8	<u>a.</u>	the President of Langston University or his or her
9		designee,
10	<u>b.</u>	the Superintendent of Tulsa Public Schools or his or
11		her designee,
12	<u>C.</u>	two members of the Legislature representing the
13		Greenwood area in the City of Tulsa, Oklahoma, or
14		their designees,
15	<u>d.</u>	two descendants of socially and economically adversely
16		impacted persons who resided in the Greenwood Area in
17		the City of Tulsa, Oklahoma, between April 30, 1921
18		and June 1, 1921, and
19	<u>e.</u>	a citizen with ties to the historic Greenwood
20		community who may be engaged in faith-based,
21		education, or social, business, or advocacy work.
22	The Presi	dent of Langston University, or his or her designee,
23	<u>shall be resp</u>	onsible for coordinating with the community advisory
24	committee and	shall submit to the Chancellor of Higher Education a

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1 list of proposed committee members for review and approval. The 2 community advisory committee shall review scholarship applications 3 and make recommendations for scholarship recipients and scholarship 4 award amounts. The State Regents shall select scholarship 5 recipients from the list of recommendations provided pursuant to 6 this paragraph;

3. The award shall be limited to a one-year full-time-7 equivalent period. Following successful completion of such award, 8 9 recipients who meet the criteria provided in subsection B of this 10 section shall be eligible to apply and be considered for continued participation in the full Tulsa Reconciliation Education and 11 12 Scholarship Program. Any student subsequently awarded such 13 scholarship shall have the duration of the scholarship provided pursuant to this subsection deducted from the limits set in 14 subsection D of Section 2625 of this title; 15

16 4. The award may only be funded with state funds appropriated 17 to the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Trust Fund and 18 income therefrom, and shall be made subject to the availability of 19 such funds; and

5. The awards made pursuant to this subsection shall be included within the maximum number of scholarships specified in subsection A of this section.

23 SECTION 3. AMENDATORY 70 O.S. 2021, Section 2625, is 24 amended to read as follows:

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1 Section 2625. A. Subject to the availability of funds, an 2 amount of not more than the equivalent of the average amount of resident tuition for which an eligible Tulsa Reconciliation 3 Education and Scholarship Program participant enrolled in an 4 5 institution in The Oklahoma State System of Higher Education, or enrolled in a postsecondary career and technology education program, 6 whichever is applicable, is obligated to pay shall be awarded by 7 allocation from the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship 8 9 Trust Fund.

Subject to the availability of funds, for each eligible 10 Β. Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program participant 11 12 enrolled at a private institution of higher education, the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education shall award from the Tulsa 13 Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Trust Fund an amount of not 14 more than the equivalent of the average amount of resident tuition 15 for which the participant would be eligible if the participant were 16 enrolled in a program at an institution of The Oklahoma State System 17 of Higher Education. 18

C. Subject to the availability of funds, an amount of not more than the equivalent of the average amount of tuition for which an eligible Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program participant enrolled in a postsecondary career <u>and</u> technology education program is obligated to pay shall be awarded by allocation from the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Trust Fund.

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The allocation shall not exceed the amount a participant would have
 received for enrollment at a two-year institution within The
 Oklahoma State System of Higher Education.

Benefits awarded under the Tulsa Reconciliation Education 4 D. 5 and Scholarship Program shall not be allowed for courses or other 6 postsecondary units taken in excess of the requirements for completion of a baccalaureate program or taken more than five (5) 7 years after the student's first semester of participation in the 8 9 program. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education may award 10 the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program benefits for courses of postsecondary units taken more than five (5) years 11 12 after the student's first semester of participation in the program 13 only in hardship circumstances. No Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program participant may receive benefits beyond a 14 cumulative time period of five (5) years. The Oklahoma State 15 Regents for Higher Education may establish a maximum limit on the 16 17 number of courses or other postsecondary units to which Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program benefits will 18 apply. An award to an eligible Tulsa Reconciliation Education and 19 Scholarship Program participant who is enrolled in a postsecondary 20 career and technology education program may be used to pay for both 21 career and technology education and college work if both are 22 required by the program. 23

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1 E. Benefits awarded under the Tulsa Reconciliation Education 2 and Scholarship Program shall be awarded to not more than 300 three hundred (300) eligible participants annually, subject to the amount 3 of funds available for the program and the number of eligible 4 5 participants. Subject to the provisions of subsection F of this section, if funds are not sufficient to provide awards for the 6 maximum number of eligible participants each year, the Oklahoma 7 State Regents for Higher Education shall make awards on the basis of 8 9 need. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education shall take into consideration other grants and scholarships received by an 10 eligible student when making awards. If an eligible student 11 12 receives other grants and scholarships scholarship award funds remain after payment of resident tuition, the benefits awarded under 13 the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program may cover 14 any additional educational costs not covered by the other grants and 15 scholarships including, but not limited to, fees, required textbooks 16 17 or materials, and room and board. If the family of an eligible Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program participant 18 may qualify for the federal Hope Scholarship or Lifetime Learning 19 tax credit as provided for in the Taxpayer Relief Act of 1997, P.L. 20 No. 105-34, the participant may elect to use the award allowed by 21 this section to pay for fees, required textbooks or materials and, 22 if any funds remain, to pay for room and board instead of resident 23 tuition. 24

1 F. The Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education may, at the time an award is made on behalf of a Tulsa Reconciliation Education 2 and Scholarship Program participant, set aside in the Tulsa 3 Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Trust Fund funds for the 4 5 full commitment made to such Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program participant. For all academic years, 6 participants who have previously received awards under the 7 provisions of the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Act 8 9 and who have continued at all times to fulfill the requirements for 10 eligibility to receive awards provided pursuant to this program shall be given an absolute priority for continued financial support 11 12 by the Tulsa Reconciliation Education and Scholarship Program superior to any residents students who are applying for such 13 benefits for the first time; provided, however, that scholarship 14 applicants who are direct lineal descendants as defined in 15 subsection C of Section 2623 of this title shall always be given 16 17 first priority status. SECTION 4. It being immediately necessary for the preservation 18 of the public peace, health, or safety, an emergency is hereby 19

20 declared to exist, by reason whereof this act shall take effect and 21 be in full force from and after its passage and approval.
